

CAPITALS DOWN SUSSEX SIX BY 5-2 COUNT

FREDERICTON TEAM MEASURES FAST DAIRY TOWN SIX IN SECOND START

McIntyre, Morehouse and Staples Shone For the Capitals; Game Clean and Fast; Tally 4-0 at End of Second; St. Stephen Downed St. Andrews 10-4

SUSSEX, Jan. 6.—Senior hockey returned to Sussex with a bang last night as a good crowd turned out to see the Rovers, local entry in the Southern League, bow before the prowess of the Fredericton Capitals. The locals emerged after three periods of fast, comparatively clean hockey, on the short end of a 5-2 score.

Red McNeil and Harmer proved outstanding for the locals with the former always on the spot when needed. Manny McIntyre and Mush Morehouse and Staples, in the Capital net, took the honors for the visitors. The first frame saw visitors take a 2-0 lead and the second saw this score increase to 4-0. In the third the Rovers commenced to rove and the score became 4-2. With the game nearly over the Capitals made it 5-2. The first Capital attack saw Doug Cameron try Spear with the attempt followed by a mix-up.

After 10 minutes of play Haining and Manny McIntyre tried Spear with nice shots but the break came at the 13-minute mark when a long shot by Morehouse went through Spear's pads for the first goal. A minute later Bill McIntyre scored after combining with Haining and Cameron on the play, having Spear beaten all the way. The third goal for the Caps was scored by Ron Laskey after a nice pass from Haining near the two-minute mark.

Number 4 for the Capitals was scored when Lifford drew spear out and netted the disc after receiving it from Laskey near the 17-minute mark. In the next three minutes Spear handled a great deal of rubber but the visitors failed to make their fifth.

Hughes nearly made it number two for Sussex when he hit the post of the Fredericton net in a poor chance to clear.

After a little over 10 minutes of play Mac Radcliffe took a nice pass from Nutter and got away a hard shot then knocked in his own rebound to make the score 4-2.

During the time Laskey was off the Rovers played five forwards, and were steadily on the offensive. The break came however when Lifford and Morehouse broke away and the former scored after a nice pass from the latter, giving Spear absolutely no chance to save.

Mohawks Win Handily
ST. ANDREWS, Jan. 6.—Another game was added to the St. Stephen Mohawks' credit in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League when they defeated the St. Andrews Senators here last night 10-4. The game was played before a large crowd and on good ice. Still the losing team the Senators were considerably more in form tonight than in their previous game with Fredericton.

Releasing Goalies Unusual In Hockey

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—When Detroit and Canadiens aired their veteran goalies a few weeks back and cast around for lesser knowns to fill their places, it was the first time in the modern history of the game that a pair of netminers had been let go in the same season, to say nothing of within a few days of each other.

An outstanding goalie is the rarity of hockey. When a club gets hold of one, it doesn't let him go. An understudy is booked and usually farmed out to a minor league club. In the early days of the league as it is constituted at present, a club could keep two goalies on its roster and many of them did.

The goalie question hadn't shaken itself down at that time and some of the teams worked their netminers alternately until the best one could be decided upon.

Soon, however there were some pretty permanent fixtures in the goals. There was Chabot, with the Rangers, Connell with Ottawa, Hainsworth with the Canadiens, Benedict with Maroons, Gardner with Chicago, Thompson with Boston and

Worters with Americans. That was an array of netminers for the most exacting.

All of them except Thompson, who didn't hit the N. H. L. until 1928, have passed out of the death six years ago.

In the last half dozen years, a new crop of cage custodians has entered the picture in Kerr, Karakas, Broda, Cude Robertson and Smith. Based on consistent play for the years he has been with the Rangers, Dave Kerr seems to begin to compare with the lads who were kicking them out a decade ago.

Onto the scene recently have come Frank Brimsek with the Bruins and Claude Bourque with Les Canadiens, the first named replacing Thompson, sent to Detroit, and Bourque filling in for Cude.

With the changes effected in the past few weeks, the N. H. L. seems to be set, with possible one exception for goal tenders, for the next few years. When a goal tender is at last determined upon, he has about the steadiest job there is in hockey. There is little or no swapping around and few sales of goalies, it's the one place above all others where dependability counts.

MILLER TEACHES SKIING IN CANADA

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The Dominion of Canada has entrusted its skiing reputation upon the shoulders of its 28 year old professional star, Jack Miller. He is the only Canadian born ski instructor believed to be teaching in the terrain of the Laurentian Mountains.

Head of one of the largest ski schools in North America, at Chatelet Cochand at St. Margaret's, Miller has imparted his racing technique to many youthful Canadians, who today are sharing the highest honors of the Dominion.

Turning professional in 1932, following a winter of high success in major competition throughout New England and Canada, the trimly built lad formed the first women's ski team for the Montreal S. C., one of the oldest ski clubs in North America. He guided the destinies of this organization so capably that its representatives captured nine open competitions as well as the Provincial team crown.

Though primarily a downhill and slalom runner, Miller also ranks high in the jumping and cross country world.

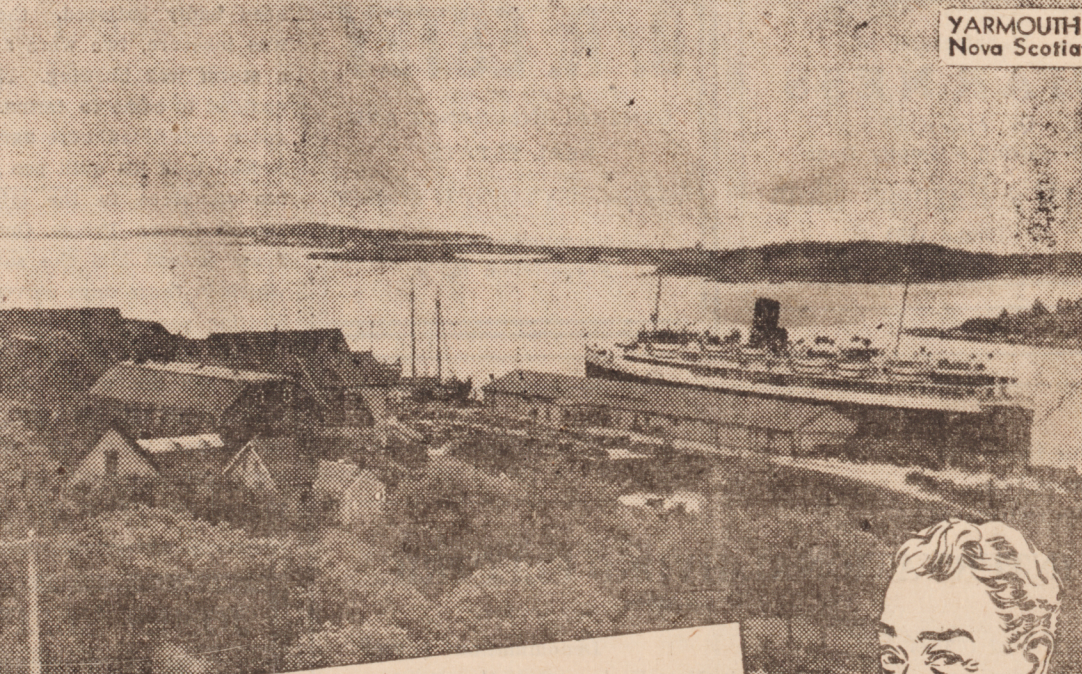
