New Brunswick Protestant Orphans' Home

January 31, 1938.

TO THE PROTESTANT PEOPLE OF NEW BRUNSWICK:
LADIES, GENTLEMEN AND CHILDREN:—

On May 1, 1930, Your Home did not owe one cent. In the five years between May 1, 1930, and May 1, 1935, You allowed a Bank Overdraft for Maintenance of \$42,000.00 to accumulate against Your Home. League of Nations Executive Meeting

A regular meeting of the Executive of the League of Nations Society took place yesterday at five p.m. in the Mayor's Office, with Dr. F. J. Toole in the chair.

A report was made of the recent visit to Fredericton of Dr. H. L. Stewart of Dalhousie University and satisfaction was expressed at the large turnout to hear his address.

The secretary reported on the questionnaire recently circulated by the society. Approximately 500 copies were distributed to the members of the society and through the corporate members. 86 answers were received or slightly better than 1 to 6. A tabulation of the results was as follows:

Do you feel that Canadian should refrain from buying Japanese goods? 73 yes, 9 no.

Are you in favour of a boycott of Japanese goods in Fredericton? 61 yes, 20 no.

Do you feel that before taking public action in Fredericton we should wait for the Dominion Government to act? Yes 32, no 49.

Do you favour the imposition by the Dominion government of an embargo on the export from Canada of war materials to Japan? 76 yes, 3 no.

It was decided to have the annual meeting of the Society on Monday evening Feb. 21st to hear a report of the activities of the year and for the election of officers.

A report was made by Mr. Thurrott in regard to the Model League of Nations which will be held in Fredericton this year under the auspices of U.N.B. The meeting expressed their sympathy with the work being carried on and left over till next meeting the question of just what assistance could be given.

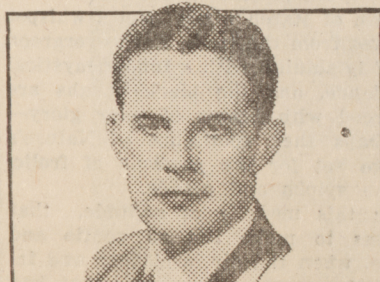
Resolutions Passed

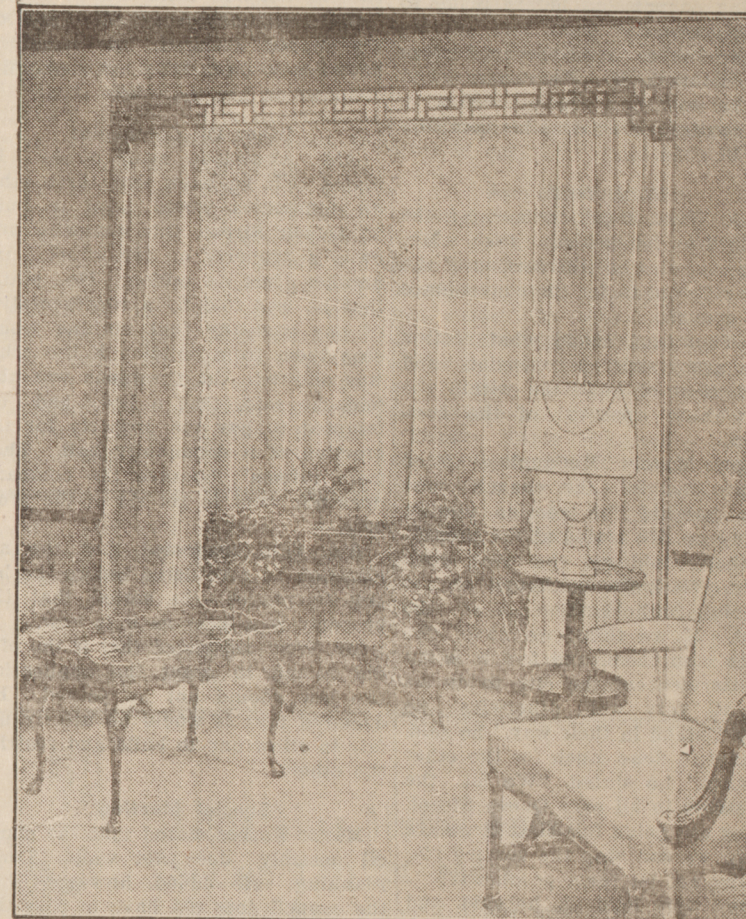

Sunlight or Moonlight Now Come Into Living Room At Flick of Switch

A fresh note of modernism is injected into this Chinese Chippendale living room through the installation of a concealed lighting unit recessed behind the curtains. The effect produced is that of warm sunlight streaming through the window.

