CURRICULUM COMMITTEE MEETS

A meeting of the Curriculum Committee, appointed by the Department of Education to revise the course of studies for New Brunswick elementary grades, is being held today in the Corporations Committee room of the Legislative Building. Eighteen members of the committee are present. Dr. Fletcher Peacock, director of educational service for the province, Dr. A. S. McFarlane, chief superintendent of education, and W. K. Tibert, director of vocational work, are attending the meeting.

To Lay Cornerstone Of New Arena

Hon. John A. McDonald, minister of agriculture for Nova Scotia will lay the cornerstone of the new arena of the Maritime Winter Fair, at Amherst, on May 19. Announcement was made by C. F. Bailey, president of the Stock Breeders' Association and the Winter Fair.

The \$76,200 arena, which will have a maximum capacity of 5,000 people, is being built by M. R. Chappell, Sydney, N. S. Present plans call for its completion by next November for use in the 1939 fair. Slated to speak at the cornerstone laying ceremonies on the afternoon of May 19 are: Mr. McDonald, Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture for New Brunswick; Hon. William H. Dennis, minister of agriculture for Prince Edward Island, and Mayor M. J. Kaufman of Amherst. President Bailey will act as master of ceremonies.

TO LIGHT CLOCK ON CITY HALL

Fredericton's City Hall clock will get its front side lighted. The other sides will remain in darkness. The clock's face will be flood-lighted by neon signs and reflectors. The cost will be \$148.

According to the specifications, the face of the clock will be seen for a considerable distance.

Police Crack Wave Of Breaks

JUVENILE AGED 15 ADMITS DOZEN CITY BURGLARIES

Pleaded Guilty When Brought in Court Yesterday

Repeated "Visits"

Another Youth Faces Charges of Breaks On York Street

Fredericton police today had apparently cleared up the current wave of burglaries which in the past few weeks saw many business houses broken into.

In the prisoner's dock at the Police Court yesterday afternoon, a 16-year-old juvenile who because of his age is not named to the public, stood and pleaded to over a dozen charges of breaking and entering, and theft.

Another youth over the 17-year-old mark, which classes an offender as a juvenile, is in the cells of the police court today awaiting hearing and will be charged with breaking, entering, and theft from the shop of Ralph Shepherd on York Street. He is Gerrard Gallant of this city. Chief of Police Nathaniel Jones told the press Gallant was picked up last night.

The first youth, who is also a Fredericton boy, was remanded until Thursday, May 4, when he appeared before Magistrate Walter Limerick yesterday afternoon.

Among the places admittedly entered were: W. H. VanWart's, J. E. Cook's Store, Burt's Harness Shop, Ralph Shepherd's shop, W. C. Lee store, and the S.M.T. Bus Station. Some of the places named were admittedly entered on more than one occasion. In most of them, small quantities of money were taken, while the theft from the S.M.T. bus station amounted to a considerable sum.

ROUTINE HOLDS ATTENTION OF COUNCIL MEETING

City To Purchase 500 Tons Minto Coal At Once

Mostly routine business occupied the meeting of the Fredericton City Council last evening.

Tenders were opened for 500 tons of Minto coal. Tenders were as follows: Fredericton Fuel, F.O.B. Fredericton, \$4.75; Gilman Mine, \$4.75 per ton, delivered to bins; Jas. H. Wason, \$5.00 per ton; Hugh McMan, \$5.00; Geo. H. Miles, \$4.45, F.O.B. siding; M. G. Hanson, \$4.85 in bins; \$4.90 at siding; S. S. Baird, \$4.85 on track; \$5.20 in bins; Newcastle Coal Co., \$4.50 on track; \$4.75 screened, on track; Carleton Motors, \$4.75 F.O.B. city.

On motion of Ald. Croydson seconded by Ald. Forbes the council decided to accept the tender of the Newcastle Coal Co. for screened coal at \$4.75 per ton, F.O.B. Fredericton.

An application was received from Fred G. McLean to erect a sign at the "Von" Apartments. Permission was granted.

It was decided to take a full-page "ad" in the Fredericton Exhibition prize list.

A communication was received from R. P. Gorham concerning damage being done his University Avenue property by a flood drain. On motion the matter was left with the City Engineer with power to act.

A letter signed by the taxpayers of Alexander Street brought the matter of paving that street to the attention of the public. The feeling of the council was that other older streets in the city should be given first consideration in the matter of paving.

The matter of new regulations adopted by S.M.T. in operation of buses was discussed. Ald. Mungle asked about bus parking on Queen Street. The situation was now improved, Ald. Good said.

"That place by the bus station won't look very good to the King and Queen," one Alderman remarked. (Continued on Page Five)

MAYORS DISLIKE ONTARIO'S RULE OF FEDERATION

May Form Maritime Or N. B. Federation of Chief Magistrates

Meet at Saint John

Disinterest In Problems of Maritimes Will Divorce Group

An alleged lack of interest on behalf of the collective body of the Federation of Mayors in anything Maritime, and the domination of the annual convention by Ontario, may lead to the severing of the Maritimes from the group—and in the belief of one of the Fredericton aldermen, the financial ruin of the Canadian federation.

Reporting on the 1939 convention held at Ottawa, Mayor C. Hedley Forbes declared last night that the meeting was run by Ontario, that their majority allowed the passage of resolutions which were of interest to Central Canada and which had little effect on the Maritimes, while at the same time resolutions put before the federation by the Maritimes were changed or voted down by Central Canada and the West.

"We have problems down here they don't seem to know we have at all," the Mayor said. He stated that the Maritime members came back here knowing little other than the problems of the western municipalities.

A meeting will be held at Saint John later this week between the Mayors of Fredericton, Saint John, and Moncton, to consider the formation of a New Brunswick or possibly a Maritime federation of mayors.

Mayor Forbes charged that matters brought up at the convention were of a local and not a national nature, and that the general opinion was that the Maritimes needed no consideration and that there are no problems here.

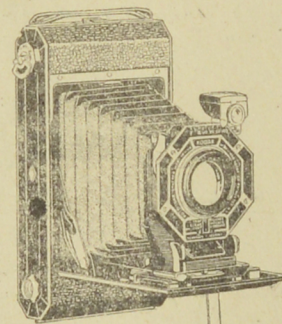

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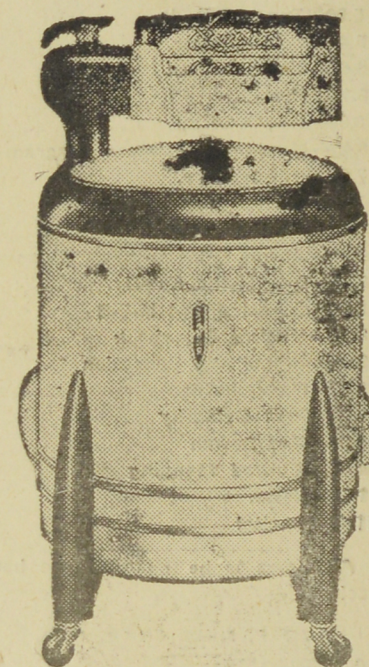
