NOTED CHINESE
EDUCATOR WAS
HELD PRISONER

MONTREAL, May 9 — Held as a political prisoner in China while on a year's leave of absence, from McGill University Dr. Kiang Kang-hu, formerly head of the department of Chinese studies, has arrived back on this continent and may visit Montreal shortly, it was learned from friends here today.

McGill University authorities, at the time of Dr. Kiang's detention, obtained the aid of the Canadian Government which cabled the British charge d'affaires at Nanking. McGill shortly after received a cable from the Chinese servant with the laconic message, "Safe."

Dr. Kiang, member of a family of traditional great scholars under the old Chinese system, was appointed to head the new department of Chinese studies at McGill in 1930. While here he greatly stimulated interest in China through his founding of the Hung Tao Society which is still active. The department was abolished in 1933 for reasons of economy.

Dr. Kiang was detained in China because it was believed he was associated with General Ch'en Ming-shu in Fukien, one of his former students and at the time at odds with the Nationalist Government.

His innocence of political intrigue proved, Dr. Kiang returned to his scholarly and teaching pursuits. In recent months he has been lecturing in universities in Southwest China. Recently he arrived in San Francisco for a visit to this continent and is now staying with his cousin, Dr. Hu Chih, Chinese Ambassador at Washington, D. C. He hopes to spend about 10 days in Montreal shortly, and will be the guest of the Hung Tao Society.

HOPES HUSBAND

LONDON, May 9 — Miss Ellen Galloway will soon give up her job as assistant curator at the Ravensknowle Museum, Huddersfield, to marry Mr. Alfred Hazelwood, assistant curator at Bolton (Lancs) Museum, but she will continue to keep snakes.

At times she has had as many as thirty snakes, but just now she has none. She explained:

"I hope to get another collection together very soon after I am married. I don't suppose I shall have thirty, but perhaps a dozen or so, chiefly grass snakes and British adders, and perhaps a python or two."

"Just lately, when I have been busy preparing my trousseau, I have not had time to go out catching and buying rats for the snakes food, so I gave up keeping them."

Snakes have always been the most fascinating pets to Miss Galloway.

Sales and Purchases of Securities Between Canada and Other Countries in March

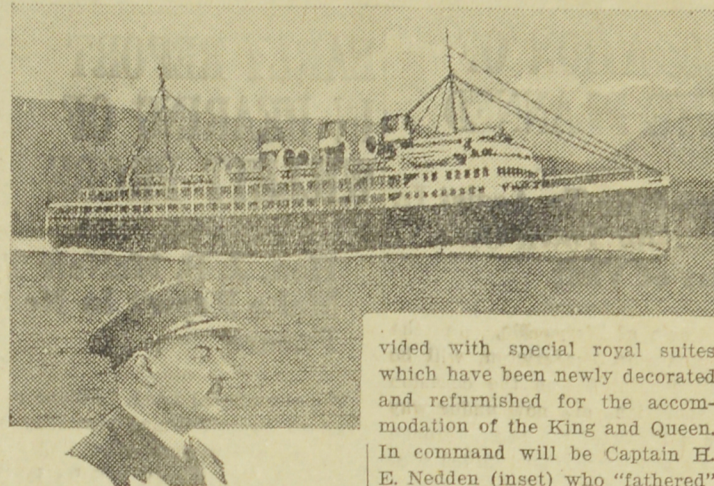
A heavy inflow of capital to Canada continued to feature the international trade in securities in March, when, for the third successive month, sales of securities exceeded purchases by an unusually wide margin. Net sales to all countries during the month totalled \$16.5 million compared with \$9.2 million in February and \$19.3 million in January. The volume of transactions also expanded in March, large gains being recorded in both total sales and total purchases. As in the two preceding months, the largest part of the inflow of capital in March, \$13.6 million, accompanied transactions between Canada and United States. It is not improbable, however, that some of this capital was owned in overseas countries.

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CANADIAN NATIONAL

Alaska Fleet Flagship for Royal Tour



The Prince Robert, flagship of the Canadian National Steamships Alaska fleet (above), will convey Their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, from Victoria to Vancouver on May 31. The ship has been pro-

vided with special royal suites which have been newly decorated and refurbished for the accommodation of the King and Queen. In command will be Captain H. E. Nedden (inset) who "fathered" the Prince Robert. The ship was built in a Birkenhead, England, shipyard under his personal supervision. Captain Nedden has been in the service of the Canadian National Steamships for 30 years. He is a native of England.

MONTREAL, May 9 — When their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, during their Canadian tour reach Victoria, B. C., they will be conveyed back to Vancouver by the luxurious twin-screw steamship Prince Robert, flagship of the Alaska fleet of the Canadian National Steamships. This liner is now in dock to receive a thorough overhauling preparatory to being placed at the disposal of Their Majesties, and later to commence her seasonal cruises to Alaska. Preparation of the liner for this special occasion will include the provision of royal suites with a new decoration scheme, the laying of new carpets and the installation of sitting room furniture to accommodate Their Majesties during the daylight trip from Victoria to the mainland. On this voyage, the S. S. Prince Rupert, also in the Alaska service, will act as the pilot ship.

