Dares Dangerous Ice To Save Life

Doctor, Nurse Trudge on Ice For Operation

Hauled Equipment and Operating Table on Sled Over Ice

Operation at Home

Dr. W. M. Jenkins, M. L. A. Reports Patient Out of Danger Today

In one of the most unique medical cases in the history of the province and possibly the medical profession the life of George White, 20, son of Theodore White, The Narrows, Queens County, was saved yesterday. Summoned by an emergency call with a life at stake, Dr. W. M. Jenkins, M.L.A., Gagetown, and Miss Greta Rubins, R.N., loaded operating table, instruments and other surgical necessities on a hand sled and trugged on foot across the dangerous Saint John River ice which was judged unsafe for a horse-drawn vehicle.

Hurriedly setting up their improvised operating room in the home of the youth who was suffering from a dangerous case of appendicitis, the operation was performed, and the patient today was reported as "doing as well as can be expected."

The crossing of the ice was the first of the present winter, Dr. Jenkins was at the bedside of his patient again this morning.

CIVIC AIRPORT TO BE BEFORE NEXT SESSION

Contentious Matters Before Sitting Of County Council

A plan proposed by the City of Fredericton, involving use of part of the property of the Municipal Home at Douglas as an airport, is considered as one of several contentious matters to be brought up at the January session of the York County Council which will get under way next Tuesday afternoon and continue during the week.

The proposition was presented to the County Council at the mid-summer session of that body in 1938 but no action was taken at that time.

In view of increased interest throughout the county in proposed facilities for taking care of York County tubercular patients in a hospital located on County ground, the matter of locating an airport on property of the Home is expected to receive considerable discussion in the Council Chamber.

In the event of the city again presenting its plan for use of part of the Home property, it is believed the Council will suggest that the city purchase properties of David Evanson and Byron Evans which are adjacent to the Home property. With removal of a railroad line now running through the three properties, the airport could then be located on the cleared land back of the highway.

This would leave three houses and part of the land remaining from the Embleton. Evans and Home properties on the river side of the road. It is suggested by several promoters of a York County hospital for tubercular patients that the land on the River side of the road could be utilized for this purpose, and that the Embleton and Evans houses could be made into wards for care of varying cases of tuberculosis.

If the city plan for an airport is not presented again this session, it is considered likely that an alternative scheme will be brought in which will embody the building of an entirely new hospital for tubercular patients in the county. It has been pointed out that this would effect a considerable saving to the county and would involve spending money in York County, which at present goes to River Glade and Saint John County hospitals.

Province Will Have Booth This Year at N. Y. World Fair

Hon. F. W. Pirie Announces Decision Re Booth at Carleton County Banquet; Stresses Value of Tourist and Sportsman Industry, Better Roads

Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines announced at the banquet of the Carleton County Liberal Association held in Woodstock last night that the Province of New Brunswick will this year have a booth in the Canadian Building at the New York World's Fair. The Minister did not disclose the extent of the booth, this still being under consideration. It is also intended to again attend the sportsmen's shows.

"The establishment of this booth will be a sound investment for the province," he stated, "and will return to New Brunswick the cost many times over in increased tourist and sportsman traffic."

He pointed out that the province of Nova Scotia and the State of Maine, two close competitors with New Brunswick for tourist and sportsman travel have signified intention of having a booth in the fair, and it was felt by the government that a New Brunswick booth would be in the interests of the province as a whole.

Speaking of tourist travel, he stated that he would have been the last man to vote to assist in the promotion of more tourist travel while visitors had to ride in a cloud of dust.

"We are now in a position to promote the industry," he declared. "We of New Brunswick can look forward to the tourist industry as one of our greatest industries from now on," he said. He pointed out that last year this province voted \$56,000 for tourist advertising, while the State of Maine is going to spend \$150,000 on the World's Fair. Money for such purposes can be easily wasted, he said, but it is the intention of this province to carefully plan its advertising so that not one dollar of the appropriation but will bring more tourists and increased business and prosperity to the province.

PREMIER DYSART TO OTTAWA WITH N. B. DELEGATION

Will Attend Meeting Next Week

Premier A. A. Dysart will go to Ottawa next week as a member of the delegation of New Brunswick Coal Mine Operators which will present the position of New Brunswick operators before the Federal government. The delegation to Ottawa is part of a general plan to obtain increased business and better financial conditions for New Brunswick operators.

Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, will head the delegation composed of the recently established committee of New Brunswick operators under the chairmanship of H. R. Pettigrove of Marysville.

The committee was formed for the purpose of obtaining better conditions for the New Brunswick coal mining industry, and as a result of part of their activities a brief was prepared for presentation to the federal government.

Plans for a central selling agency for Minto coal, which are now being formulated, are among the activities of the committee.

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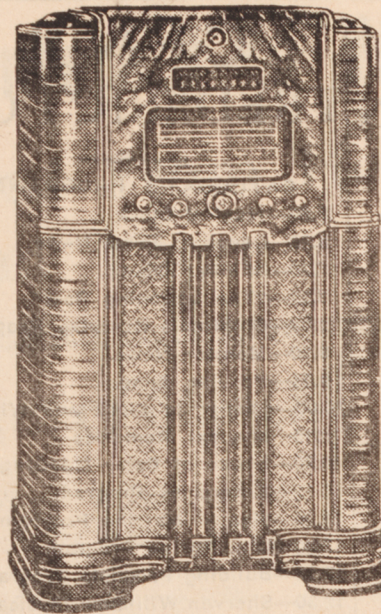
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
