

RED SOX, YANKS, TIE FOR FIRST PLACE

LOWLY SENATORS SHOW SURPRISING SPARK TO TROUNCE CHAMPS TWICE AS SOX TAKE TWO FROM ATHLETICS

Tigers and White Sox Win Sunday Games, While Bees Trim Giants Twice: Other Week-end Fixtures

NEW YORK, May 1.—Three Washington pitchers headed by "Lefty" Joe Krakauskas held New York Yankees to four hits yesterday to give the Senators their second straight victory of the series 3-2 and drop the champions into a tie with Boston for first place in the American League.

At Philadelphia, Boston defeated the Athletics 3-1 behind Jim Bagby's seven-hit pitching. George Caster went seven innings for the A's and allowed five hits, but his mates failed to hit in the pinches.

Detroit Tigers thumped out, 19 safeties to wallop Cleveland Indians 14-1 and make them even in the first two engagements in their three-game series.

Mike Krevich, who patrols centre-field for Chicago White Sox, had a field day as the Sox nosed out St. Louis Browns 6-5.

The Washington "Jinx" struck the Yankees twice Saturday. First the Yanks lost their second league game of the season to the Senators 3-1 and then lost the services of Joe Di Maggio, star centrefielder and home run artist, for perhaps a week.

Allowing only eight scattered hits and striking out 13 batsmen, Bob Feller registered his third straight

pitching victory and Cleveland defeated Detroit 7-1.

Chicago shaded St. Louis 9-8 after a see-saw battle. Boston and Philadelphia played a nip-and-tuck ball game with the 3-3 verdict going to the Bostonians in the ninth when a single by pinch hitter Peacock scored Dorri from second.

Fette Beats Giants
NEW YORK, May 1.—Lou Fette, veteran righthander, held New York Giants under control until he had two out in the ninth while chalking up his third victory of the season for Boston Bees, 3-2.

At Chicago Rockie Gene Lillard won his second game, scattering 10 hits as the Cubs beat St. Louis Cardinals 4-1.

Luke Hamlin's seven-hit pitching and some timely hitting by his teammates gave Brooklyn Dodgers, playing at home, their second successive victory over Philadelphia Phillies, 3-1.

Lanky Lon Warneke, St. Louis ace pitcher, missed out on "no-hit" baseball fame Saturday by the margin of one scratch single as he whitewashed Cubs 2-0.

GOLAB SLATED FOR IMPERIALS

OTTAWA, May 1.—Tony Golab, 20-year-old flying wing with Sarnia Imperials of the Ontario Football Union last season, has arrived from Fort William, Ont., and it was reliably reported he will line up with Ottawa Rough Riders of the Inter-provincial Football Union this fall.

A sensation in an exhibition game here between Sarnia and Ottawa last season, Golab will enroll at St. Patrick's College here this fall. He will be employed here during the summer.

George McNeil, former team-mate of Murray Griffin of Rough Riders at Lovola University, California also arrived last night and will likely be in a Rough Rider uniform. He is a native of Brandon Man., and has been working in Northern Ontario mines.

George Sprague who played a season with Rough Riders before going to Queen's University, is in business with his brother, Dave here, and also will be trying to make the local big four team when training begins.

Dave has been outstanding middle for several seasons and George was chosen all-star at the same position for the last three seasons in the Senior Intercollegiate loop.

SAINT JOHN JR'S. ARE OUSTED BY MONTREAL FIVE

MONTREAL, May 1.—Montreal Young Men's Hebrew Association staged off a threatening last minute rally Saturday night to defeat Saint John Young Men's Christian Association 31-27 in the first of a two game total point series for the Dominion junior basketball championship. The second game will be played here today.

Just on the verge of his 21st birthday, the dark-haired Hurst is the most talked of boxer in this city today and as newly-crowned King of the Dominion's amateur lightweight class has had a hatful of offers to turn to the monied game.

Hurst, who left for Toronto where he will take part night in a ring tourney pitting a Canadian team against boxers from the United States, won the lightweight title here last Friday night by knocking out Harvey Dube of Windsor, Ont., in the second round of a three-round bout.

BUNNY AUSTIN LOSES FAITH IN WORD OF STARS

TORONTO, May 1 Austin has lost faith in the stars.

At a meeting here to explain moral re-arrangement, for which he is crusading in Canada the slim British tennis ace lost his serious attitude for a while to regale the listeners with the story of his district of astrology.

"It was the night before the Wimbledon finals of 1932 when I played Ellsworth Vines of the United States," Bunny began. "A friend called me up and told me I had nothing to worry about. He had been studying the stars and I couldn't lose."

"Well, Ellsworth and I both were pretty bad at the start of the match. But I wasn't worried; the stars had said I would win. Even when Vines improved and took the first set 6-4 I wasn't worried after he had won the second set 6-2. You see, I had implicit faith in the stars."

