

## News Briefs

### AWAY FROM HOME

Two little boys, John and Jerry, sons of W. J. Poole, Brunswick Street, were reported missing from their home this morning. They returned to their home shortly after their case had been reported to the City Police. The two youngsters were located in Nashwaaksis where they had gone on a team.

### RETURNED TODAY

G. C. Cunningham, marketing expert for the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture, who has been in the Argentine since early fall in the interest of New Brunswick seed potatoes, arrived back in this city this morning. Mr. Cunningham is reporting directly to the deputy minister of agriculture, J. K. King, and no report on his trip could be secured today.

### TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

The Bright and Douglas Teachers' Association met in the Provincial Normal School this morning with Alfred Pait, the president, in the chair. Miss Muriel Smith, of the Fredericton Model School, presented an outline of 6th grade geography to the assembly, and R. K. Nevers, principal of Charlotte Street School, gave an impromptu address on visual aids in education, with the aid of lantern slides.

### INDIAN REMANDED

Mike Saccobie, Oromocto Indian, held in the Sunbury County Jail, Burton, for allegedly shooting his brother-in-law, Frank Atwin in the foot, appeared before Magistrate H. G. Kimball, at Oromocto yesterday. His case was remanded until Monday. Mr. Atwin is a patient at the Victoria Public Hospital, where it was learned by X-ray that the bone was shattered. It will be several days before it will be known if amputation is necessary.

### COMMISSION MET

The Town Planning Commission met last night in the Mayor's office in the City Hall with Ald. W. Raymond Crowdon in the chair. Two of the new members to the commission, Dr. R. M. MacGibbon and George E. Howie, were present at the meeting. Dr. Frederik Campbell, the other new member, left last night for a two weeks' trip through the Eastern States. Ald. Crowdon and E. Royden Colter were re-elected unanimously chairman and secretary-treasurer for another year. W. J. West and C. R. Barry, who were appointed last week as a by-law committee reported on 12 by-laws of the commission. They were accepted unanimously.

### Edwin B. Seeley Died Suddenly This Morning

Friends in this city and throughout the Saint John Valley section of the province will learn with sincere regret that death came suddenly this morning to Edwin B. Seeley of this city, one of the most popular commercial men in Central New Brunswick.

Mr. Seeley spent last evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred B. Smith, Church Street and left there apparently in good health. This morning he was about town and made a business call at the Hawkins Fruit Store. Returning home shortly after he complained of a pain in his back and was prevailed upon to lie down for a few minutes to rest himself but he passed away before medical aid could be summoned. The late Mr. Seeley has for many years been connected with the Goodwin Fruit Company whose headquarters is in Saint John. He has resided in this city and travelled out of here to different points between Edmundston and this city and down the valley. He made many friends not only with the trade but all with whom he came in contact. He was a gentleman of honesty and integrity and one with whom it was a pleasure to do business. The late Mr. Seeley is survived by his widow, three sons and two daughters. They are Kenneth B. Seeley, B.Sc., of Boston; Chipman H. and W. Errol, electrical engineers at Siscoe, Quebec. Miss Helen Seeley of Boston and Miss Margaret Seeley, B.A., of this city. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

## ALLAN DUNBAR, 24, COMMITS SUICIDE DEVON THIS MORN

Death Instantaneous As  
4.10 Shot Charge  
Entered Heart

### Left Note

Coroner, R. C. M. P.  
Called; Decide In-  
quest Unnecessary

Almost in the presence of two customers, Allan Dunbar, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lorne Dunbar, North Devon shot himself through the heart shortly after twelve o'clock today with a 4.10 gauge shotgun, in a back room of Art's Service Station, South Devon, where he was employed. The two terrified customers, John Neill and Ronald Mabie, a cousin of Dunbar, who were in the office of the building, rushed into the back room at the sound of a shot and a scream and found Dunbar in a moaning, crumpled heap in a coal-bin, a suicide note at his side.

