Not more than one voter shall at any ene time enter the polling place and such voter upon entering shall declare his or her name, surname and addition and if the name of such elector is founden the list of voters he or she shall receive from the presiding officer an ungummed envelope on the back of which the presiding officer shall write with a pencil of black lead or with a pen and link his initials in the presence of the voter


