The many friends of Mrs. Allan Shepherd will be interested to know that her health is slightly improved.

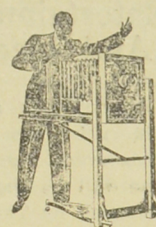

**SUNNY DAYS WILL
RELIEVE FLOOD
POSSIBILITIES**

Although the possibilities of high floods along the St. John River Valley are still worrying farmers and others along the course of the river, flood probabilities are now considered somewhat more remote than they were a few days ago.

Residents of the Valley country feel that as the past several days have been cloudy and cool, that the weather is due for some sunshine for a few days in spite of the traditional April showers.

With a few days of sunshine and cool nights, veteran river men believe the excessive amount of snow in the upper reaches of the river will be considerably reduced without causing any heavy freshet such as that of 1936. Warm sunshine would also likely waste some of the heavy ice now covering the river.

extension on the original option of two months on a piece of land adjoining the school grounds was granted. No further business came before the board and the meeting was adjourned.

If, however, warm spring rains should fall for any length of time, river residents fear for their property. Weather forecasts for today predict more cold weather tonight and tomorrow with snow flurries.

John Malloy, Superintendent of the Fredericton Pumping Station and veteran riverman, stated this morning that during the past three weeks the river has risen only eight or nine inches, not enough to show water along the shores. The river ice is still as heavy as during mid-winter and teams are still using the ice for crossing. Almost four feet thick in some places, the ice even covers an air hole which remained open in January.
