Example of City to Be Forty Hours Devotion Will Urge Improvement Over 600 Teachers Are Expected Here At Easter Time

This year will be the first time that the meeting has taken place at Easter time, Dr. Hagerman, who is secretary treasurer of the Institute, stated today. For years the Institute was held during the last teaching days of June, until 1936 when the meeting date was changed to the opening of the fall term. It is the first time since 1932 that the Institute, which meets biennially, will be held in this city.

Expect Large Number

Something over 600 teachers, from all parts of the province, are expected to attend. The meeting held at Easter puts New Brunswick in line with the other provinces.

It is expected, Dr. Hagerman said today, that Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education and Federal and Municipal Relations will address the teachers, as well as Dr. Fletcher Peacock, Director of Educational Services for New Brunswick, and Dr. A. McFaralne, Chief Superintendent of Education and President of the
