

SAINT JOHN TAKES SECOND PLACE BERTH

ST. CROIX COMES FROM BEHIND IN THE THIRD PERIOD ON OWN SHEET AND DOWNS CAPITALS WITH 6-5 TALLY

Capitals Build up Lead in First Two but Dropped On McNichol and Camyre's Play; Young Out For a Minute; Gill and Innes Tangled Briefly

ST. STEPHEN, Feb. 1.—The St. Croix Maple Leafs came from behind here last night to knock the Fredericton Capitals out of second place in the Southern N. B. Hockey League by a 6-5 decision, as Saint John Beavers defeated Moncton Maroons 3-2 at Saint John in overtime.

The St. Croix entered the final period one goal down to Capitals and it was not until less than four minutes before the end that the locals notched the tying marker, going on to win less than two minutes from the end with their sixth goal. Young, the Caps' goalie, was struck in the throat by the puck from Lowe's stick in the third period but was able to continue after a couple of minutes out.

Gill and Innes traded a few punches in the second. Gill charged Innes with a high stick and Jimmy started to tangle with the big fellow. No damage was done. Gill was given a major for his part in the fray and Innes was given two minutes.

With three goals and two assists, Ernie Camyre led the Leafs to their sparkling victory.

Two of Camyre's goals tied the game up and he assisted MacNichol in scoring the winning counter in the final period.

The other scoring points between the teams were evenly divided.

Caps Take Lead

Fredericton took the lead from the nine-minute mark in the first period when Haining rifled MacLenahan's pass behind Coffey. A little more than two minutes later Lifford made it 2-0 for the Caps when he went up on a power play with Morehouse and Keenan. The latter two started the play in their own territory, carried through and the final pass came to Lifford, who made no mistake. Camyre's goal saved St. Croix a shut-out in the first when he raided with Innes and caught Young off guard with a beautiful shot.

Desantel tied the count in 38 seconds of the second period when he breezed through the Fredericton ranks alone and fired a hard shot at Young. The Caps took the lead when MacLenahan and Dora Doucet started

a passing bout with Haining. The latter got his stick on the disc and planted it in the mesh back of Coffey.

Lifford then put Fredericton well in the lead when he took Keenan's pass and rushed in to beat Coffey.

MacNichol, Leaf centre, got one of the goals back when he went up with Innes and Camyre. The latter started the play and Innes relayed the pass over on the end of MacNichol's stick. The former St. Andrews Senator sent a sizzler into Young's cage.

Camyre Knots Count

It was at the 12:36 mark in the period that Camyre tied it up. Lowe and MacNichol were in on the play with him and they passed the Fredericton defence. When Camyre got the puck he ragged it for several seconds and then sent a back-hander past Young.

Morehouse put the Capitals one up two minutes from the end when he went through the St. Croix ranks to plant a high shot in Coffey's cage.

The third was a tough session and the teams battled back and forth on even terms. She break came to Camyre, Doucet and Lowe combined. They rushed toward the Fredericton goal, Lowe carrying in and passing the rubber to Ev Doucet, the latter laying down a perfect pass for Camyre and for the second time in the game the left-winger knotted the count.

The Caps battled valiantly to take the play away from the St. Croix but the Leafs had suffered too many defeats at the hands of the Gillmen to be denied. They rushed and hammered at the Caps' defence and with one minute and 10 seconds to go their efforts were rewarded.

MacNichol and Camyre rushed goalward and the left-winger tossed the pass at MacNichol and the centre picked his spot and beat Young for the winning counter.

Thursday night the St. Croix will be at home to the second place Saint John Beavers. Fredericton Caps play in Moncton on Wednesday night. If they can trim the Maroons they will be back in second place.

He is managed by Joe Jacobs, who also handles Max Schmeling, which means that the Night Stick is getting plenty of handling. He will be maneuvered in and out and around and about until anything may happen—including a decided over-match for himself any time now.

BEAVERS CLAMP DOWN ON JAMESMEN IN OVERTIME TO TAKE WELL EARNED WIN AND SECOND PLACE BERTH AT 3-2


Captain "Swede" Olsen's Goal in Closing Seconds Of Overtime Brings Victory; Large Crowd Sees Wide Variety of Hockey; Penalties Common

SAINT JOHN, Feb. 1.—Captain "Swede" Olsen rifled his second goal of the contest here last night as George Harris 18 seconds before closing time to boost the Beavers right back into second place in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League with a 3-2 overtime victory the league-leading Moncton Maroons.

The largest crowd of the season was treated to the choicest and widest variety of hockey dished up on a local ice surface for many moons as the revamped Beavers took the edge on two occasions, first in the second period and again in the third only to have Hal Ingram and Babe LeBlanc close the gap with fast-breaking plays. Olsen's tally coming from a passout on a face-off seconds before the final whistle in the overtime session provided the dramatic climax.

High feeling, noticeable from the first face-off, came to a head four minutes from regulation closing time as Dave Pickard and Powers were thumbed for throwing punches near the Beaver net. The game was held up for several minutes while referees attempted to reason with the contestants and Reese Dickie took the rap for Powers as the Toronto centre was taken to the dressing room for repairs. Clearing of glass and other missiles from the ice also held up the game on several occasions as spectators heaved bottles on the playing surface.

Powers after proving an elusive target for marking Beavers and defensive scoring threat in the opening minutes of play assumed the bad man role as Gordon Marshall was thrown



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
