ONE DECREE
GRANTED TODAY

Belyea Case is Stricken
From Docket; One
Other Heard

At this morning's session of the New
Brunswick Court of Divorce and Ma-
rimonial Causes, one decree of divorce
was ordered to issue, one suit was
stricken from the docket and another
case was taken under consideration of
the court.

A decree was granted in the case of
Marjorie Randall vs. Albert Charles
Randall, Saint John, while the case of
John Halbert Belyea vs. Verna May
Belyea, now Verna Mae Tremblay and
Alexander Tremblay, was stricken
from the docket. In the Randall case
two witnesses were heard, Margaret
Cassie, Moncton, and the plaintiff.

The seventh case on the docket, the
case of Harold Oland Douthwrite vs.
Beatrice Mary Douthwrite and George
McAuley, Moncton, heard two more
witnesses today, Rose Douthwrite of
Moncton and Fred Gallant of this city.
Evidence in this case was also heard
yesterday. The case was taken under
consideration by the court.

Four Decrees

Four decrees of divorce were grant-
ed by Mr. Justice Grimmer yesterday
afternoon.

A divorce was granted Boies El-
red Killam of Paulette River, West-
morland County, in his case against
Alice Lizzie Killam. Moncton, and
Lee Berry, Petitcodiac. The petiti-
on and Fred Berry testified, R. D.
Milton of Moncton filed petition.

A decree with costs was granted
Phyllis Kathleen Brown in her suit
against Alexander Sterling Brown at-
ter two witnesses, the petitioner and
Mrs. Lillian M. Kitchen of Saint
John, were heard. Petitioner and de-
fendant in this case are both of Fred-
ericton. E. C. Atkinson of Frederic-
ton appeared for the petitioner.

Custody of three children was given
the petitioner in addition to a di-
vorce decree in the case of Lillian
Bovard vs. James Bovard, both of
Moncton. Mr. Justice Grimmer re-
served the right to hear an appeal by
the respondent at a later date. The
petitioner, Patrick LeBlanc of Mon-
cton, and Inspector H. V. Harris of
the Moncton police force testified, R.
D. Milton filed petition.

The petitioner and Mrs. Susan Gor-
man of Marysville were heard in the
case of Frederick Lorne McMorris vs.
Ellen Law McMorris, and William
Dennison. A decree was ordered to
issue. Petitioner and defendant are
both of Marysville. R. V. Limerick
appeared for the petitioner.

YOUTH TRAINING
CLASSES TO
BE DOUBLED, N. B.

With sixteen classes now in opera-
tion in the province and another op-
ening today at Jacquet River, W. K.
Tibert, Director of Vocational Educa-
tion for the province stated that by
the end of January more than 30 clas-
ses having a total enrollment of 700
young men will be underway.

The classes have an average enroll-
ment of a little more than 20 students
and each provides instruction in one
of the following subjects:

Junior business, motor mechanics,
carpentry, house wiring, radio and ag-
riculture. Gordon McMillan, Jacquet
River, instructor of the new class be-
ginning there, will teach motor me-
chanics.

Mr. Tibert's schedule calls for the
doubling of the number of classes and
consequently the number of students
before Jan. 31. The classes must ter-
minate before March 31, end of the
Dominion fiscal year and the day when
the contract between the Dominion
and provincial governments expires.

Public Opinion Begins
To Show Against Trade
Of the German Nation

Merchants in City Report Boycott German Goods
Voluntarily By Citizens as a Whole

Public opinion has reached the
stage in Fredericton that it is almost
impossible to dispose of goods that
bear German or Japanese trade-
mark, it was learned authoritatively
today that the merchants of Freder-
icton and probably other parts of
the province are being careful in
purchasing to secure either Empire
made goods or when a certain arti-
cle is not made in Empire countries,
to secure the goods of a country
manufacture other than either of the
two mentioned nations.

