DECORATION OF ROUTE PLANNED

Veterans To Assist In Policing Town On Day of Visit

The Town of Marysville, on the Royal Route to Fredericton, will be suitably decorated on the occasion and preparations are now under way for the policing of the route through the town and other guard duties similar to those of Fredericton.

At the monthly session of the Town Council held last night the matter of repairing three and a half miles of the Main Street hard surface highway was left in the hands of the Road Committee who will study the matter and submit a proposal at a special meeting of the Council in the near future. Lack of sufficient assessment for roads will not permit the Council to expend any considerable amount on the job. It was the opinion of the Board that increasing traffic had caused the road to break up so at various spots. A mixture of coals and coarse sand will be used.

Decorations Ready

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BISHOP WILL RECEIVE DEGREE ON THURSDAY

Ordination Service Here on June 4; Mission Duties

His Lordship, Rt. Rev. W. H. Moorhead, D.D., Bishop of Fredericton, who is at present at Saint John, will leave on Wednesday for Halifax where he will receive an honorary degree of D.C.L. from the University of King's College and preach the University sermon on Thursday in King's College Chapel.

On June 4 the Bishop will conduct an ordination service in the Cathedral in Fredericton when Howard Grimmer of Moncton, King's College student, will be ordained deacon and Rev. Basil Buckland will be advanced to the priesthood. Mr. Grimmer will work in the Diocese of Fredericton for the summer months and return to King's College for a further year of study in the fall. Mr. Buckland is a son of the late Rev. H. T. Buckland and will continue working in the Westmorland County missions residing at Aulac.

Rev. Stewart Wetmore of Hampton, who was ordained at King's College at Christmas will take up duties as curate at St. Ann's Church, Fredericton.

There will be four students of King's College placed in the mission parishes of the Diocese of Fredericton for the summer months. His Lordship said yesterday. George Gilliland of Kingston, N. B. will serve in Plaster Rock and Napadogan. Alvin Hawkes of Sussex will serve in the parish of Salmonhurst. James Flewelling, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Flewelling of Saint John, formerly of the teaching staff of New Brunswick schools, will serve as a student missionary in Norton and Vincent Martin, son of Rev. W. C. V. Martin of Saint John will be student missionary in the Deanery of Chatham.

Three Wycliffe College students will also be on missionary duty during the summer in this diocese. John Stewart, son of Rev. T. Hudson Stewart of Saint John will serve under Rev. F. J. LeRoy in the St. John River suburban districts. Desmond Hammond Hunt of the Diocese of Toronto will assist Rev. H. R. Coleman in Westfield and the third student from Wycliffe will assist Rev. Canon W. E. Fuller in Campbellton.

EARLY REPORT IN HEARING OF WILLETT PROBE

Hon. J. B. McNair To Make Report In Near Future

The sensational Long, LeBlanc case came to its anti-climax yesterday afternoon when counsel submitted their argument. The climax will be in the near future when Attorney-General Hon. J. B. McNair, commissioner in the case, will report his findings to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer.

Arguing that "you can find nothing in the conduct of Willett that makes him unfit to hold office of police magistrate," P. J. Hughes, K.C. defended the action of Magistrate G. Harry Willett in his trying the case of Robert "Bob" Long and Joseph "Leo" LeBlanc.

E. B. McLatchey, Fredericton, commission counsel, based his argument on a statement said to have been made by Willett following conversations with E. T. Richard, counsel for LeBlanc in the original case: "If anybody after the job is over wants to give me a treat—a bottle of whiskey—that's O.K. with me." This was "a very peculiar statement for a magistrate to make under the circumstances," and Willett's explanation of it had not seemed satisfactory, McLatchey submitted.

Magistrate Willett sentenced Joseph Leo LeBlanc, Ste. Anne de Kent, and Robert Long, Richibucto, to one month in jail each and fined them \$1,000 and \$500 respectively last October when they pleaded guilty to charges of conspiring to defraud the Dominion government by smuggling.

The Crown took the case to the New Brunswick Appeal Court, which greatly increased the sentences and fines. The court accused the magistrate of imposing his sentences in the hope of receiving some reward, and of perjuring himself when testifying before the appeal court. The tribunal held that he was unfit to hold the office of magistrate and recommended that his actions be investigated by the attorney-general's department.

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MANY ANGLERS ARE FISHING ON THE MIRAMICHI

255 Permits Issued to Non-Residents to Date

The rush of non-resident anglers to the Southwest Miramichi and Cain's Rivers after spring salmon, which began when the ice ran out of those rivers a week ago, shows no signs of abatement. The fishing season opened ten days later than last year, and while therefore, comparisons cannot be made as to dates, Fishery Supervisor Parks up to last night had issued 255 permits to anglers from over the American border. This is said to be the largest number he has issued in a like period since he entered upon his duties here seven years ago. Yesterday Mr. Parks issued 40 permits to non-residents which he says is a record number for a single day. The supervisor says that while the fishing season was late in starting, he thinks it will also be late in closing. "I look for it to continue until the 24th of this month, if not longer," he said this morning.

Fishing Good

Up to Saturday night the fishing on the Miramichi had been exceptionally good, and the visiting anglers enjoyed fine sport, even though the weather was not congenial. A heavy rainfall Saturday night resulted in a sharp rise in the river and the water became somewhat beclouded, interfering with the fishing. A few fine days however, will likely restore normal conditions.