In charge of the Prince Robert will be Captain H. E. Nedden who "fathered" the ship which he commands. The Prince Robert was built under

his personal supervision at the yards of Messrs. Cammell Laird and Company, Birkenhead, England. Captain Nedden was born at sea and served his apprenticeship on a sailing ship on which he circumnavigated the globe several times. He has been with the Canadian National Steamships for 30 years. The first officer will be E. W. Gray and chief engineer W. H. Baillie.

The Steamship Prince Robert is one of the fastest ships in Pacific Coast waters and is equipped with all the latest devices known to modern navigation. She has an inter-cabin telephone system by which each passenger can communicate with persons in other cabins and public rooms or offices. There is also an electric watersounding device for determining depths in strange waters and an echo-sounding whistle to determine the distance from shore, a gyro compass and a spinning observation window which assures the captain a clear view ahead under all conditions of weather.

STARTS LONG HIKE

VICTORIA, May 9 — Armed with a \$2 bill and U knapsack full of food, Miss Nora Harris, 22-year-old Victoria girl is en route to Halifax on foot.

The young Victoria walker, who two years ago made a 500-mile hike to Northern Quesnel, B. C., left here for Nanaimo last week. She planned to go to Vancouver and start her hike from there.

Dressed in khaki shorts, a light sweater and a pair of men's soft leather shoes, she carried a feather sleeping bag. On clear nights she plans to sleep under the stars.

NAZI PRESS
SCREAMS CHARGES
OF ATROCITIES

BERLIN, May 9 — Screaming headlines in the closely controlled German press complain of Polish "atrocities" against Germans this week.

Nazis had started by bitterly attacking Poland, asserting that Col. Josef Beck, Polish Foreign Minister had flouted "magnanimous" that Poland must accept responsibility for any developments.

This was followed up this afternoon by sensational newspaper complaints — similar to those which have marked the deterioration of relations between Germany and Austria and Czechoslovakia.

"Increasing terrorism against Germans in Poland: First refugees already arrived in Reich Territory," proclaimed a heading across the first page of the Zwölf Uhr Blatt.

Most of this papers' first page was given over to reports about "atrocities" which, it was alleged, Poles had committed against Germans in various villages in the Pomorze area, the so-called Corridor.

It was alleged that "armed Poles" maltreated Germans in the Pomorze district of Graudenz, smashing windows and furniture in their houses, and that as the result "the majority" of the inhabitants fled.

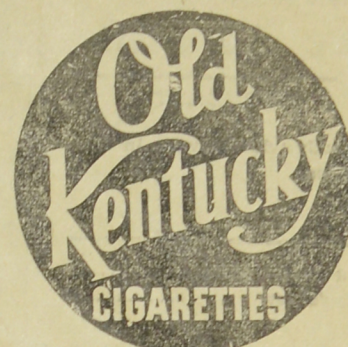
There were reports also of the destruction of a German bookshop in Upper Silesia.

It was complained that Poles had held anti-German meetings at Poznan and other towns.

It was indicated that Adolf Hitler would make no move pending the conference between Joachim von Ribbentrop and Count Galeazzo Ciano, German and Italian Foreign Ministers starting at Milan today.

But it was evident from inspired Nazi comment on Beck's speech to the Polish Parliament yesterday and in an official Polish memorandum to Germany which supplemented it, that Nazis regarded all negotiations with Poland deadlocked.

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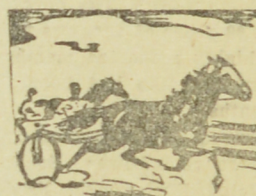
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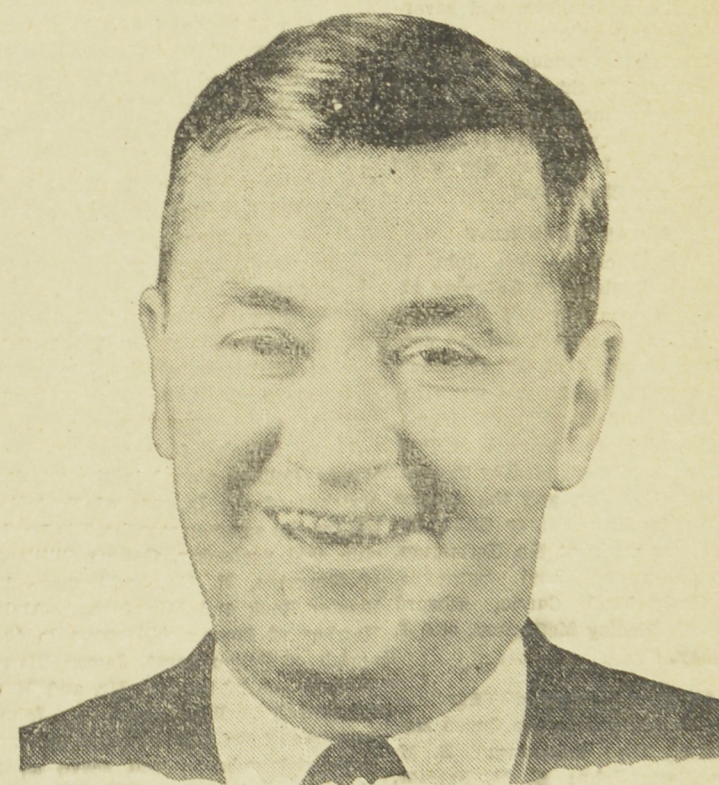


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