Corporal L. P. Ryder and Const. Kenneth Ackman, R.C.M.P., and Coroner Dr. Chas. MacKay were immediately called. The body was lifeless at the time Dr. MacKay arrived. The coroner stated that death was almost instantaneous and that as the death was plainly self inflicted, no inquest will be necessary.

In speaking to the Press, Mounted Police stated that the deceased borrowed the gun this morning, saying he was going to shoot a skunk. Later he is reported to have asked a friend if he thought it would shoot a man. The friend stated innocently that he thought it would.

Shortly after noon Ronald Mabie stopped to get gas and oil. While he was there John Neill, Devon, also stopped at the station for a parcel of butter left there for him. The deceased asked Mabie to give Neill the parcel, and saying, "just a minute," stepped out into the back room. Mabie rushed into the room at the sound of the report and scream, followed by Neill. The gun was lying across his legs, life was not totally extinct.

### Asked No 'Pity'

In the note, which was addressed to his employer, Arthur Voyer, he stated that he planned the deed for tonight. For some reason, he apparently decided to get it over with. He spoke of his life, having no regrets, and asked that no one pity him. The note further expressed his thanks to his employer for his kindness.

Dr. MacKay stated that the muzzle of the gun was held against the chest and the shot or ball whichever, penetrated the apex of the heart. No further investigation will be carried on other than determining the nature of the charge of the shell.

Besides his parents, he leaves to mourn three sisters the Misses Rhea, Shirley, and Exa Dunbar, and one brother, William, all at home.

## EDUCATION WEEK, BEGINNING SUNDAY FEATURES BROADCASTS, CHURCH SERVICES AND PROGRAMS IN THE SCHOOLS

Premier A. A. Dysart, Hon. A. P. Paterson, Dr. Fletcher Peacock, and Others Heard Over Provincial Stations; To Unveil Tablet in Memory Dr. B. C. Foster; Will Broadcast Morning Services From St. Anne's

Education week, February 6 to 12, beginning tomorrow, will be observed by city schools and churches in connection with the Dominion wide program of the week that is devoted to the furtherance of learning. A broadcast from St. Anne's Parish Church tomorrow morning, in which Ven. Archdeacon S. C. Gray will speak, will inaugurate the week in this city. Broadcasts by Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier and minister of public works; Hon. A. P. Paterson, minister of education, and others will also feature the week.

An outstanding feature of observance of the week in this city will be the unveiling of a tablet in Fredericton High School on Friday afternoon in memory of the late Dr. B. C. Foster, principal of the high school for many years and one of the province's outstanding educationalists. The tablet is being erected by the New Brunswick Teachers' Association and will be unveiled by Miss Pearl Ross, member of the executive of the Fredericton district.

### To Address Teachers

The Fredericton Teachers' Association will meet on Friday evening when Dr. W. C. Kierstead, dean of the Arts Faculty at the University of New Brunswick will address the meeting on "Democracies, and Socialistic and Communistic States in the World Affairs."

In the city schools programs have been arranged by the different teachers. Readings will be given on the week, the virtues of education and its progress through the centuries, and other matters appropriate to the time. Dr. Fletcher Peacock, director of educational services for New Brunswick, will speak in St. Paul's United Church tomorrow and will address schools at Edmundston and Woodstock during next week.

On Monday evening a broadcast on the coast to coast network of the CBC will be heard from 9.30 to 10 o'clock, A.S.T., in which A. C. Lewis, president of the Canadian Teachers' Association will be special speaker. At 6.15 Monday, the Minister of Education will speak from Saint John while at 7.30 p.m. Tuesday, Most Rev. John A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, will be heard over the local station.