"We went into the third set and Vines continued to improve and I continued to be as bad as ever. Not until he had me 5-0 in games and 40-15 in the sixth game did I begin to suspect something was wrong. It was too late then."

"There was a 'ping and beside me there was a smudge. It undoubtedly was Vines' service. I have never believed in astrology since."

MONTREAL ROYALS NEWARK DIVIDE DOUBLEHEADER

MONTREAL, May 1.—Newark Bears chalked up a 5-4 victory over Montreal Royals in an extra inning nightcap yesterday after being shut out in the opener 1-0.

Jersey City ran its winning streak to three straight before an overflow crowd of 29,362 customers by taking both ends of its double-header with Toronto Maple Leafs 6-1 and 1-0.

Buffalo swept a double-header with Syracuse Chiefs before 4,000 fans, winning the opener 4-2 and the nightcap 6-2.

Lefty Bill Weir hurled Toronto Leafs to a 3-0 shutout over Newark Saturday.

Royals were also victims of a shut-out as Roy Joiner pitched Jersey City to a sparkling 3-0 victory.

Trailing 0-6 going into the ninth inning Buffalo went wild and scored eight runs but Baltimore came back with three runs in their half of the final frame to win 9-8.

Landing on Pitcher Jake Mooly for six runs in the first inning Rochester went on to swamp Syracuse 11-1.

MONTREAL BIDS FOR 1940 MEETS

MONTREAL, May 1.—Montreal ambassador of swimming, Pat Earl, will represent Quebec at the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association annual meeting in the western city.

Harold Daley will preside. It is reported from a reliable source that Daley will be returned to the presidency unanimously.

Earl left with a packed portfolio. He will bid for the 1940 Olympic swimming trials on behalf of the Quebec Section. He will also ask the C. A. S. C. to bill the Gale Trophy championship for scientific swimming to Montreal for 1940. Another request will be one from the Esteral Club to stage an open Canadian senior meet on August 12th.

Any other business the travelling airman had to discuss at the Winnipeg meeting was kept under the hat. It is reported that the "Learn to swim" Campaign will gain new impetus at this meeting with President Daley urging all sections to boost this phase of their work.

The annual meeting is being held in conjunction with the Canadian swimming championship now in progress at Winnipeg.

CASEY TO MEET WAGNER NEXT

MONTREAL, May 1.—Steve Casey, noted wrestler from County Kerry Ireland, will face "Strangler" Bob Wagner in the main bout at the Forum on Tuesday night according to an announcement made by Matchmaker Jack Ganson today.

This would be 100 per cent perfect with the fans if at the same time they were sure that Danno O'Mahony would be getting the same chance to go into action—but Danno against the world's champion—Cy Williams to finally decide the rivalry between the pair.

Casey advised Ganson on Thursday that he would be coming here. The big Irishman apparently figures that he can do what Danno did to Cy, but can make it stick in the record book. So his idea is to invade Montreal. Ganson promptly went looking for a tough matman to face Casey and so, he selected Bob Wagner. The old pain maker will go into action in the main battle on Tuesday against Steve.

In the meantime the battle for Danno's rights continues. Ganson and the public are right with the Forum in demanding Williams to come back into the ring against O'Mahony.

POMPEYS TAKE ENGLISH CUP FROM WOLVERHAMPTON

LONDON, May 1.—Outclassing the famous Wolverhampton Wanderers, before the King and Queen and 100,000 spectators, at Wembley Stadium, Saturday, Portsmouth triumphed 4-1 to capture the English Cup for the first time in the club's history. On top throughout, the southerners led 2-0 a half time.

The two gland-treated teams waged a thrilling battle but after the first 10 minutes of play Portsmouth's well-balanced eleven assumed distinct superiority over Major Frank Buckley's youngsters, who entered the final heavy favorites.

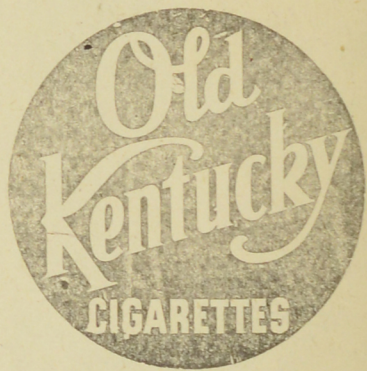

NEW YORK, May 1.—It's on to the Derby for Johnstown. William Woodward's long-striding bay colt proved Saturday beyond a doubt he'll be the horse to beat in next Saturday's Kentucky classic by waltzing to a six-length victory in the one mile, 70-yard Wood Memorial before a packed crowd of 18,000 at Jamaica.

Making his bid as the field of eight headed into the last turn, the big son of Jamestown-Lafrance swept around Joe W. Brown's T. M. Dorsett and galloped home with nothing else in sight, while the deposed Derby favorite, William Ziegler Jr.'s El Chico, ran into trouble and finished way back to sixth place.

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
