MEDAL FOR SAVING LIFE OF CHILD AT ST. BONIFACE, MAN.

QUEBEC CITY, Feb. 11.—For saving the life of a child at the risk of his own by snatching her from the path of a moving train, J. Lucien Fafard, of the C. N. Railways, St. Boniface, Que., has been awarded the bronze medal of the Royal Canadian Humane Association. The presentation was made here yesterday morning in the office of G. R. Edgley, C. N. R. Superintendent in Quebec.
On June 8 last year, Solange, two-and-a-half year-old daughter of Theo Houle, ran out on the track at a crossing near the station at St. Boniface. The engineer of the train, Bellevue, saw the child standing between the rails, but as he was travelling at 35 miles an hour and the distance was so short, he realized he could not stop in time to avoid hitting her. He was applying the emergency brake when he saw Fafard dash out and pick up the child on the run. The train was almost upon him as he cleared the right-of-way. The medal is awarded for bravery.

mocracy, was educated at St. Mary's College, Laval and McGill. He was appointed King's Counsel in 1921, was Senior Crown Prosecutor for the District of Montreal in 1924-25, and served on the council of the Royal Commission investigating the Customs and Excise Department in 1926. He has been active in civic, provincial and federal politics, was for some time editor of "Canadian Century," and is the author of a number of books and articles, the most popular of which is "Verbal Cartoons," a collection of pen-sketches of Canadian political leaders. Col. Calder saw service with the Royal Highlanders in France and was awarded the Military Cross at Amiens, on August 8th, 1918.

Following the visit to this province, which is under the auspices of the Canadian League for Peace and Democracy, the speaker will embark on a Western tour which will touch the principal towns and cities as far as the Pacific Coast.

SOLID SILVER CUP SKIING TROPHY IS NOW EXHIBITED

MONTREAL, Feb. 11.—A huge solid sterling silver cup for open competition among amateur skiers is on display in the Canadian Pacific Express windows on St. James Street. The trophy was presented to the ski runners of the Canadian Rockies by Bernarr MacFadden, American publisher and health exponent, and will be the prize for the all-round championship of the Canadian Rockies.
After being displayed in Canadian Pacific offices in Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg, the cup will be sent forward to the ski runners of the Canadian Rockies. The winner this year will be decided at an open competition on Mount Norquay, near Banff, on March 5 and 6, the champion of the combined jumping, slalom and downhill having his name inscribed on the cup and being presented with a handsome plaque.

The cup, which is valued at \$500, was secured for the ski runners of the Canadian Rockies through the efforts of D. McD. Hains, assistant-general tourist agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

ITALY WILLING TO WITHDRAW FROM SPAIN ON CONDITION

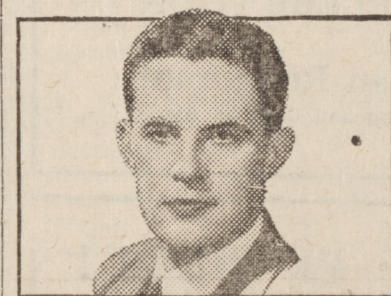