### Premier to Speak

Wednesday evening at 7.30 p.m., the Saint John station will feature an address by His Excellency, the Most Rev. P. J. Bray, C.J.M. Premier A. A. Dysart will deliver an address over CKCW, Moncton, on Friday evening (Continued on Page Five)

## DELEGATION RE AMHERST FAIR LEAVES TODAY

Hon. A. C. Taylor Will  
Join Deputation;  
Seek \$50,000 Grant

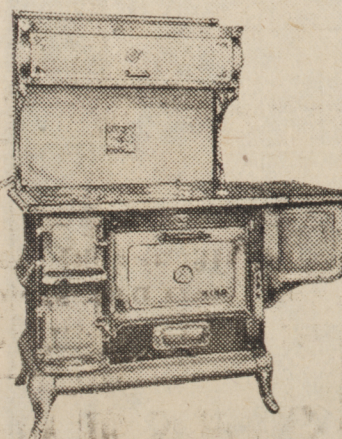
C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, this city, and president of the Maritime Stockbreeders' Association and Maritime Winter Fair, left for Ottawa today, heading a delegation which will approach the Federal government in connection with the proposed grant to the Amherst Fair. Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture for the province is a member of the delegation, while Hon. J. A. MacDonald, minister of agriculture for Nova Scotia, is unable to go because of the sittings of the Rowell Commission in Nova Scotia at the present time.

The three Maritime provinces have already pledged joint support to the extent of \$30,000 over a period of ten years providing the Dominion government will contribute \$50,000. The money will be devoted to enlarging accommodations for livestock at the fair.

Other members of the deputation are Hon. W. H. Dennis, minister of agriculture for P.E.I.; J. A. Hanway, K.C., and Mayor M. J. Kauffman, Amherst, representing the town of Amherst; Kenneth Cochrane, M.P. for Cumberland, N. S., who will introduce the delegation; H. R. Emerson, M.P. for Westmorland; W. G. Clark, M.P. for York-Sunbury; A. W. MacKenzie, manager of the Winter Fair, and livestock breeders who will stop over in Ottawa on their way to Toronto to attend meetings of the various Canadian breeders associations, later in the week. The three members from the Maritimes, Mr. Clark, Mr. Cochrane and Mrs. Emmerson, are already in Ottawa and will join the deputation there.

No statement could be secured today on the prospects facing the delegation. Mr. Bailey expects to return to this city immediately after the delegation is heard but may be forced to go to Toronto to attend the livestock meetings.

## GENERAL DAIRIES SAFE OPENED AND LOOTED IN NIGHT

Employee Discovers the  
Theft at About 3:00  
O'Clock

\$90 Stolen

No Evidence of Break-  
ing Into Building;  
Window Open

Fredericton, long suffering beneath the tyranny of nocturnal burglars, fell prey to safe crackers for the first time last night, when entrance was made in one of the city's leading business establishments on King Street, and the safe opened and looted of something over \$90 in cash.

According to information available today, John McGinnis, an employee of the business went in to the building at approximately 3 a.m. to use the phone and found the safe opened. He immediately called the manager, John McMinniman to the scene. Police were called in this morning.

Although one window on the first floor of the building was found open this morning by City Police, there is no evidence that entrance was made by this means. The safe, which was locked last evening, was opened by means of the combination and not forced.

It is understood that fingerprints were taken by Corporal Tozer, R.C.M.P. finger expert, who is co-operating on the matter. A few milk tickets were also reported missing from the safe.

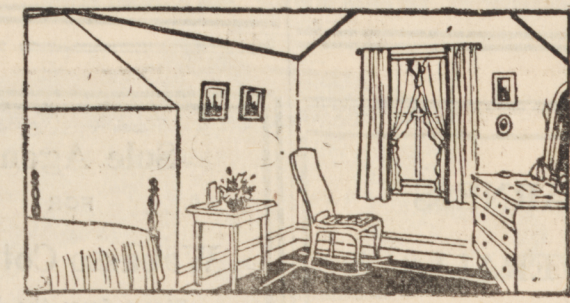
