his end of the county, and some farmers got \$1.15 a barrel for number ones and twos delivered at the warehouse, while Mr. Perry had received \$1.25 a barrel delivered at the warehouse. Farmers had always been able to sell certified seed potatoes. He did not know how the people of Carleton County would exist without raising potatoes. They were told to go in for mixed farming, but owing to their standard of living, which was high, it was necessary for them to continue growing potatoes and markets for their potatoes should be found.

He suggested that the markets for bacon hogs be extended. This would particularly benefit Carleton County, which was the banner county in this class of production. He congratulated Hon. Mr. Taylor for his bonus on bacon hogs and said this had helped out greatly in Carleton County. He suggested that the larger markets for bacon could be secured in Great Britain. The market in England is a help, and anything that can be done to improve the breed of the bacon hog and the market would be appreciated and credit would be given the Government for whatever might be done along these lines.

Mr. Perry stated that while he had been ill and surrounded by doctors and nurses that he had received a great shock. That shock was caused by the report that there was to be an election this year. He did not think that the people of the province wanted an election in 1938 or 1939. He believed that they were contented to allow things to stand as they are at present.

He claimed that the burden of the road construction would fall upon the farmers and would be a noose around their neck for years to come. He did not see how the tourists could be held up to pay the cost of road construction. Mr. Perry neglected to state that the use of the highways was not confined to the tourists but the highways of the province were for the benefit of the farmers, the merchants and others who live in this province and who have to use the roads to get from place to place. He did not seem to appreciate the fact that hard surfaced roads have come to stay and that whilst people may make brick without straw they cannot make roads without money no matter what party may have the making of them.

Jap Decision Could Upset Balance Of Power in Pacific

WASHINGTON, March 3 — Naval experts are predicting a new type of pocket battleship of from ten to eighteen thousand tons. This it is predicted will come as the result of the Anglo-American-French talks, which were recently held in London.

This would be a reply to Japan's decision to build super cruisers in defiance of former agreements among the great powers. The Japanese decision could quite possibly upset the balance of power in the Pacific.

Fire in Basement

The fire was held in the basement and did not get through the floor. Fire damage was mostly confined to burned timbers and beams in the basement, and the under side of the ground floor. Considerable smoke and water damage was done the restaurant, and also the plant offices of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, which are situated upstairs in the building. The wall at the back of the restaurant was opened by firemen to check the blaze from eating its way up the wall.

Traffic on Queen Street detoured through the roadway in front of the Customs House to keep away from the line of hose from that street. Another line was brought from King Street.

Damage caused by the fire will be in the vicinity of \$5,000 it is expected. The loss is partially covered by insurance.
