GOLD OUTPUT

Production for the month of March for the Province of Ontario totalled 247,954 ounces valued at \$8,711,972 and comparing with output of 238,182 ounces valued at \$8,013,494 in March 1938.

BASE METALS

February output of copper totalled 41,218,288 lbs., a decrease of 7,039,248 lbs. from the previous month and 5,617,667 lbs. lower than production in February 1938, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Canadian output of nickel in February was 2,884,349 lbs. higher at 17,495,366 lbs., an increase of 1,486,843 lbs. over output in February, 1938.

BUSINESS INDEX

Preliminary statistics registered improvement in March, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics; the index of physical volume of business moving to 113.1 from 111.7 in February. When compared with the index in March of last year at 108.8, a gain of nearly 4% was indicated.

STEEL OPERATIONS

For the week beginning April 24th, operations are scheduled at 48.6% of capacity vs. 50.9% in the previous week, a decrease of 2.3 points or 4-1/2%, according to the American Iron & Steel Institute. With the exception of Christmas week last year when schedule for lowest industry was down to 38.3% because of the holiday, the current rate is the lowest for any weekly period since the first week of last October. The peak during recovery in the final quarter last year was 62.6% for the week beginning November 4th, and from that figure the current rate represents a decrease of 14 points or 22.4%. A month ago, the indicated rate was 56.1%, and 32% a year ago.

BRAZILIAN

For the month of March, gross income is shown at \$3,287,149, an increase of \$225,525 over March 1938. Net profit after expenses, but before depreciation and amortization, totalled \$1,667,002, an increase of \$74,938. During the initial quarter of 1939, gross income is reported at \$9,674,869 vs. \$8,992,814. Net after expenses but before depreciation and amortization, totalled \$4,979,384 vs. \$4,722,472 shown in the first three months of 1938.

SAGUENAY POWER

The Company reports a gross operation profit for the first quarter of \$1,121,397 vs. \$1,163,280 in the corresponding period a year ago. RECOVER COINS
BURIED FOR 59
YEARS IN N. S.

PICTOU, May 1 — Sealed beneath the corner stone of the old Pictou Academy building, a large jar crammed with papers, coins and stamps was recovered today from its resting place for 59 years. The jar will be opened at a meeting of the School Board Thursday. Advertising must have been considered important even in 1880 when the corner stone was laid for pasted inside the jar are advertisements of banks, insurance companies, a printing establishment and a drug store. Only the drug store, J. D. B. Fraser and Son, is still in business and the name of R. D. Stiles, then a young clerk with the firm, is scratched on the bottom. Mr. Stiles today did not recall placing his name on the jar.

The papers appear to be in perfect preservation but the coins are tarnished. Impression of the Academy seal appears four times on the wax sealing the jar. School Board Chairman T. A. MacKay Commissioners J. Sim Anderson and J. G. Reeves, clerk J. F. English and members of the academy teaching staff saw the jar removed from its lead container under the corner stone today and only one of them, Commissioner Anderson, saw the corner stone laid. He was then a young boy. The jar is about 9 inches high, 6 inches in diameter.

ORGANIZE UNITED
CHURCH WOMEN

TORONTO, May 1.—Organization of "The Professional Women's Association of The United Church of Canada" was announced recently by Rev. Lydia M. Gruchy, Secretary of the Committee on the Deaconess Order and Women Workers of the United Church.

The new organization was formed in Toronto and comprises graduates of Theological Colleges or training schools who are associated with The United Church or cooperating bodies in a professional or voluntary capacity; deans of women and women members of teaching staffs of the United Church schools and colleges; and United Church women professionally employed by the Church or by cooperating bodies in executive positions.

