## LOCAL SCHOOLS ONLY IN PROV. USING "MOVIES"

The Only City Having Regular Periods For Such

In Use Two Years

Example of City to Be Cited At Meeting Institute

Fredericton is still the only city in New Brunswick which includes visual education in the form of motion pictures in its regular curriculum, stated Rolfe K. Nevers, principal of Charlotte Street school, and supervisor of this type of education in the city schools. Motion pictures as a regular feature were first introduced into the Fredericton schools two years ago and since that time each school has had a short period per week devoted to educational pictures.

This morning W. G. Quinn, member of the school board and former alderman of the city, addressed the students of grades five, six, seven, and eight, of the Charlotte Street School on the Panama Canal, along with a picture showing the activity in the famous waterway.

He pointed out several interesting features in connection with the canal, including the fact that although American interests own the canal; British West Indian labor is employed solely. British holidays are observed, while George Washington's birthday means nothing to them. The British negroes are employed because the whites cannot do heavy work in the hot climate.

The picture was shown at the Model School this afternoon, and will be shown at the High School tomorrow, at Regent Street School Wednesday, at Smythe Street School Thursday, and at the York Street School on Friday.

It is expected that the inception of this modern means of education in Fredericton schools will be used as an example to advocate the universal adoption of such in the schools of New Brunswick at the meeting of the Teachers' Institute in this city in April. Mr. Nevers will address the institute at that time on "Radio Broadcasting to Schools and Visual Education."

## ONE WITNESS IN COURT ACTION THIS MORNING

Case of Inch vs. Farmers' Dairy Is Being Heard In Chambers

Edward S. Inch, Fredericton, was the only person to give evidence this morning in the action of E. S. Inch and Company versus the Farmers' Co-operative Dairy Company, Limited, which is being heard in the Supreme Court chambers before Hon. Justice C. D. Richards.

The plaintiff in this case has filed claim for \$604.20 being the balance due on installation of a refrigeration plant and for work done, materials provided, and goods sold. Hanson, Dougherty and West are appearing for the plaintiff.

P. J. Hughes, K. C., for the defendant, has filed a counter claim for \$1,700 for an alleged breach of contract.

The other action to be heard is that of Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Burge, South Devon, who are suing Ernest Bourque, Lincoln, for \$2,500 damages for alleged negligent operation of an automobile on October 19, 1937.

Court was adjourned this morning until 2.30 this afternoon.

## FAITHFUL ARE WARNED SPREAD OF COMMUNISM

Rev. Lucien Howard, C. Ss. R., Spoke In St. Dunstan's

Large Congregation

Forty Hours Devotion To Continue Until Tomorrow

Speaking of the spread of Communism as he had seen it as a missionary in Central, Western and Eastern Canada Rev. Lucien Howard, C.S.S.R., stressed the seriousness of the situation and the need for the guarding of the faith of the young people. Before a large congregation last evening in St. Dunstan's Church, he said that the Catholic Church knew what it was doing when it took drastic measures to offset the activities and evil influences of the present day as it concerned Communism.

He told of the existence of Communist schools in the different provinces of Canada, and of children and older students influenced by these Communist schools giving examples of profane and sacrilegious acts as a result. Hundreds were being robbed of their faith as the result of these nefarious activities, he said, and it is time that Eastern Canada follow the example of other provinces in stamping out this evil influence.

### Not First Time

This was not the first time that the Church had to combat such evils, and what is going on today throughout the world had been prophesied in the Old Testament of the Holy Bible. "The parents and all in authority," he declared, "have a duty to perform in this regard."

At St. Dunstan's Church the Forty Hours Devotion began yesterday morning. Following the High Mass of Exposition which took place at 8.30 o'clock, procession of The Blessed Sacrament took place and at the conclusion of the benediction the Blessed Sacrament was exposed and will remain exposed today and tomorrow.

Yesterday morning over 500 people received Holy Communion and at the evening service a special sermon on Faith was preached by Rev. Father Lucien Howard, C.S.S.R. from Saint John who will speak again during the Forty Hours. Last evening the Rosary was recited by Rev. Albert McDonald and the Benediction was celebrated by Rev. Walter Sutton, of Montreal.

