Minto Welfare Council And Credit Unions

A large and appreciative audience attended the meeting held under the auspices of the Welfare Council, Minto, in the Memorial Hall just recently. The object of the meeting was to discuss the Credit Union movement by the representatives of the different nationalities that go to make up the Minto population. The speaker for the occasion was Rev. R. B. Fraser, M.A., who gave the history of the Co-operative movement from the time of Robert Owen and Rochdale in England down to the present day. Pamphlets dealing with the movement and published by the Department of Agriculture were distributed to all present. A motion was passed authorizing the Welfare Council to carry on with the establishment of Study Clubs until the time when W. S. Keohan, B.A., Registrar Credit Union Act, Fredericton, will address the citizens of Minto.

The committee in charge at the present time are Thomas Crawford, President, John Watson, Vice-President, John Patterson, Secretary, A. D. Hart, Treasurer, Rev. R. B. Fraser, Rev. Samuel Steeves, Joseph Paul, Arthur Ouellette, and Thomas Jones. The next regular meeting will take place on the third Monday of March. Minto will be divided into sections and study clubs will be inaugurated at each station. With the assistance of the Provincial government and the active executive bodies the Co-operative movement is destined to make rapid progress in our native province, Mr. Fraser stated.

UNDERSTANDING FEB. 12 BETWEEN SCHUSCHNIGG AND HITLER UNDONE

VIENNA, March 10.—Disorders in Graz and Vienna and a threat of possible Nazi terrorism were precipitated today by the sudden call for a plebiscite Sunday on the issue of Austrian independence.

More than 40 persons were injured in clashes and the dread words "civil war" were heard in Graz, Nazi stronghold, as the plebiscite campaign opened with intensive propaganda, parades and exhortations.

Austrian Nazis were in a sullen, angry mood, as they waited for word from Berlin before determining the definite attitude they would adopt for Sunday.

Wilhelm Keppler, German state secretary, flew from Berlin for a conference with Arthur Seyss-Inquart, interior minister, and then flew back and two other Nazis hurried to Berlin to report on the situation.

As the threat of possible Nazi sabotage and terrorism was mooted in high quarters, three possibilities were mentioned:

1. Nazis might try by force to keep von Schuschnigg's supporters from voting.
2. They might boycott the plebiscite.
3. They might continue their activities before and after Sunday as though nothing had happened.

The situation was admitted fraught with danger, especially in Vienna, where at least 11 persons were injured, and Graz. Police leaves in both cities were cancelled.

In the Styrian capital, 17 Nazis were slightly injured in street fights, 12 others were hurt by police clubs. A new note in the bedlam "Heil Hitler!" and "Heil Schuschnigg!" shouts was an occasional cry of "Heil Moscow!"

They charged Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg, by calling for a vote on his policy of Austrian independence against further German encroachments broke the understanding reached with Chancellor Hitler of Germany Feb. 12, in their Berchtesgaden conference.

Under that understanding, Austria's cabinet was reorganized to include five ministers favorable to Germany; political prisoners, including Nazis, were released, and restrictions on the outlawed Nazi party were eased.

(Nazi officials in Berlin were annoyed by von Schuschnigg's move while a Vienna Zeitung reported that Joseph Leopold, Austrian Nazi leader, had been made a member of Hitler's personal staff. The report said Hitler desired the Austrian "as one of the most faithful and best experts on Austrian questions to be in his immediate vicinity during the ensuing month, when events of historic importance will transpire.")

The government broadcasting station interrupted programs frequently with the spoken slogan: "Austrian independence and Austrian freedom are involved. Therefore vote 'Yes.'"

Thousands of handbills exhorting the people to vote for a free Austria, littered Vienna's streets, sometimes to a depth of a foot.

The Fatherland Front continued to make strong bids for the support of workers and socialists. Statements by labor leaders indicated the workers would be almost solidly behind the government unless something should occur before Sunday to force a break.
