EAST AND WEST

A provincial government agriculturalist in Quebec has been discussing the possibility of building up an important industry in Eastern Canada feeding cattle upon western wheat. This may appear somewhat like throwing pearls before swine but, with the obvious necessity of finding uses for the wheat surplus, experiments have been made of using wheat both with poultry and with cattle.

After experiment, the average poultry producer puts thumbs down to the first suggestion, and while the general belief of cattle ranchers is that wheat does not constitute "good" beef cattle feed, recent experimental work on the Pacific coast at the Oregon Agricultural Experiment station at Union goes to prove the contrary.

The experiments conducted over a considerable period and checked by independent tests made on the ranch of an eastern Oregon cattle raiser would appear to indicate that no grain is superior to wheat for the purpose of fattening cattle. Grinding the wheat to a bran-like appearance, it was fed with chopped hay. Records kept at the experiment station disclosed that fact that wheat-fed steers and lambs have produced higher dressing percentage than animals fed on the usual schedule of feeds.

Obviously if the uses for wheat can be commercially increased, it would tend to improve the situation of the wheat producer and, by force of necessity, all Canadians are in the wheat business.

DEMORALIZING LITERATURE

There is at present a wave of public resentment against a vast amount of current literature sweeping across Canada. Much of this reading material is of a debasing character, and well justifies protests from right-thinking people. Local clergymen of all denominations have time and time again condemned the increase in cheap literature. They have always opposed it, pointing out that it is having a demoralizing effect on young people. Today they find public sentiment allied with them to such an extent that in the not too distant future a more rigid censorship will undoubtedly be in effect.

A few weeks ago Dr. Patterson, president of Acadia University, launched an attack on cheap magazines and books emanating from some well-established publishing house, which echoed throughout Canada. During his address he stated, "I defy anyone to read this type of magazine without feeling he has to take a bath. If he does not feel that way he fails to recognize the difference between dirt and cleanliness. It is not only this word pulp that is flooding the newsstands, but you find the same demoralizing material in the best sellers."

Right-thinking people are becoming conscious of the fact that the youth of today is being fed a diet of filthy, demoralizing trash under the guise of literature. This rapidly growing public opinion, which is gaining the support of people in all ranks of life, will bring about a clean-up that is long past due.

There are too many books and publications, both of a fictional and factual nature, which are interesting, thrilling and satisfying, to allow the cheap, questionable material to get the foothold it has secured in the past few years.

ECONOMICAL SETBACK

Prague newspapers have notified manufacturers that products for export to the United States must be marked "Made in Germany." This is one case where Washington can lay down the law for, obviously, if Washington regulations are not followed, the "Made in Czechoslovakia" goods simply will be barred from the country.

Hereafter, Czech products are to be treated as German and thus be subject to the new surtaxes, and the silver lining to the European clouds appears very obvious to the American shoe industry for the Bata shoe factories at Zlin has long been "Exhibit No. 1" for those who would prove that modern unemployment is due to the machine. After studying modern methods in a Lynn factory, the Czech industrialist outran his teachers with the result that a hide could be whisked through the plant to come up as neatly boxed shoes almost without man's intervention.

Now New England expects to increase production by four to ten million pairs of shoes. Probably Hitler will not worry about unemployment at Zlin for he can manufacture for his goose-stepping soldiers, but the further loss of export trade will bother him. We are old-fashioned enough to believe that the American people, as a whole, are economically losers by this curtailment of foreign trade, which will make them pay higher for a pair of shoes, but it is a price that they will readily pay if it helps thwart Hitler's grandiose political ambitions.

KERR ADDISON

In view of the large increase in ore reserves shown in the annual report, which estimated reserves above the 700 foot level of 1,127,637 tons, grading \$6.31 per ton, and in addition, diamond drilling indications of \$44,622 tons averaging \$6.25 per ton, the directors have decided to proceed with the plan for an increase in mill capacity. The mill is at present handling some 675 tons daily. Decision as to size of mill increase will be deferred until completion of present development programme which should take about four months.

TURKEY PRAISES BRITISH SUPPORT OF POLAND

ANKARA, Turkey, April 4.—The Anglo-French pledge to support Polish independence with the might of their arms was greeted by the Turkish newspaper Tar under the headline "The time of bluffs is past."

The promise, the paper said, "gives the totalitarian states a 'halt' warning, but will the totalitarian states renounce their expansionist policies?"

"If not, the determined democracies will bar their way. The small nations, threatened with brute force, have long expected to hear such democratic, dignified and outspoken words."

The reaction among Turks generally appeared to be that the pledge to Poland should be extended to other Southern European and smaller nations.

FRANCO THANKS MUSSOLINI AND HITLER FOR HELP

BURGOS, Spain, April 4.—General Franco answered with messages of friendship the congratulations upon victory in the civil war which he had received from Chancellor Hitler and Premier Mussolini.

"The blood of your soldiers flowing on the land of Spain created an indestructible feeling between our two peoples," he told Mussolini, concluding his message with the phrase: "With deepest personal sentiments."

His message to Hitler sent "the gratitude of Spain and my most firm personal sentiments of friendship and that of the people which, in difficult moments, found strength in its true friends."

MADE BUSTS OF DIONNE QUINTS

OTTAWA, April 4.—Five days were sufficient for Mme. Suzanne Silvercruys, distinguished New York sculptress, and sister of Baron Silvercruys, Belgian minister to Canada, to finish life-sized busts of the Dionne quintuplets and Dr. A. R. Dafoe.

Find Frozen Body Near Montreal

MONTREAL, April 4.—A young man between 22 and 25 years of age, clad in a bathrobe, two night-shirts and grey trousers, was found frozen to death by Provincial police in a field near Coteau Landing, Que., last week.

The officers, who believed that the death of the young man was due to exposure, instituted a search of the neighborhood to establish the identity of the young man.

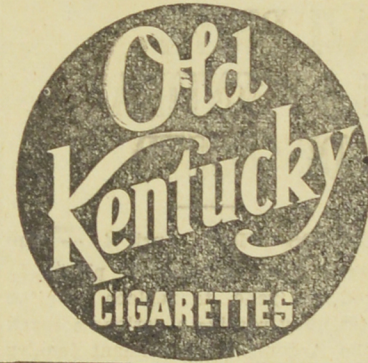

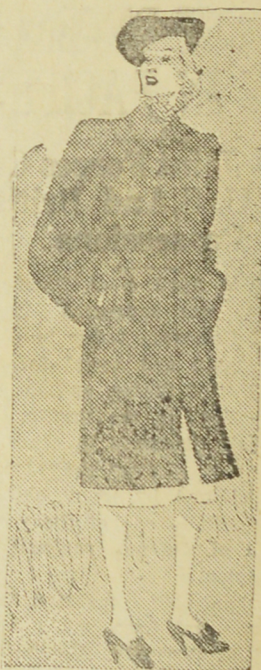