Purpose of the association is to investigate the whole field of women's work in the church and thus be in a position to recommend or sustain necessary developments; to present with

UNITED CHURCH
MEMBERSHIP
SHOWS INCREASE

TORONTO, May 1 — A considerable increase in membership in The United Church is shown in the statistical report released today by Rev. Dr. Gordon A. Sisco, secretary of the General Council. The membership now totals 707,264, an increase of 8,530 in 1938 over the preceding year. There was also an increase in the number of persons received into The United Church on profession of faith. The report shows that 25,124 were received into The United Church last year on profession of faith, which is an increase of 3852 over the number received the preceding year.

In the 7,422 preaching places of The United Church of Canada \$11,679,391 was raised last year for all purposes, an increase of \$201,300 over the preceding year. Total number of persons under the oversight of The United Church of Canada is now 1,742,622 which shows an increase of 13,000 over 1937. Nearly 36,000 baptisms were performed in United Churches throughout the Dominion, an increase of 2,520 over the previous year.

There are 464,689 families now connected with the United Church of Canada, an increase of 7,300 over the preceding year.

A decrease is shown in the membership in Sunday Schools, but an increase is registered in membership in religious education organization organizations connected with the Church.

An increase of 900 is shown in the membership of men's organizations in The Church. Nearly 20,000 men are members of United Church men's groups.

A total of \$1,482,630 was raised last year in Churches for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund. This is a decrease of \$26,400 from the figures of 1937.

An increase of \$40,000 is shown in the money raised by women's associations in the United Church. Total amount raised by them was \$1,429,718. Sunday Schools raised \$666,414 which is an increase of \$4,300 over the preceding year.

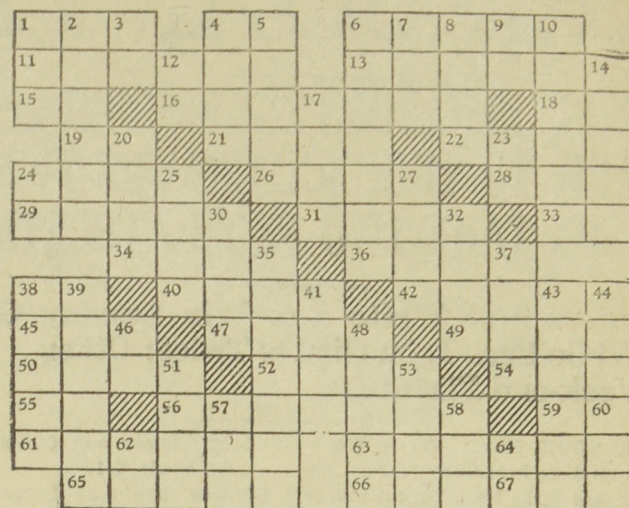

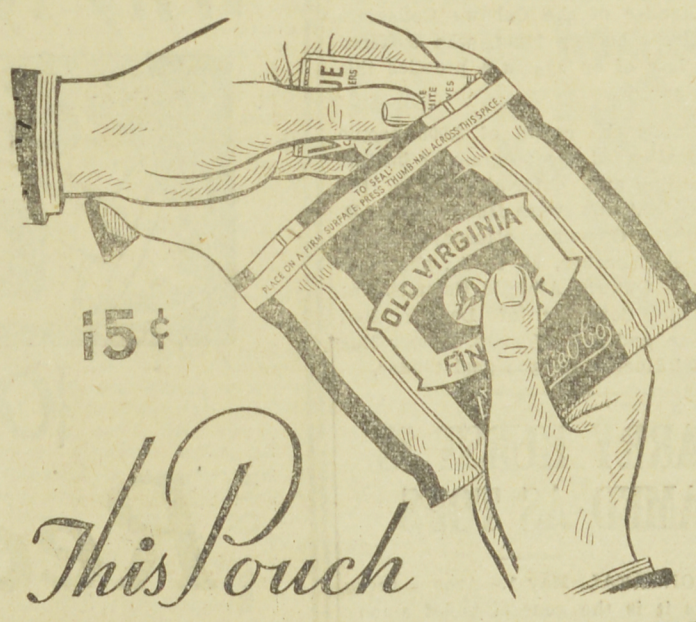
