"TWINKLETOES" COMES BACK WITH HOMER AND TWO SINGLES TO GIVE YANKEES 8-4 WIN OVER ATHLETICS

Foxx's Homer In Eleventh Gives Sox Win Over Nats; Indians, Browns, Cubs, Dodgers, Phils, Reds, Also Win

NEW YORK, April 26.—New York Yankees celebrated announcement of Joe Di Maggio's engagement by belting three pitchers for 13 hits and an 8-4 American League victory over Philadelphia Athletics. Di Maggio confirmed reports he will marry Dorothy Olson, motion picture actress, next winter or the winter following.

With big Red Ruffing and Bump Hadley splitting an eight-hit hurling performance, the Yankee big guns went to work on Bud Thomas, Edgar Smith and "Line Drive" Nelson. George Selkirk, Canadian-born player, paced the attack with a homer and two singles.

Jimmy Foxx timed homer No. 2 of the season to the second to give his Red Sox a 6-5 victory over Washington Senators in 11 innings at Boston. With one out in the second extra frame, Foxx whaled Joe Kraskauskas' first pitch out of the park.

Bob Feller pitched four-hit ball, fanned nine, and gave only three walks, as the Indians pounded Chicago White Sox for a 7-1 victory at Cleveland. Bruce Campbell, who went to the Cleveland outfield to replace Earl Averill, who hadn't been hitting well, connected for two circuit blows that were good for five runs.

At Detroit, John Kramer, 21-year-old rookie, limited the Tigers to six

scattered hits as he won his major League debut for St. Louis Browns 7-2. Detroit converted a glugle and a triple into two runs in the opening inning, but after that Kramer was in complete command.

NEW YORK, April 26.—Chicago Cubs clung to their National League leadership yesterday, when Bill Lee pitched them to a 5-3 home field victory over Pittsburgh for his second triumph of the season. It was the Cubs' third straight success and their second in a row over the Pirates.

The Dodgers ended their winless streak at four straight by nipping Boston Bees 3-2 behind the steady seven hit pitching of Luke Hamlin at Brooklyn.

The Phillies stretched their undefeated string to five straight with an easy 7-1 victory over New York Giants at Philadelphia.

Cincinnati Reds, the "people's choice" to win the league pennant, clipped St. Louis Cardinals 5-1.

LAWRENCE, Kan., April 26.—Don't sell Glenn Cunningham short in his duel with Sydney Wooderson.

The modest Kansas has a habit of winning those races he sets his heart on capturing. And there's no reason to believe he won't go after Wooderson in the Princeton mile June 17.

They never have met. Wooderson holds the world (outdoor) mile record of 4:06.4. Cunningham sped a mile in 4:04.4 indoors—the fastest ever recorded for a human—but only outdoor marks are recognized as world records.

Track experts hope the duel will wipe out the Englishman's 4:06.4; possibly answer the query Glenn's own speed first raised: "Can anyone run a four-minute mile?"

Gayle Talbot, Associated Press sports writer who saw Wooderson grow from an unknown to world record holder, picks the Englishman.

"The frail looking Londoner," he wrote, is "capable of beating Cunningham and any time he meets him in a special race."

The reticent Kansas appeared unimpressed today. He said, "sure. Wooderson may win."

Talbot credited the Briton with as much stamina as Cunningham; with a greater burst of speed at the finish.

So how will Cunningham race Wooderson? Will he try to run him into the ground in the first three quarters? Or will he discount Talbot's estimate and try to win with his famous "kick" in the final furlough?

"I don't know," said Glenn. "It will depend largely upon how I feel. If I'm right, I'll run my own race. If he can beat that he will win."

BLUE PETER IS FAVORED TODAY

LONDON, April 26.—The Earl of Roseberry's Blue Peter tonight was quoted 11 to 2 favorite in the final callover at the Victoria Club tonight to win the classic Two Thousand Guinea stakes at Newmarket tomorrow. In last night's callover Blue Peter was 9 to 2 favorite.

Fox Cub, owned by E. Esmond, held as second choice, but his price lengthened from 11 to 2 to 100 to 15. The Aga Khan's Dhoni eased from 100 to 15 to 7 to 1 to share third slot in the betting with Sir Abe Bailey's Fairstone which shortened from 8 to 1.

Port Arthur Fans Give Support To Champions

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., April 26 — Port Arthur Bear cats Booster Club has launched a campaign to raise funds for expenses incurred by the hockey team while battling for the Allan Cup in Montreal.

The Port Arthur team captured the famed cup on Monday night.

It will be six weeks since the Cats left here to win the western crown and move to Montreal to face Royals in the best-of-five series for the Allan Cup.

The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association provides for travelling and hotel expenses but while it permits

payment of players for lost time, it does not make definite provisions for such. All the Port Arthur players left jobs here, and lost regular wages while playing in the finals and it is principally to make up this loss that the collecting campaign got underway.

The committee in charge of collections has not announced the sum expected but declared subscriptions have come from Geraldton, whose hockey team lost out to Bear Cats in the Thunder Bay finals, and from parts of Minnesota where the Port Arthur team members are favorites.

Jimmy Adamick May Again Make Bid For Ring Honors

DETROIT, April 26 — In the twilight of his glorious career, Dr. Nikola Tesla, one of the world's greatest inventors, is co-operating in the rehabilitation of Jimmy Adamick, a man who a few short months ago was considered a hopelessly shattered fighting machine.

