Halifax Negros Sentenced

Tripled today on charges of theft from the store of Oliver Scott at Lincoln and damaging school property at Lower Lincoln, two Halifax Negro youths, Kenneth and David Siscoe, 17 and 18 respectively, were sentenced to three months in the first charges and one month on the charge of damaging property. The sentences, which were imposed by Magistrate Harold Kimball at Oromocto, will run concurrently. The two youths will be confined in the Sunbury County Jail. The charges were laid by R. C. M. P. of the Fredericton Detachment. C. F. Tweeddale of this city prosecuted the case.

MARYSVILLE
HEARS TOURING
GUEST SPEAKER

Rover Scouts At Special Service at St. Pauls

Rev. Karam Guergis, a native of Mesopotamia now residing at Toronto, was guest speaker at the Marysville United Church last evening. Using as his text, "If I be lifted up I will draw all men unto Me," Rev. Mr. Guergis pointed out the universal appeal of the Gospel and stressed the contribution to Christianity of the East. The speaker is touring the Maritime Provinces while delivering a series of lectures on Mesopotamia. He will give an illustrated lecture on the Garden of Eden at St. Paul's United Church Tuesday evening.

Rev. W. K. Pace conducted the morning services at Marysville United Church, speaking on "Wilderness Findings." He spoke of adversity as a better teacher than prosperity, showing that the Children of Israel while in the wilderness learned of the True God, rediscovered a sense of moral reality and a high sense of duty and purpose in life.

Fredericton Rover Scouts attended the morning services at Wilnot United Church, accompanied by Scout Commissioner G. Alvah Good and Professor Pugh. Rev. W. Fraser Munro conducted both morning and evening services. At the morning services Rev. Mr. Munro spoke on Christian Preparedness, and in the evening his topic was "Silver Wings." A number of questions on spiritual problems were answered by the Minister during the Question Box period at the evening service. This was the second week for the Question Box idea which has shown an appeal for members of the congregation.

The first week night meeting of the Wilnot Brotherhood will be held in the Church Hall tonight. The floor has been prepared for shuffleboard which will be enjoyed by the members at the conclusion of the meeting. These meetings are planned fortnightly during the winter.

Jap Brushes Deal in Death

One Death in States From Use Japanese Shaving Brush

Some In Canada

Believe None Came To N. B.; Officers Are All Warned

With one death in the United States traced to infection from the use of Japanese made shaving brushes infected with the deadly anthrax germs and a warning sent to all health departments in the Dominion concerning the fact that some brushes have been shipped to Western Canada, Dr. William Warwick, chief medical health officer for the province today set in motion an investigation to determine whether this province is endangered.

All health officers in the province have been warned, and Ottawa has been requested to trace the shipments to Canada to determine whether any of the infected brushes came to New Brunswick.

It is not known how many of the brushes are in this country but it is believed some were sent to Western Canada. It is believed the brushes were made from the bristles of animals suffering from anthrax, a splenic fever of sheep and cattle. A malignant pustule is caused in humans by infection from animals with the disease.

Government officials would not say from which country the brushes were shipped here but it is known they originated in Japan. They were advised of the existence of the brushes and passed on their information to the provincial health departments who are expected to take all steps necessary for the protection of the public.

Officials of the department of national revenue are also working on the case, tracing the shipments in this country.

In the United States, Dr. Thomas Parron, surgeon-general of the health service has requested an embargo on all Japanese-made shaving brushes as the result of a death U. S. authorities have traced to one.

United States collectors of customs at all ports of entry had been asked to bar such brushes until adequate samples had been tested at the National Institute of Health.

Tests of several samples from a large shipment of shaving brushes made in Japan disclosed, the surgeon-general said, that "not only were they not sterilized against anthrax, but were not sterilized at all." Officials of states in which that shipment was distributed have been advised to seize the brushes, he said.

Dr. Parron said the death occurred in North Dakota and was due to anthrax infection traced to a brush from the shipment.

Dr. Warwick today expressed the opinion that this province was not in danger. In the first place, everyone who uses a Japanese brush may not be infected, and secondly it is unlikely that any of the brushes reached this province.

In the use of one of the infected brushes, the contracting of the deadly germ would have to be through a cut or abrasion on the skin surface. Dr. Warwick stated that there is no danger of infection from an old brush that has been in use for some time, but pointed out that the people of the province would do well in being careful when purchasing such articles in the future.

No One Wants Mayor's
Job in Marysville,
Nomination Day Shows

Four Aldermen Will Be Elected By Acclamation On Saturday -- No One Offers For Mayor's Seat -- Report Mayor Long May Be Asked to Offer But General Opinion Sees Refusal

The people of the Town of Marysville were in a quandary today. They had a town council but no chief magistrate.

With nomination day in the neighboring town on Saturday, four aldermanic posts were vacant and four men filed papers as candidates for the seats. They will be elected by acclamation on Saturday next, but no one filed paper for the mayor's office.

In Marysville today there was some talk about approaching the retiring mayor, P. G. Long and asking him to offer again. Mayor Long, however, made definite his intentions of retiring from civic administration some time ago, and although he was out of town on business today, it is believed that he would not accept nomination again.

There were a few in Marysville who doubted whether anyone would be found to accept the office. Whether this is so will be determined in a new election which will have to be called. If in this election no one offers there will be difficulties indeed.

In the nominations on Saturday, Frank Pickard will be elected by acclamation to serve for Ward 1, along with veteran councillors Irvine Gregory, who has another year to serve. In Ward 2, John Arnold will also go to the council by acclamation. Louis Titus, another year to serve, is the remaining councillor for this ward.

In Ward 3, Fred Meurling will be returned to the council by acclamation, and will be a seat-mate with Jacob Pine who has another year to serve. In Ward 4, Howard O'Donnell, a former councillor will be elected on Saturday and will serve with Alderman Cecil Daley.

Three aldermen, whose terms expired, H. K. Pettigrove, provincial fair wage officer, Ritchie Gorman and Merritt Ames, did not offer for re-election.

PROVINCE TO
OFFER NEW BOND
ISSUE AT ONCEDetails of Issue Not
Divulged

Although no details have been disclosed as to the extent of the issue or the rate of interest, Hon. C. T. Richard, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, announced last night that it is the intention of the provincial government to offer a new debenture issue immediately.

In view of the recognized sound financial condition of the province and the fact that for the second successive year the provincial government has brought in a surplus on current account, Mr. Richard expressed the opinion that the financial market will be responsive of the issue.

Under the Marysville electoral system, eight aldermen are elected for a two year term, the terms of four aldermen expire each year, thus necessitating the election of four aldermen annually. The Mayor is also elected for a two year term.

Population Growth
Shown By Lists

A marked increase in the population of the City of Fredericton is evident from the increased number of voters in the lists recently compiled for York County. Since the last lists were compiled in 1935 an increase of 1922 listed names has been noted for Fredericton. In York County 2380 names have been added to the voters' lists since 1935.

In 1935, 5215 voters were listed for Fredericton, including 2287 males and 2828 females. In 1938, the Fredericton total jumped to 7137, including 3292 males and 3845 females.

In York County the totals jumped from 19,240 in 1935 to 21,620 in 1938.
