Financial Bulletins

BUSINESS INDEX

The physical volume of business for the week ended March 25th, advanced to 72.5 from 72.4 in the preceding week, according to Barron's Index. This compares with the December high of 78.9 and with 57.2 a year ago. Measured by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, official index, operations in Canada recorded a minor recession in February from the first month of the year, the physical volume of business standing at 111.7 against 113, a decline of 1.2%.

BROWN COMPANY

Report of the trustees of the Company for the year ended November 26th, 1938 shows a loss amounting to \$3,825,458 after depreciation and deferred interest vs a profit of \$44,249 in the year previous. Much of the 1938 deficit involves no loss in cash, it is stated. This was true of the \$1,366,716 deferred bond interest, and much of the \$1,102,633, considerably less than the loss reported.

SHELL UNION OIL

For the year ended December 31st, 1938, a net income after all charges is reported at \$1,318,422, equal, after preferred dividend requirements to 72c per share on the 13,070,625 common shares outstanding. This compares with \$20,668,780 of \$1.14 per share in the preceding year.

LAKE SHORE MINES

The current weakness in Lake Shore which opened yesterday at over \$41, and dropped to a low of \$36, is attributed partly to current estimate of lower earnings in the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1939, and the somewhat lower grade. With regard to reports that the Ontario Government was about to publish the results of its inquiry on recent rock bursts at the property, it is stated that it will probably be nearly a year before investigations are completed at a report made.

ALUMINIUM LIMITED

Declaration has been made of a stock dividend of 10% and a cash dividend of 25% per share on the common stock of the Company. The dividends are payable April 28th to shareholders of record April 15th. Payment of the stock dividend will require the issue of 67,673 additional shares. When fractional shares result from the issue of the dividend, fractional warrants, which may be consolidated, will be issued; but the Company will neither buy nor sell fractional warrants. Warrants will be exchangeable until May 1st, 1940, upon surrender to the National Trust Company. Thereafter the full shares reserved will represent a right to receive a proportionate share of the proceeds of such sale.

European Crisis Causes Disappointment in Business

NEW YORK, Apr. 4. — The outbreak of another acute crisis in Europe, and the accompanying market unsettlement in this country, have made March a generally disappointing month to observers of the business situation says the April news title of the National City Bank of New York. Many business men had hoped that the arrival of Spring might bring signs of resumption of last Fall's upswing; and early in the month a pickup in buying in a number of lines, together with firmness in commodity prices, furnished some support for these hopes. However, the improvement has made little headway. On the whole factory operations have not made as much seasonal gain as usual, and when the month's figures are compiled the adjusted indexes of industrial production, which allow for seasonal expectations, probably will show a small decline for the third month in succession. Nor have the industries been provided with a backlog of orders sufficient to promise any marked rise in April.

Testimony as to business sentiment is conservative, although not pessimistic. Expectations that the sideways trend will sooner or later give way to improvement are common, but sentiment over the country indicates that little is being done in anticipation. Naturally the menace of a European war, or of recurring crisis which disturb markets and lead to new disorders in trade, influences business men to keep commitments down. It is possible to argue that after the first shock the effects upon this country of a European war would be more stimulating than otherwise, but no one knows this for certain, and every one is aware that the eventual result would be an indescribable calamity, leaving a burden of suffering and disorder which would disrupt the economic life of all countries. As in the crisis of last September, business men all over the world have been concerned with protecting themselves against new difficulties and risks, and this attitude leaves little scope for the needed expansion of long-term planning and investment.

SCOTTISH TEAM WILL PLAY EIGHT GAMES IN CANADA

WINNIPEG, April 4. — Twelve games, eight in Canada and four in the United States, will be played by the soccer team to be selected by the Scottish Football Association for a North American tour this spring. Sam Davidson, secretary of the Dominion Football Association, announced.

The touring party will include 17 players, a trainer, three officials and three Old Country press representatives. The players will not be chosen until after the Scotland-England international game April 15.

First game will be played in Montreal May 17. Other games: New York May 21; Detroit May 24; St. Louis May 28; Calgary May 31; Vancouver June 3; Nanaimo June 5; Victoria June 7; Vancouver June 10; Winnipeg June 14; Toronto June 17; and New York June 18.

Western Provinces Petition Ottawa Re Canadian Coal

OTTAWA, April 3.—Declaring that the coal industry is struggling in a state of insolvency, the western provinces today filed a brief with the government here advocating a wider coal policy for the Dominion. The brief is similar to the stand taken by the Maritimes in a brief submitted a short while ago. The brief stressed the fact that \$50,000,000 is sent out of Canada annually for coal that could be supplied by the Dominion under a different set-up.

The organization is doing police and guard work in Madrid and other centres of Spain, it is stated that there were about 40,000 members of the organization in Madrid at the time of its seizure as well as since that time, and that the organization was responsible for informing the Nationalist leader of the Republican activities of hundreds who have been shot.

GRETNA GREEN MAY LOSE MUCH OF GLAMOUR

Bill Before House To Abolish The "Anvil Marriages"

LONDON, Apr. 4. — A romantic feature of Scottish life—the marriage ceremony "by declaration" over an anvil at Gretna Green—will pass into history if Parliament approves a bill currently under consideration.

In a move to standardize forms of marriage in Scotland, the Government is sponsoring a statute which would prohibit "marriages by declaration," a custom dating back hundreds of years, which made the blacksmith shop a Gretna Green world famous as an institution for eloping couples.

Down through the years Scotland, perhaps the only European country to do so, has sanctioned this form of marriage ceremony.

In effect, they are marriages in which the couple, before witnesses, declare themselves man and wife. To comply with the existing law, they must complete the ceremony by registering with civil authorities.

Another form still practiced in Scotland consists of signing the names of the couple in the family Bible.

Gretna Green marriages consists of the declaratory form, the blacksmith providing witness and attending to the registration.

Now, however, it is proposed to substitute one ceremony for all marriages except those conducted in churches. The bill would outlaw all civil forms except marriage before an authorized registrar. It might put an end to Gretna as an elopement centre, terminating almost two centuries of glamor as a village cloaked in a romantic tradition. On the other hand, officials might be persuaded to give the blacksmith the authority of a registrar and permit a modified ceremony beside the famous anvil.

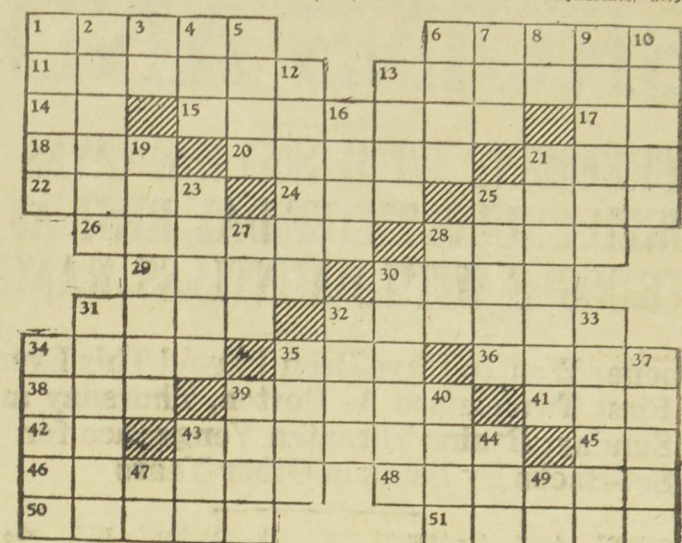