Dr. Tesla, father of modern methods of generation and distribution of electrical energy, says Adamick is now ready to return to the ring again and "he is certain to become the next heavyweight champion of the world."

It seemed that the young "Midland Mauler's" career was ended definitely when he suffered brain concussion and partial paralysis resulting from a beating by Roscoe Toles at Detroit on Sept. 28. The bout was stopped in the second round after Adamick had been floored four times. Adamick was unconscious for 11 hours. At first, physicians feared that his injuries might prove fatal. He was in hospital for about six weeks.

RECOVERY

"The boy has recovered completely," Dr. Tesla says. "His remarkable recovery was due largely to the ability of Dr. Albert S. Crawford at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit and partially to Adamick's exceptional constitution. Adamick visited me here this week and he seemed in excellent condition. I have advised him to re-

SHERIFF SHIPLEY RESIGNS FROM SPORTS OFFICE

AMHERST, April 26.—Completing over 11 years of service as secretary of the Maritime branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, Sheriff C. D. Shipley yesterday presented his resignation to President Charles C. Gillespie of Moncton. His resignation will be effective at the semi-annual meeting of the Branch to be held on May 9 or 11 either the day before or the day following the meeting of the Nova Scotia Baseball Association.

Sheriff Shipley stated last October that it was his intention to resign but delegates at the meeting would not listen to his retirement. Today he asserted that a younger man should be in the secretary's office as he felt he had performed his duties toward amateur sport.

Sportsmen in the Maritime Provinces and in other parts of Canada as well will regret to hear of the action taken by Sheriff Shipley. When he took over his present office in 1927 the affairs of the Branch, it was said, were in an unhealthy condition. The Branch was under suspension by the A.A.U.C., it was stated, and had debts amounting to \$757.44. All bills were paid and since Sheriff Shipley compiled a series of surpluses in his financial statements. He intimated yesterday that he would retire with a balance of approximately \$200 in the treasury.

In the past 12 years nearly \$5,000 has been spent in assisting Maritime athletes in representation at Olympic trials as well as Olympic and British Empire Games.

In the years of service given to amateur sport, Sheriff Shipley attended the Olympic Games at Los Angeles as well as the British Empire Games at Hamilton and Olympic trials held in other Canadian cities. One of his prized possessions is a certificate presented to him while he was attending the Olympic Games at Los Angeles.

BOSTON FANS HONOR BRUINS

BOSTON, April 26. — Two thousand hockey fans honored Boston Bruins Saturday night at a dinner in Boston Garden, dining at tables on the same floor on which Bruins captured the Stanley Cup final from Toronto.

They heard Mayor Maurice J. Tobin, President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League, owner Weston Adams, and Manager Art Ross praise the league champion, who beat New York Rangers in the preliminary cup series and then went on to rout Toronto in the final.

In awarding the Calder Trophy to Goalie Frankie Brimsek for being the outstanding rookie of the campaign, the league president said it was one trophy Brimsek could retain permanently. Other awards Brimsek won may be held for only one year.

Calder also amended Ross widely publicized statement that the Bruins were the best club the manager had seen in his 37 years in hockey.

"I will go a step further and say that the Bruins are one of the best teams ever," Calder asserted.

Ross, whose own name appears on the Stanley Cup five times as both player and manager, and who can trace his hockey experiences back to 1896, reiterated his claim.

"And as for Eddie Shore's playing," he said, "show me anyone whose name is on the cup who could come up to the standard of play which Eddie showed this past season—his 13th in the league—and I will eat the cup."

LOU AMBERS IN SLASHING WIN OVER MELODY

The actress said they will be married some time this summer. A honeymoon will be postponed until after the baseball season ends.

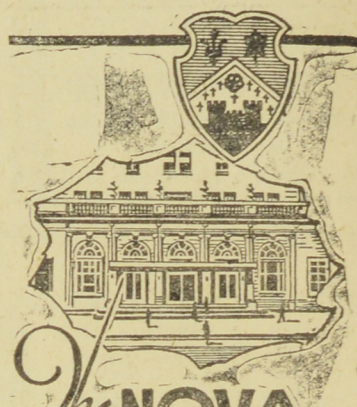
DOM LABBE TO CASH WITH ROY MACINTYRE

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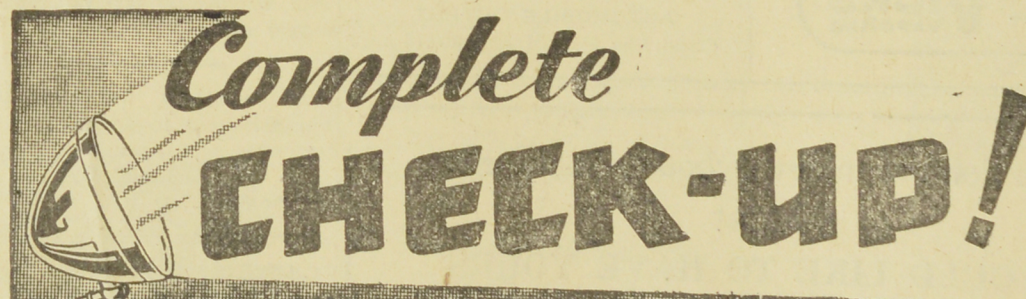
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
