his last year he was able to cruise a stand of timber with the same degree of accuracy that made him noted for his estimates of lumber value. Always honest, upright and shrewd, he was noted for his reputation as a straight shooter, and in the words of one of his old conferees, "believed in hewing the line, no matter where the chips fall."

During the depression years Mr. MacDonald and his firm carried on amid the discouragements of the time, providing employment for a large number of men.

He is survived by seven sons, Edgar, Errol O., Arthur and Walter, of this city; William, Vancouver; Hazen, Boston; and Rev. Ernest MacDonald, Ohio; also surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Annie Yerxa, of this city; Mrs. Perley Fox, Pinder; and one sister, Mrs. Emma Currie, Presque Isle, Maine.

The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon, with service at the home at 1.30. Ven. Archdeacon S. C. Gray will officiate in the service. The remains will be taken to Pinder by motor hearse, where interment will be made.

lined the streets, there being a great profusion of floral tributes.

Rev. Dr. A. C. Vincent, pastor of Main Street Baptist Church, officiated at the service, and pallbearers were H. A. Porter, K.C., M.L.A., E.J. Henneberry, M.L.A., Dr. William Warwick, chief medical health officer; Dr. Charles W. MacMillan, district medical health officer; Dr. J. K. Sullivan and J. K. Kennedy, president of the Saint John Kiwanis Club, of which Dr. Roberts was a past president.

Marching in a body in the funeral procession were the Knights of Pythias, the Medical Society, the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society, Kiwanians, members of the cabinet, members of the Legislature, members of the Masonic order, Sons of England, I. O. O. F., and officials of the Board of Health.

In his funeral oration Dr. Vincent said: "We have gathered here today to pay a final tribute to one who has lived in our community all his life not only lived, but served. With patience, perseverance and courage, he faced the task in early life of securing for himself an education; with these same virtues he faced the task of living. I think of him today as the kindly physician who, when he came into your home, made it bright by his presence. The one you could go to as a confidant with our cares and sorrows; your trials were his in a very real sense as many of you have experienced, and as I myself have the privilege to know. I came to know him not only through my contact with him in my own home, but in the homes of others."

Under the direction of David Thomson the Brunswick Singers sang two hymns "Peace I Leave With You" and "Let Me Sleep." In his youth Dr. Roberts had been a member of a quartet and he was a great admirer of the Brunswick Singers.

and sometimes we tried, at least, to plumb the mysteries of divine grace, and of life here and hereafter.

"Many times we prayed together and my life will always be the richer because of its contact with his. He is gone, and think of him how you will, you are forced to say, 'A prince and a great man has fallen this day in Israel.'"

"Not only have we come to pay our tribute of respect to the departed but we wish to express at this time our sympathy to Mrs. Roberts and McLaren. Our hearts are sad because a citizen, beloved, respected, a friend, has gone. How sad indeed must be their hearts today, the husband and the father has gone, one who lived for them. I commend them to the God of all comfort who can wipe away the tears from all eyes and give joy in the place of mourning. Their road must of necessity be a lonely one, but there is One who guides along the lonely pathway and we know He will guide and care for them."

"Just a word would I say today to those of us who have yet to live life and face death. We understand the responsibility of life only when we see it in death. There is one who tasted death for us, even Christ our Lord, may we give our lives to Him who died for us."
