LOUIS - LEWIS
TITLE BOUT TO
BE HEARD ON CBC

TORONTO, January 23 — The world's heavyweight championship fight between Joe Louis, the title holder, and John Henry Lewis, world's light heavyweight champion, will be described over the national network of CBC on Wednesday, January 25, as a sustaining exchange feature with the NBC.

A blow-by-blow account of the 15-pound battle at Madison Square Garden in New York, beginning at 11.00 p.m. AST, will be given by Clem McCarthy, NBC sport reporter. Edwin C. Hill, commentator and newspaper writer, will give the between-rounds colour. The meeting will mark the fifth time the Brown Bomber has defended his title.

Both fighters are now training for the fight. Louis is going through his paces at Mme. Boy's training camp in Summit, N. J., and Lewis is preparing for the championship battle at Dr. Bier's camp in Tompion Lakes, N. J.

The colored champions have established enviable records in their respective divisions. The light heavyweight champion has never been knocked out, although he has lost on decisions. Joe Louis has met with one knockout, that at the hands of Max Schmeling.

DUTCH CELLIST
WILL CONDUCT
AT TORONTO

TORONTO, January 23—Dr. Hans Kindler, Dutch cellist and permanent conductor of the National Symphony Orchestra, Washington, D. C., will be guest conductor with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra for the broadcast concert, Tuesday, January 24, 10.30 to 11.30 p.m. AST. The programme, to be played before an audience in Massey Hall, Toronto, will be heard over the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. It will present a Suite by Corelli and Symphony No. 7 in A major, Opus 92, by Beethoven.

Dr. Hans Kindler had his earliest musical training in the city of his birth, Rotterdam, Holland. At 18 he was appointed to the teaching staff of Scharwenke Conservatory, Berlin, having made his debut as a 'cellist with the Berlin Philharmonic the year before. He came to the United States in 1914, and was first 'cellist of the Philadelphia Orchestra until 1920. For ten years he devoted his time to the concert stage, appearing with the leading orchestras of America and Europe. He is now a permanent resident of Washington where he conducts the National Symphony Orchestra, which he founded.