One merchant stated that the
trend was most noticeable during the
Christmas season. A considerable
number of neckties and similar arti-
cles are made in Germany and ship-
ped to this country, and are often
sold to merchants and shipped to
their stores before the country or
origin is known. Prospective cus-
tomers, it was stated, when they
saw the German trade-mark on sev-
eral articles refused to purchase
them although they had first chosen
them.

Questioned by The Daily Mail, one
of the leading merchants declared
Hitler is going to cut his own throat,
yet, just through things like this,
Fredericton most certainly isn't the
only place where people are of this
frame of mind. With each order I
now have to insist that none of the
goods are of German or Japanese
manufacture to protect myself and
my business. If the other thousands
of merchants in the Dominion find
these same conditions, the trade of
these nations most certainly will
suffer and will show on the pros-
perity and success of the countries
mentioned.

The inhuman persecution of the
Hebrew and the ruthless methods
of government as well as the greedy
grasp for power of the German
nation, is blamed in this city for
the feeling of the people. The Chi-
nese war has turned the greater per-
centage of people away from any-
thing that is Japanese, it was de-
clared.

Narrow Escape
From Fatality
Near Gagetown

The opening day of school yester-
day narrowly missed being marred by
a coasting tragedy at Gagetown, when
Harold Vail, seven-year old son of
Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Vail, was injured
painfully on colliding with a car
driven by Ralph Dingee.

The Vail boy was coasting down a
hill to the main street, and did not
see the approaching car, the driver
of which could not discern the boy
because of a fence. The sled passed
under the car, and the boy's head
struck the license plate, suffering a
V-shaped scalp wound.

The driver of the car immediately
stopped the vehicle and carried the
injured child in Long's drug store,
where Miss Ruth Warman rendered
first aid, and a doctor was summoned.
Later he was taken to the home of
Miss Greta B. Rubins, a registered
nurse, where Dr. W. M. Jenkins, M.
L. A., dressed the wound. Several
stitches were necessary.

The child was bruised badly about
the arms and hip, but no bones were
broken.

783 NURSES
REGISTERED IN
PROVINCE TODAY

Examinations Held in
Saint John and
Chatham

The 1938 list of the New Brunswick
Association of Registered Nurses, re-
leased in the Royal Gazette today,
shows a membership of 783, while no-
tice of the 1939 examinations for reg-
istration is also given today over the
signature of Maude E. Retallick, Saint
John, secretary of the board of exam-
iners.

The examinations this year will be
held in the Hotel Dieu Hospital, Chat-
ham, and the Admiral Beatty Hotel,
Saint John. The examinations will be
held twice during the year as usual,
the first set being on May 3 and 4,
and the second set being on November
1 and 2nd.

Application for Examination is to be
made to the Secretary of the Board of
Examiners. All applications for Exam-
ination must be accompanied by a fee
of ten dollars and be in the hands
of the Secretary not later than one
month before the date of Examination.

Candidates will be examined in the
following subjects: Anatomy, Phys-
iology, Materia Medica, Hygiene and
Sanitation, Dietetics, Medical, Surgi-
cal and Obstetrical Nursing, Principles
and Practice of Nursing.

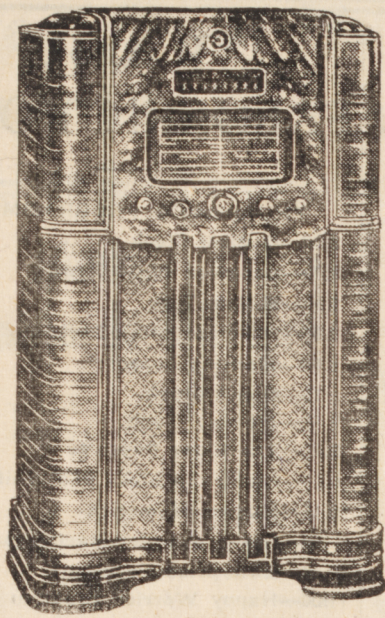
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
