TIRANO, April 5.—A son was born today to King Zog of Albania and Queen Helena, former American girl. The birth of a Crown Prince was announced by a salute of 105 guns, and was followed by wild rejoicing throughout the tiny kingdom.

**Industry Assistance
Act Is Amended**

Hon. J. B. McNair, attorney-general, yesterday introduced a bill in the Legislature to extend the operation of the act respecting assistance to industry which was passed in 1936. The new act strikes out a preamble which attended to limit in point of time so that the status of the Act was in doubt. It gives the provincial government authority to enter into agreements with the Federal Government for the promotion of lumbering, fishing, mining, or any other industry, and to finance any such agreement on a co-operative basis with Ottawa.

Revive Football**

In an effort to revive interest in soccer football in Fredericton and other parts of the province, a group of enthusiasts will meet here in about a week to consider the resurrection of the old N. B. Football Association under the name "New Brunswick Football League."

The meeting here has been called by Frank Ayers, custodian of the Legislative Building, and a supporter of the Old Country game. Mr. Ayers is now seeking cooperation of the Y.M.C.A. in the formation of a City senior team. Games would be played on College Field or Queen's Square.

ASK WINDSOR'S RETURN
LONDON, April 5.—Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express today urged that the Duke of Windsor be brought back out of exile and that the Duchess of Windsor, formerly the American Wallis Simpson, be entitled to "Her Royal Highness." The present state of affairs was described as a petty injustice.
