## LOCALS BOW TO ST. ANDREWS SIX 6-5 IN LAST NIGHT'S GAME WHILE SUSSEX BLANKS BORDER OUTFIT 7-0

### Capitals Robbed of 6, All Draw by Fast Senator Defenceman, As Graham Sinks Winning Putt.

(ST. ANDREWS, N. B., Jan. 18.—St. Andrews Senators defeated Fredericton Capitals here last night 6-5 in a regular Southern League fixture.

The Senators played brilliant hockey in the first half of the game to bring up five counters, making the Capitals who came to the shiretown to "win with ease," look like every-thing but co-leaders in the Southern League. They were not in the picture in the first 30 minutes.

Jim Graham, stellar defenceman for the Senators, playing the full 80 minutes, was the individual star of the game. After Fredericton tied the score less than three minutes from the final bell, Graham, taking the puck in his own defence zone, skated the length of the ice with Capital players hanging all over and rounded the defence to bat the puck into the far corner of the net for the winning goal.

The entire Senator team played smart hockey, with Miller, H. McNichol, T. McNichol, R. Thomas, McFarlane and Graham, all scoring a goal apiece. Goodieill played a good game in the net and the goals that went by him were well earned.

Staples in the Capital net played a standout game and saved several sure scores when Senators broke through. "Manny" McIntyre, Keenan, Hafford and Cameron showed the best hockey for the visitors.

There were only four penalties in the game all served by the Capitals. But the Senators did not score when they had an advantage in man-power.

## Joe's No. 1 Enemy Not Schmeling But Bob Pastor

To look at him casually, one would never surmise the storm of pent-up emotion that sometimes seethes behind the dead-pan expression of Joe Louis. Even in the heat of battle against a man he dislikes as intensely as he dislikes Max Schmeling, the heavyweight champion's face never betrays his feelings.

It is only his speech that occasionally reveals the inner man and that is why we are able to disclose today that Joe's No. 1 enemy is not Schmeling but Bob Pastor, the heavyweight managed by Jimmy Johnston.

Joe's relationship with Schmeling was a Damon and Pythias affair compared with what he feels toward Pastor and you take Joe's word for it that if he ever gets Pastor in the ring with him again, he will slaughter the New Yorker.

You will remember that Pastor once made Joe look foolish. That was the time Bob climbed on a bike, as they say along cauliflower row, and kept Joe chasing him in vain for 10 rounds. The crowd jeered Joe and cheered Bob that time and Joe has never forgotten it.

The champion has a strange fierce pride in his workmanship and an even greater pride in his rise from the cotton fields to world-wide fame. Anyone who injures that pride hurts Joe in a vital spot. And that is actually what Pastor and his talkative manager did by making the champion appear ridiculous before the public.

That is why Joe is forever calling on Promoter Mike Jacobs to get him another shot at Pastor. Told that he was to fight John Henry Lewis, Joe's only comment was:

"Thass okay Uncle Mike but when does ah fight that man Pastor?"

He never lets up on Mike. Every time he meets the promoter, it's the same old story: "When does ah get Pastor?"

Joe is particularly bitter because he feels he could have stopped Pastor the first time if his trainer, Jack Blackburn, had let him fight the way he wanted. Joe revealed for the first time today just what happened in that fight.

"After the first round," he said, "I told Blackburn I could pin Pastor in a corner, rough him up some and finish him. But the crowd wuz yellin' for Pastor and Blackburn tells me to just go out there and keep on boxing. He wuz afraid if I roughed that Pastor up in a corner the crowd would get on me. But the next time ah'll sure rough him plenty and there may not be no second round."

Another lad who is due for a fast finish someday is Tommy Sarr, the Welsh heavyweight. He is no. 2 on Joe's list. However, Joe likes Tommy but he feels that Tommy is a piece of unfinished business. Tommy lasted 15 rounds with him and Joe feels somehow that was a blot on his championship record.

## JACOB'S BASEBALL EMPIRE CONTINUES

### Trustees Named To Handle Yankees

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—The mighty baseball empire constructed by Colonel Jacob Ruppert's millions will continue virtually unchanged with Edward G. Barrow, business manager of the club for 13 years, president of the New York Yankees.

Barrow was one of four trustees named in the Colonel's will, which was read today. He will serve with George E. Ruppert, brother of the late owner and chief trustee, retaining his post as vice-president and Al Brennan holding his office as treasurer.

The two other trustees are Frederick E. Grant, the Colonel's legal advisor, and Harry C. Sillick, Ruppert's brother-in-law.

## BOSTON NOSES TORONTO 2-1 IN TUSSLE AT HUB

### Drillon Adds Another To His Growing Goal String

BOSTON, Jan. 18.—Ray Getliffe's third-period goal broke up a deadlocked game last night and gave Boston Bruins a 2-1 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs in the night's only National Hockey League encounter. The victory before an overflow crowd of 16,000 persons strengthened Boston's hold on first place in the league, four points above the New York Rangers. It left the Leaf in fourth place in the standing.

Bruins had to come from behind to win. Gordie Drillon gave Toronto the lead early in the opening period when he slapped home Syl Apps' rebound as the climax of a five-man Toronto rush that gave Boston goalie Frank Brimsek no chance.

Boston's sauerkraut line from Kitchener, Ont., got back the goal in the same period after penalties had left Leafs playing four men against Boston's five. Milt Schmidt eased the rebound of Porky Dumart's ankle shot with Bobby Bate also coming in for an assist.

After a scoreless second period, Getliffe positioned from five feet out on a long forward pass that Wally Hall shot in from the left side of the Toronto blinding.

Plenty of rough play spotted the opening period, with Boston's Eddie Shore and Red Horner of Toronto adding to the fireworks by an exchange of punches after a bumping match. Both drew major penalties.

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## Pearce, With A Heart of Iron Stands Great Strain to Win Lou Marsh Memorial Award

Bobby Pearce, this year's choice for Lou Marsh Memorial trophy, will go down in Canadian sport history as the world champion who defended his title and overcame handicaps that to a lesser man might have resulted in a complete break-up.

But Pearce stood up under the terrific strain of the past summer and the fatal illness of his wife.... the responsibility of Baby Jack and Baby Jill at home asking for "Mother".... two little tots—now motherless.

Both Pearce and his wife knew that she wasn't to recover when she entered the hospital. Ahead of Bobby was the training for the defence of his world title. There isn't anything as sure and long as the grueling training required for sculling.

Did he quit? No! Did he falter? No! Neither did Mrs. Pearce. From her hospital bed she told Bobby to go ahead, train and win. Pearce did. He raced Evans Paddon, Australian challenger, into the backwash of his shell that cold day at the Exhibition.

At the start of the three-mile race that is the official distance for the professional sculling championship of the world, Pearce told his hand-lers.... "Today I am racing for my dead wife.... I have got to win.... I must!" He raced like that. He did win.

Who in that Exhibition grand stand by the water's edge will forget after that victory when Pearce backed his shell skillfully over to the landing stage, and his stepping out still only in his racing shorts how he reached up and took into his arms his two children—Jack and Jill, dressed alike in light blue. How they cried there in the sculler's powerful arms. How he wept too. How silent the stand was and how many eyes filled with tears at the sad sight of this great athlete with his family comforting him.
