

CAPS GET REVENGE IN 3-1 VICTORY

ONE OF BEST GAMES IN SOME TIME SAW CAPITALS OUTPLAY BORDERITES IN FAST SESSION

Fast, Close Type of Play With Heavy Penalty Count Was Fan Pleaser—Caps Now in First Place Tie—Haining, Thorpe, "Manny" McIntyre Tally

The Fredericton Capitals got their revenge on the St. Stephen Mohawks and again swept into a first place tie with the border crew when they downed the tribe by a 3-1 tally in the Arctic Rink last night. A crowd pleaser all the way through, the tussle featured some of the fastest and cageiest hockey that has been dished up to Fredericton puck fans in some time.

On a sheet of ice that spelled speed all the way, the Capitals with their fast-breaking type of play were in their top form. Although the crowd was not as large as hoped for due to the cold weather, the thousand-odd fans registered their approval of the game that had its wild and woolly spots and saw a total of 12 penalties dished out by Referee Shorty Clark. From the first whistle to the last the speed of the play did not lag. Bill Lifford's green and white clad outfit were playing a smooth-passing, close-checking game that promises to keep the team at the doorstep of the league playdowns. Except for intermittent rushes by the Borderites, the disk was in the dooryard of the Mohawks most of the time, and the locals bossed the play throughout the session.

"Manny" McIntyre made his debut on the Capital lines in this city when he traded off the centre spot with Keenan and Cameron. The colored centreman, who came up from the juniors this year, scored a decided hit with the fans in a dazzling exhibition of speed and puck carrying. McIntyre scored the third Capital marker, while the other two went to Thorpe and Haining. Morehouse for the Caps took three trips to the cooler. McCarroll of the Mohawks drew two rests and a ten minute misconduct term.

The game opened fast with the disk going to the Mohawks, Hughes and McCarroll were chased, with McCarroll also drawing a misconduct, when the two roughed it up after a check on the boards. Middlemiss replaced McCarroll as Hughes came back. It looked like a St. Stephen marker when Lowe carried it in on a three man attack which the Caps left up the ice. Staples did the neatest bit of net minding of the evening when he stopped the shot and came out to smother a quick rebound drive.

Thorpe's Opener

The Caps carried the puck in repeated attacks on the St. Stephen lines for most of the rest of the period. Thorpe and Keenan broke away from their own blue-line. Keenan went through the defence and slipped a pass to Thorpe who drilled a hard shot into the corner of the net for the first score of the game. Keenan drew a rest for cross-checking. Bill McIntyre went to centre and nearly added another when he broke away and beat the single Mohawk defenceman but failed to fool Kelly in the border nets.

Evans Count

Charters notched the single Mohawk marker at the four minute mark in the second frame. His tally was unassisted. Manny McIntyre got

in but failed to beat Kelly. The period was fast with tempers running to a high pitch. Charters and Hughes each drew rests. Charters saved the Mohawks from another Capital goal but drew his rest for laying on the puck when Kelly went down in a mix-up. The period ended 1-1 with Hughes still cooking the penalty seat.

Fast Third

From the first of the third, play went into the Mohawk dooryard. Haining tallied the second Capital marker to break the deadlock and jump the count to 2-1. The Cap winger beat Kelly on a shot that went in a second after a whistle. From the face-off Cameron slipped him a pass that Haining banged into the twines the second time.

Morehouse and McCarroll were chased for mixing it up. With both teams shy a man, Laskey scooped up a loose disk at his blue-line and went up the ice with Manny McIntyre. Laskey beat the defenceman and slid the rubber to McIntyre who fooled the St. Stephen goalie on a hard shot. Morehouse was only on the ice a few seconds when he drew another trip to the cooler. Thorpe took Morehouse's place in the dock and was soon joined by Lowe before the Mohawks had time to make use of their advantage. Laskey replaced Thorpe in the box on a boarding charge and the Caps were one man down to the Borderites for a while as Lowe came back.

Lowe was the only casualty of the game and was forced from the game with a muscle injury when he and Cameron crashed into the boards.

Fights To Draw \$6,000,000

Five New Ring Champs May Be Crowned

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—It takes little daring or imagination to predict a banner year in sports through 1939. The stage is set for it. The public is more sports conscious than ever, there are more, if not better, athletes in every game; and they have bigger and better facilities for strutting their stuff.

It goes without saying there will be new champions crowned by the dozen and new American and world records made by the score. And, of course, the gates will reach new highs in almost every sport. Provided one or more nations don't go completely haywire and start another war.

Mike Jacobs, who is at once Santa Claus and the Simon Legree of the fight game, and an uncanny forecaster for any sports event, predicts some gates "that will knock your eye out." He believes professional bouts alone will draw well over \$6,000,000 this year. Don Budge and Ellsworth Vines soon will start breaking professional tennis financial records and the amateur game will produce a flock of new stars. We'll need them for the chances we are about to say goodbye to the Davis Club which seems due for a nice long trip to Australia. Bobby Riggs appears destined to win the National singles vacated by Budge.

Diamond's Golf Event

Annual Baseball Players' Tournament Is Slated For Lakeland, Florida, Feb. 2 to 5

LAKELAND, Fla., Jan. 13—The annual baseball players' golf tournament which has been held in Sarasota for the past three years, will be played the winter over the Cleveland Heights golf course at Lakeland, February 2, 3, 4 and 5. Jack Russell of the Chicago Cubs, Gerald Walker of the Chicago White Sox and Elden Auker of the Boston Red Sox, comprising the committee in charge of the tournament, invite all ball players who are interested in golf to participate.

Any person in good standing—affiliated with organized ball, including players, umpires, Commissioner Landis, and officials, in both majors and

minors, is eligible. The prize will be the Power Crosby Trophy, which must be won three times for permanent possession. Wes Ferrel, Sam Byrd and Paul Waner already have a leg on the trophy. A 36-hole qualifying round will be held February 2, the first 18 holes in the morning and the second 18 in the afternoon.

The first round match play is scheduled to begin at 1 p.m., February 3, with a driving contest at 4 p.m. The second round match play will be held February 4 and the final of all flights 36 holes and 18 holes for consolation matches February 5.

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
