

McLENAHAN LEADING ALL LEAGUE SCORERS

28 POINT TOTAL PLACES FREDERICTON CENTER ONE TALLY AHEAD OF BABE LEBLANC, MONCTON STAR; APPLEBY THIRD

Bill Gill, Burly Local Defenseman and Coach, Leads With Time Spent In Penalty Box; Has Served 56 Minutes In Twenty-two Penalties

SAINT JOHN, Jan. 19.—Weekly scoring statistics for the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League, released last night by A. Malcolm McGowan, official scorer, and including all games played to Jan. 16, showed a close three-cornered race for leadership. "Bun" McLennahan, hustling Fredericton Capitals centre, had snatched the lead away from George Appleby, who centres Moncton Maroons' speed line.

Babe LeBlanc, a member of that smart Maroon trio, was wedged in second place between McLennahan and Appleby when the week ended. Fifteen goals and 13 assists, for a total of 28 points, gave the Capital star in one-point margin over LeBlanc. The Babe had the same number of goals but was shy one assist. Their goal total was the highest to date.

Bill Gill, Charlie Phillips and McLennahan are still staging a merry race to see who can rest on the penalty bench the longest. Gill's 56 minutes served on 22 penalties left the Capitals' playing coach just two minutes ahead of Phillips' 54 on 22. McLennahan, with 14 offences, had sat with the timers for 50 minutes.

GRANT PREDICTS BRIGHT FUTURE FOR BOBBY RIGGS

Bitsy Likens Bobby's Style to Game Used By Europeans

CORAL GABLES, Fla., Jan. 19.—Take it from Bryan "Bitsy" Grant, Atlanta's bit of tennis dynamite, in this boy Bobby Riggs, Chicago, in time will be regarded as one of the world's greatest netters, and "Bitsy," who has played them all, should know. Grant, here in Coral Gables during play in the annual Miami Biltmore Men's Tennis championships in which he successfully defended the title he won last year from Donald Budge in an upset final, is confident Riggs is the greatest American prospect to come forward in many a year. Grant defeated Riggs in this year's final. "He will never have the finishing off shots that Don Budge uses," the Atlantian commented, "but he is the 'thinkingest' player I have ever met. He thinks his shots out in advance like a fellow who had been playing the topnotchers for years. I have never seen a youngster like him on the courts. I don't see how he can miss being great. He's good now but mark my word, he'll be regarded as great in a year or so."

Grant went on to explain that Riggs plays a vastly different type of tennis than Don Budge's game. "Don overpowers 'em," commented Bitsy. "He's got the powerful finishing shots and the physique to back them up. Riggs could never be that type player. Bobby resembles more the European type that for ten years have made it miserable for U. S. players. He plays strictly a back-court game. But how he plays it!"

OLD FEUD BETWEEN RED DUTTON, BILL STEWART FLARES UP AGAIN

Bill Blasts Americans On Grounds of 'Safety First Hockey'

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—The feud between Merv "Red" Dutton of the Amerks and Bill Stewart of the Black Hawks is simmering again.

It started when Red was first a player and then a manager while Bill was the law—the heat referee of the N.H.L. It's been carried on now that Stewart graduated to the ranks of coaches. It has flared up with fresh bitterness with the Hawks' pilot scathingly denouncing Dutton and the Amerks for "safety first hockey" this season.

"He should talk," Dutton said, bitingly. A Chicago newspaper containing the latest blast of Stewart, directed at the Amerks, was in front of him.

"In 23 games, we have scored 49 goals. In the same number of games the Black Hawks have scored 39 goals. Of course it will be said that we have a better scoring team than Chicago. Very well. Then consider the Chicago tactics."

"Stewart has been using defence-men up on the forward lines. I always thought a defence man's job was to stop scoring. Earl Siebert, for several seasons, was rated one of the outstanding back line players in the league. Then, why should he be playing up forward?"

"Here is the starting line-up of a recent game in Chicago: Karakas, goal; Levinsky and Jackson (a newcomer purchased from Minneapolis) on defence; Dahlstrom, Weibe and Siebert, forwards."

"Imagine that. Of the five players in front of the goal, four were defence players. Dahlstrom was the only regular forward, the others, Levinsky, Jackson, Weibe and Siebert, are defence men. And he (the 'he' was delivered with withering scorn) can talk about safety first."

Mr. Dutton was slowly working up to a blood pressure.

"Does that 5 to 5 tie we played with the Rangers sound like safety first tactics?" he yelled.

"And if we were playing that kind of hockey would we be over our last year's attendance?"

The "take" this season is \$9,000 over the same number of games last year.

"That Stewart —" Dutton fumed and his indignation boiled over to drown the rest of his protest.

PICK BRADDOCK TO TAKE FARR ON FRIDAY NIGHT

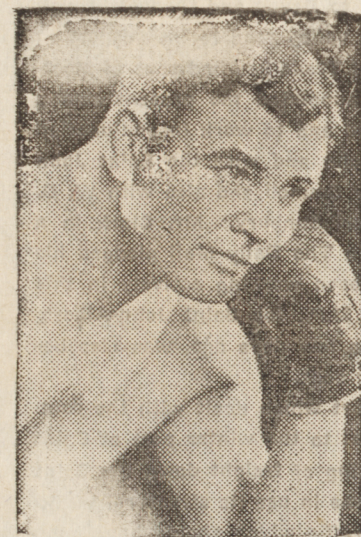
Ross and Steele Surprised at Jimmy's Showing

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Jim Braddock will give away ten years and possibly ten pounds to Tommy Farr Friday night when the former heavyweight champion and the British Empire titleholder meet in a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Braddock, who weighs 198, took a training "breather" today at Pompton Lakes. He covered six miles on the road but did no boxing.

Farr has melted off a few pounds since checking in at Madame Bey's roadside camp. He will weigh about 208 pounds for Braddock, who expects to do no higher than 196. These are practically the same weights they made against Joe Louis.

Barney Ross and Fred Apostoli are two prominent boxers who believe

Braddock may upset Farr by crashing through the guard that Joe Louis failed to penetrate. The welterweight champion saw Jim box recently.

"I was amazed," said Ross. "He is trimmer, more alert and his short straight punches are damaging. Certainly he is a better looking fighter today than when we trained together at Grand Beach last spring."

Braddock resumes boxing today and will throw leather at sparring mates in his final workout today before he climbs into the ring Friday night.

Betting in the fight is light, with Farr rated a slight favorite.

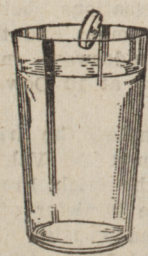

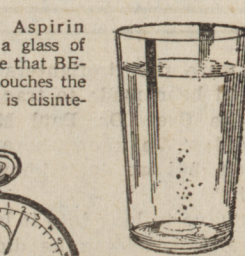
