

ESKIMOS HOLD BEAVERS TO 2-ALL DRAW

EDMUNDSTON SEXTETTE PULLS SURPRISE ON SAINT JOHN CREW IN LISTLESS BATTLE AT THE FORUM

Northerners Knot Count in Third and Force Game Into Overtime — Eskimos Outplayed Beavers in Last Stages

SAINT JOHN, Jan. 10.—Edmundston Eskimos, prize team of north-western New Brunswick, sprang a surprise on the highly-touted Saint John Beavers when they held them to a 2-all draw in a listless exhibition game played at the Forum last night. Five minutes of overtime did not produce the deciding score.

Adapting themselves to the unorthodox style of the visitors Beavers played an unexciting game throughout the first period which ended scoreless. But in the second Calise David, Eskimo defenceman, broke the monotony when he shoved the puck past Bill Dickie on a pass from Rousseau and "Snap" Dickie at the 12.55 mark. Phillips, on a pass from Eddie Burke, tied the score less than two minutes later when he beat Bob Ritchie on a neat shot.

Third period goals by Russel of the Beavers on passes from Kelly and Baird and David of the Eskimos on a pass from Dickie, left the teams in a deadlock at the end of regulation time. Five minutes of overtime left the result unchanged, although Eskimos had the better of the play in the latter part of the third period and in the overtime.

It was the sensational work of Bob Ritchie, more than anything, which kept the Beaver snipers from running up a score in the early part of the game. But as time wore on Eskimos became more familiar with their surroundings and actually controlled the play in the latter part of the game.

Lapointe and Adams of the Eskimos, and Riley of the Beavers, drew the only penalties of the game.

He Walks on Ceiling

'Human Fly' Steals Show At Wrestling Match

BOSTON, Mass., January 10.—Wrestlers Angelo Cistoldi and Pat Kelley were at work in Boston Garden last week when a bored spectator happened to glance up at the ceiling.

He yelled and 6,000 other spectators looked up. Then even the wrestlers looked up.

There, 90 feet above the concrete floor and the seats of the huge indoor arena, a man was inching his way across a foot-thick steam pipe. He attempted to stand a couple of times, but, as ringside spectators ducked and ran for cover, his feet slipped and he returned to a straddling position. The pipe was hot and conveniently close was a two-foot square ventilator pipe. So he shifted to this, stood and picked a teetering path along it. Right to the very end of the pipe he staggered, halting at the brink of a 90-foot drop, and women screamed.

Police and Garden attaches ran to the balconies, and catwalks and pleaded with the man to come down, but he ignored them.

Police Sergeant Catches "Fly"
A fire ladder truck was called. Police Sergeant Michael Carr went out on the ventilator and pleaded. Approaching him at one of the ven-

tilator's bell-like openings, Carr leaped the fast few feet and pinned him against the shaft.

The human fly was hurried off to a police station and booked on a drunkenness charge. He identified himself as James Sullivan, 41.

"I'm an ironworker", he explained. "I worked on the Garden when it was built in 1930. I just wanted to see if all the rivets were still tight".

Conn On New York Fight Skyline Beating Apostoli

Fans Fall For 21-Year-Old Irishman Who Whipped Apostoli Last Week

NEW YORK, N.Y., January 7.—Billy Conn, a 21-year old Irishman from Pittsburgh and a fine piece of fighting machinery, ranked today among the leaders of the United States stic prospects.

Making his first appearance in Madison Square Garden, the tall boy from the West scored an unanimous decision over Fred Apostoli, who is recognized by the New York and California Commissions as middle-weight champion, before 11,000 fans last week.

The result did nothing toward clearing up the muddled middle-weight situation, for Conn probably weighed 1700 pounds when he entered the ring as compared to Apostoli's legitimate 160. But it established Conn as a man to be reckoned with in heavyweight circles within another year.

Conn's greater height and reach and a deadly left hook that Apostoli never managed to avoid gave the bout to the newcomer.

There have been few better fights hereabouts. The boys went at it like longshoremen for all of the ten rounds, with Apostoli boring in and swinging and his cool opponent blazing back with his left. There were no knock-downs, but both were battered and bleeding at the finish.

Fine Record

Conn now has licked both of the middleweight title litigants. He recently outpointed Solly Krieger, recognized by the National Boxing Association, in Scranton, Pennsylvania. While his handlers were trying to take the swelling out of his face in the dressing room, he volunteered the opinion that Krieger was tougher to whip than Apostoli. "At least, he said, "Krieger hit me harder than Fred did".

Apostoli didn't protest the decision too violently, though he thought he could have been given a draw. A lot of others thought so, too, especially the bookmakers, who were laying odds at 14 to 5, against Conn right up to ring time.

Apostoli carried the fight from the bell, tearing into the Pittsburgh boy with every intent of finishing him up before the evening grew older. He landed and rocked

Conn back against the ropes, and that was when the crowd discovered it was going to like the kid.

The harder he got hit the harder he fought back. Time and again Apostoli's rushing tactics would enable him to carry the early part of a round by a wide margin. He would force Conn back and pour lusty blows to the jaw while the customers stood and yelled for a knockout.

Then, in a trice, Conn would dash out and change the entire complexion of the fight. In his return he pounded his lighter rival across the ring under a stinging barrage.

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
