## WILL URGE FED. GOV'T. OPERATION AGAINST JAPAN

At the meeting of the Fredericton Peace Council held last evening with Dr. R. H. Wright in the chair, arrangements were made for a mass meeting of the citizens of Fredericton to be held in the near future. Draft resolutions for presentation to the meeting were considered. These resolutions will urge the Federal Government to place in operation against Japan the neutrality legislation, passed last April which enables export of war materials is to be prohibited by Order-in-Council. This act has already been invoked to prohibit the export of war materials to Spain. A supply of blank postcards has been received urging this course upon the Prime Minister. These will be distributed to individuals to forward to Ottawa.

A second resolution will call for strict enforcement of the Customs Act which requires the country of origin of imported articles to be marked thereon. Enforcement of the section of the Criminal Code dealing with deceptive marking of imported goods will also be urged.

The Peace Council decided to affiliate itself with the Canadian League for Peace and Democracy in order to keep in touch with the activities of the International Peace Campaign of which Viscount Cecil and Monsieur Pierre Cot are the joint chairmen and of which the Canadian League for Peace and Democracy is the Canadian unit.

In connection with the local boycott of the matter of making public information as to Japanese exports to Canada was taken up and instructions to boycotters are being drafted by the executive. A questionnaire to merchants is also being prepared in order that their opinions may be secured.

June 23, 1938.

The present administration have given Fredericton sound civic government. They have reduced the tax rate and kept expenditure within revenue. Tax arrears have been efficiently and impartially reduced from \$173,000 as of January 1st, 1937, to \$93,000 as of December 27th, 1937.
