it has as its objective the placement of each man and woman in his or her destined niche.

Therefore I say, the old academic mold of education is insufficient. We must be practical. We must pursue a policy of planning, guiding, training and placing our people in employment to enable them to enjoy the comforts of life and at the same time promote the greatest measure of social and economic co-operation for the good of the whole province.

This objective is possible, however, only when our people accept without reservation the principle that one occupation is as honorable and useful as another. We cannot all be scientists because nature did not equip all of us with the mental requirements to delve into obscure problems. Nor can we all be fishermen or farmers because all of us are not endowed with the skill and the brawn and the natural gift to carry on these pursuits successfully. But the scientist cannot live, thrive and pursue his studies without the assistance of the farmer and the fisherman. Nor can the farmer and fisherman make progress without the contribution of the scientist.

I use this illustration as one of thousands to demonstrate the insufficiency of any individual without the assistance and co-operation of his neighbor. The people as a whole cannot do without the farmer, the fishermen or the scientist.

As I have said, it must be our objective to place each individual in his or her proper niche and as opportunities for employment in specific lines diminish or disappear with progress and improvement we must be prepared to re-equip those thrown out of employment to follow other lines.

Work is a fundamental requirement not only to enable us to buy the things to eat and to wear but it is necessary to the peace and happiness of the individual. Without honest work there can be no happiness and the impulse to seek work and to secure the necessary training to equip one for the work to which he or she is best adapted, is an essential foundation for progressive educational development.

In such circumstances we will have a government willing to co-operate to the fullest in the best interests of the public and a people ready to be guided in the best interests of themselves and of their province. Personally, I feel that we are on the right path and it is my conviction that the people appreciate our diligence and sincerity. I trust that we may work together vigorously and continuously toward the goal I have outlined.

alignments at this point. The work will last about ten days.

Rapid Progress

The span erection of the new C.N.R. bridge across the St. John River here is progressing rapidly, only one span remaining on which no work has been done. This is span number 5, and work on this last span is expected to commence soon. It is expected that the completed bridge will be ready for the first run by spring.

The Oromocto C.N.R. bridge which is under repair at the present time will be completed in about two weeks' time, it is expected.

At Newcastle

The pivot pier of the draw span of the Sinclair bridge across the Miramichi River at the Newcastle town limits, on route No. 8 from Newcastle to Quarryville and Fredericton, now is being repaired, necessitating the closing of the bridge to all traffic.

Two detours are available to motor traffic from Chatham and Newcastle to join route No. 8 at Quarryville, one by way of the Redbank road to Redbank and then by the Warwick river to Nelson, Chelmsford and across the Quarryville bridge to join route No. 8 at that point. An ice road has been marked also around the bridge, and landings provided on each bank, but motorists and heavy loaded teams will use this ice road at their own risk, it was stated. The bridge will be closed for about three weeks while undergoing repairs.

C. N. E. to Try to Get 1942 Empire Games

TORONTO, Feb. 11—General-manager Ellwood Hughes of the Canadian National Exhibition said today he understood Montreal and Calgary, in addition to Toronto, were interested in the possibility of staging the 1942 British Empire games.

"The C. N. E. is definitely interested," he added. "We think we could stage in Toronto the greatest sporting event ever held in Canada. But certainly everything must be left until the Canadian officials return from Sydney and the committee meets."

The 1942 games were awarded Canada today by the British Empire Games Federation, meeting at Sydney.