During the Forty Hours celebration masses are being celebrated at the main altar as well as the side altars. The main altar is banked with flowers and lighted tapers and in the sanctuary large palms are placed at different places, the effect being very pleasing. Yesterday there was special singing by the choir a beautiful "O Salutaris" being sung in parts at the benediction last evening with L. F. Cain as soloist. Holy Communion was distributed this morning at a few minutes before six o'clock and large numbers received and it is expected that before the conclusion of the devotional that the whole congregation will have approached the Holy Table.

## LARGE DOCKET IS BEFORE DIVORCE COURT TUESDAY

## MEET RE BRIEF FOR COMMISSION HERE TUESDAY

Representatives of The Bd. of Trade to Meet Hon. W. P. Jones

Discuss Plans

Will Urge Improvement Roadbed Nashwaak Subdivision

R. L. Phillips, chairman of the Transportation Committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade, and E. C. Atkinson the president, will meet with Hon. W. P. Jones who is preparing New Brunswick's Brief for the Rowell Commission tomorrow, it is expected. The purpose of the meeting is to consider matters to be put before the Commission by the Board of Trade.

The matter of the Valley Route to the Sea will not be dealt with in the New Brunswick brief, Hon. Mr. Jones stated today since it is felt that the briefs of the Saint John and Fredericton Boards will adequately deal with the matter. F. M. Scanders secretary of the Saint John Board, was in the city on Saturday and conferred with Hon. Mr. Jones then on the matter. The proposed briefs will press for the improvement of the roadbed on the Nashwaak subdivision or the C.N.R. and the use of the Valley Route to the Sea.

## ACTION DEPENDS ON INFORMATION RE DAIRY CASE

Fair Wage Officer Is Awaiting Information About Dismissal Employees at St. John

Whether or not the Provincial Fair Wage Officer, Horace A. Pettigrove, will act in the matter of the dismissal of two employees of Pacific Dairies, Saint John, depends on information which he is now seeking, Mr. Pettigrove stated today.

It is understood that the two employees took a prominent part in the recent labor disputes there in reference to the dairy industry, and on their dismissal they charge discrimination. The Fair Wage Act states that no employer shall discriminate against any employee for having complained to the Fair Wage Board. The matter of intervention on the part of the board depends on whether or not there was discrimination.

Mr. Pettigrove stated that he would attempt to get the matter adjusted if he finds the case is under his jurisdiction, but that the matter may have to be a consideration for the whole board.

## RURAL EDUCATION THEME MEETING INSTITUTE HERE

Several Addresses On Rural Branch of N. B. Education

Other Speakers

Over 600 Teachers Are Expected Here At Easter Time

Rural education which has been so much in the public light for the past year, will be the central theme of the 1938 meeting of the "New Brunswick Teachers' Institute, which assembles in this city during the Easter school holidays, April 20, 21 and 22, according to the program released by Dr. H. H. Hagerman today.

This year will be the first time that the meeting has taken place at Easter time, Dr. Hagerman, who is secretary treasurer of the institute, stated today. For years the Institute was held during the last teaching days of June, until 1936 when the meeting date was changed to the opening of the fall term. It is the first time since 1932 that the Institute, which meets biennially, will be held in this city.

### Expect Large Number

Something over 600 teachers, from all parts of the province, are expected to attend. The meeting held at Easter puts New Brunswick in line with the other provinces.

It is expected, Dr. Hagerman said today, that Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education and Federal and Municipal Relations will address the teachers, as well as Dr. Fletcher Peacock, Director of Educational Services for New Brunswick, and Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Chief Superintendent of Education and President of the Institute.

Thursday afternoon of the session has been set aside for the biennial meeting of New Brunswick Teachers' Institute. There will be no night sessions.

The program included the following addresses: "The Larger Unit of Administration," by Inspector C. T. Wetmore, Hampton; "Drama in School Subjects," by Mrs. Elizabeth Haynes, director of drama for New Brunswick; "In Service—Training of Teachers," by Acting Inspector I. B. Rouse, Fredericton; "Need of Agricultural Education," by R. W. Maxwell, Woodstock, provincial agricultural representative and director of the Carleton County vocational school "French in Rural Schools," by Inspector A. B. Blanchard, Edmundston; "Rural School Education and Activities," by L. A. DeWolfe, Truro N.S., and "Radio Broadcasting to Schools and Visual Education," by Rolfe K. Nevers, principal of the Charlotte Street School in this city. Mr. DeWolfe will be remembered in the city having addressed the New Brunswick Farmers and Dairymen's Association in January on Rural Education.

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
