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Financial Bulletins

PAPERBOARD OUTPUT U. S.

Production during March totalled 421,576 tons indicating an increase of 32% over March last year. Output was equal to 72.4% of rated capacity, the highest rate of operation since August 1937, when the industry operated at 75.7% of capacity at that time, which then was considerable less than current capacity. During the month, orders were received for 429,545 tons, creating unfilled orders at the end of the month amounting to 124,420 tons. This is the greatest backlog of orders the industry has had since the 129,745 tons at August 31st, 1937.

CAN. NAT. RLY.

Gross traffic receipts for the nine-day period ended April 30th at \$4,207,472 compared with \$4,239,899 in the corresponding period last year, a decrease of \$32,427, and marking the first decrease since the week ended March 21st. Gross traffic receipts for the month of April totalled \$14,452,302, an increase of 3.7% over April, 1938, and for the first four months, gross at \$45,649,693 shows an increase of slightly better than 1% over the corresponding period of 1938.

POWER CORPORATION

Production during March of the subsidiaries and affiliated companies show a total output of 226,938,479 k.w.h., an increase of 31,043,907 k.w.h. or 15.35% over March 1938. For the first three months of the year the increase in power output for the group amounted to 66,651,332 k.w.h. or 11.33%. Total output for the three months ended March 31st amounted to 654,744,924 k.w.h.

INT'L HYDRO ELECTRIC

Consolidated operating revenue of \$64,078,241 during 1938 compares with \$66,121,972 in 1937, a decrease of 3%. The balance of earnings added to surplus in 1938 amounted to \$535,363 compared with \$2,226,326 in 1937. A decrease in earned surplus for the year was shown amounting to \$1,732.

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HUNT COLLEGE STUDENT UNDER MURDER CHARGE

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 9 — Robert M. Burgunder, jr., 22, a college student, was sought over this week end on a charge of murdering two automobile salesmen.

His father, a prominent Seattle attorney, said he had heard nothing from his son, who was a student at the Arizona State Teachers College of Tempe, for several days. Mrs. Ruth Burgunder, who is divorced and lives in Los Angeles, said she had no idea where her son was. She had not heard from him in months.

Murder charges were filed against young Burgunder after a rancher found the bodies of Jack Peterson, 35 and Ellis M. Koury, 24, in the desert 15 miles southeast of here.

Burgunder enrolled in the Arizona College last September. Other students envied him because he made high marks with a minimum of study. When he enrolled, it was not known that he had a prison record in Washington, and that at the time he was on parole, having served time for grand larceny.

His father sent him to Tempe, hoping he would do better where no one knew him.

Last Saturday a man police identified as Burgunder, walked into an automobile agency here and said he wanted to have a demonstration.

Peterson, Koury, and their prospect drove off in a new car. Nothing was heard of them again until their bodies were found yesterday. They apparently had been bound before being shot. The motive seemed to be that the "customer" wanted a new car without paying for it.

A .25 calibre Colt automatic revolver was said to a "polite young man" by a pawnbroker Saturday morning. Shown a picture of Burgunder, he said: "I believe that's the man." The pistol fired the same calibre bullets as those which killed the salesman.

415. The report shows current assets of \$20,994,476 against current liabilities totalling \$12,809,469. The report states that commencing with the month of September 1938, cash received by the System as interest and dividend payments from subsidiaries, including payments from Gattineau Power, which are considered as a return of capital, was sufficient for the first time since 1935 to cover the System's cash requirements for expenses and for interest on its 6% debentures.

First quarterly earnings after deductions amounted to \$109,458 equal after preferred dividends to 21c per share on the common stock, and comparing with \$91,375 of 17c per share as shown in the initial 1938 quarter.

SLADEN MALARTIC

For the year ended December 31st, 1938 a net profit was shown of \$160,727 after all charges, equal to 4 1/2c per share on the 3,499,021 shares outstanding. No comparative figures are available as the mine was brought into production late in January, 1938. In a supplementary report for the first quarter of the current year, an operating loss of \$28,000 was incurred, but will mill increased from 300 to 450 tons daily on April 1st, it is stated that an operating profit is now being realized, and it is expected that the mill will be estimated shortly at 500 tons daily. During 1938, total bullion recovered amounted \$614,534 indicating an average recovery of \$5.93 per ton milled. Costs per ton amounted to \$4.38 and a net profit of \$1.55 per ton was shown. The balance sheet disclosed a net working capital of \$48,097 as against an excess of current liabilities at the end of the previous year totalling \$21,385. Probable ore reserves are placed at 326,339 tons with a grade of \$4.44 per ton after allowing for expected dilution.

It was stated at the annual meeting that operating profits are running at the rate of \$250,000 per quarter, and it is expected that this rate should continue for the balance of the year, shareholders may expect another two dividends of 5c each by the end of the year.

NEW DEVICE TO HELP DEAF MUTES

ST. LOUIS, May 9 — A machine to aid in teaching children who have been deaf from birth to rid themselves of the monotone in their inflection has been devised at the Central Institute for the Deaf here.

The machine, called a thyatron inflection indicator, has been found successful in several tests. Dr. Max A. Goldstein, director of the institute, said it is the first apparatus of its kind that really works. All other devices invented to accomplish this result have proved unsatisfactory, Dr. Goldstein said.

The inflection indicator was designed by Mrs. Tikvah Alper Sterne, a physicist of Pretoria, South Africa, and H. J. Zimmerman, an instructor in electrical engineering at Washington University.

The inventors say the machine is simple to operate. The object is to get the child to say, for instance, "good morning" with the voice rising on the "morn" rather than to bring it out in a monotone which would sound like "good mawning."

An electronic frequency meter in the machine records the inflection of the child's voice on a column of light goes up to the first three of seven bulbs on the face of the instrument.

At the syllable "morn" the column of light runs all the way to the top, and when the teacher finishes with "ing," the light drops back to the four lower bulbs. The deaf child watches the performance and later takes over the microphone to attempt to make the column of light act as it did for the instructor.

Dr. Goldstein said a subject can usually be taught to speak a group of words with the proper inflection in about 15 minutes.

OLD VIOLIN PROVES VALUABLE

WENHAM, Mass., May 9 — When Gilbert S. Mason, a sign painter this week heard that a man in Maryland had been offered a mere \$300 for what later proved to be a 1682 Maggini violin, he rushed upstairs to his attic, dusted off an old, battered violin he had owned for thirty years and announced gladdly that he had a genuine Maggini.

The violin bore a penned inscription inside the box which read, "Giovanni Paolo Maggini—Brescia 1688."

There were clearly discernible grooves on the ebony fingerboard showing that the violin had been played for many years. Mason said he had paid \$20 for the instrument in a second-hand shop in Salem.

An expert in Boston, on hearing about the violin, doubted that it was genuine Maggini, which he said are rare and valuable. He believed that Mason's violin was a copy made in Germany several years ago and inscribed, as is the custom, with the original maker's name and date.