THERE seems to be simply no limit to the ingenuity of these lighting people nowadays. A press of a button, and they give you daylight, sunlight, or moonlight at any hour of the day or evening—right in your own living room. And it's almost laughably simple!

Lighting panels built into hidden places produce the effect. They are often used over the latest kitchen sinks, although in such cases, ordinary colorless bulbs are employed. Recently this type of lighting has become quite popular in living rooms, particularly where there is a bay window.

Easily Installed

The lighting unit itself consists of a metal box, approximately thirty inches long, six inches wide, and seven inches high. It contains three 40- or 60-watt bulbs, depending upon whether you have light or dark shades. The amount and color of light desired also determines the number of bulbs. Flashed opal glass is used at the bottom of the unit to diffuse and soften the light.

There are two ways of installing

such a unit, which is a regulation fixture, obtainable at many electrical stores. When built into a new house, it is recessed into the ceiling, adjacent to the window. In a house that has been already built, two polished metal reflectors containing 60-watt lamps can be mounted between the over-drapes and the glass curtains. These reflectors are also standard equipment, easily installed by your electrical contractor.

Choice of Colors

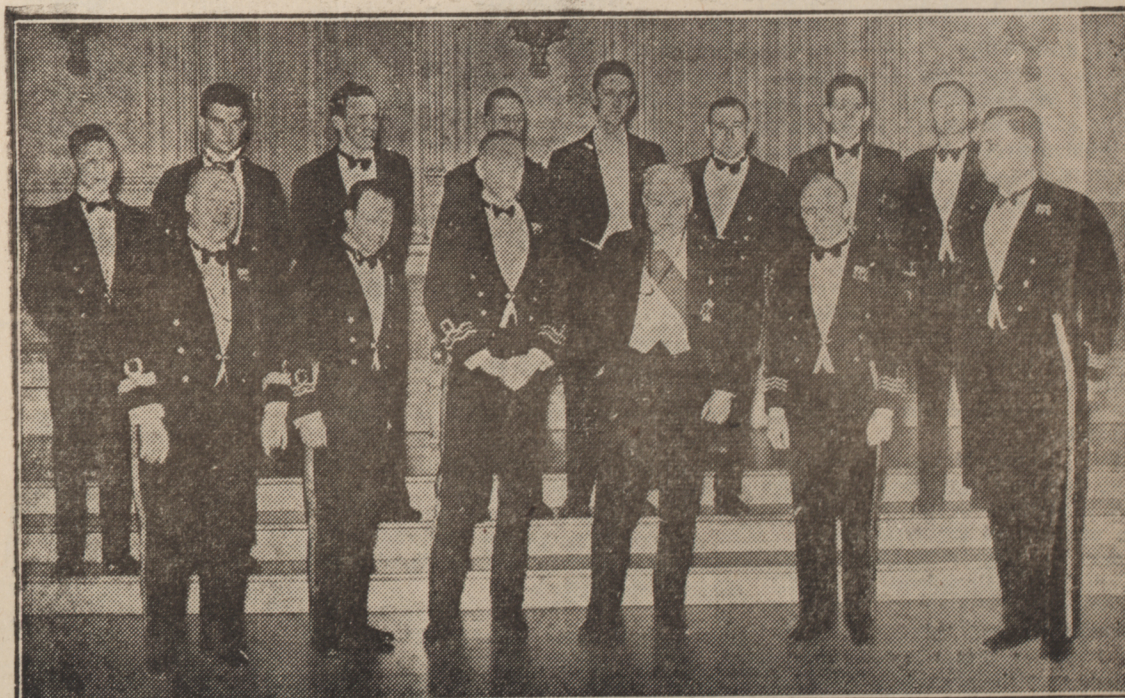
Where there is no space between the draperies and curtains, a row of small 10-watt bulbs or several luminaire lamps may be mounted behind the valance or curtain cornice. The wiring can be so arranged that a choice of colored light is simply a matter of which switch is pressed. In these modern times, there's no need to permit the original architectural limitations of a room to stand in the way of modernity. And you'll find that the modest investment yields ample dividends in the added enjoyment you derive from your home.
