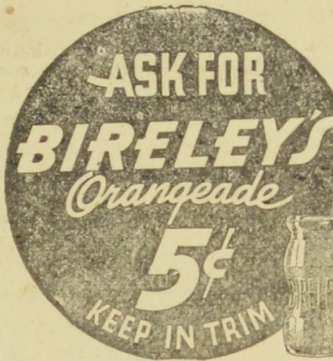

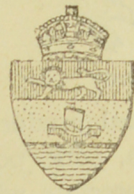

losis was a real challenge to the lead-
ers of Canadian public life.

Now, after 38 years of untiring ef-
fort, the death rate has been reduced
to about 55 per 100,000 of population
there are 8,500 sanatoria and treat-
ment beds, and approximately \$200,-
000 is raised in a year from the sale
of Christmas seals alone to help pri-
vide funds for the never ending fight
to eradicate the plague.

Throughout its life-time, the asso-
ciation has maintained its aims to
educate, agitate, stimulate, coordi-
nate and cooperate, without interfering
with or embarrassing local efforts on
behalf of the cause.

The Canadian Tuberculosis Asso-
ciation strives to maintain a constan-
tly widening educational program. It
has helped to initiate the enactment
of the Tuberculosis Act, and has as-
sisted every local effort to provide
clinics and sanatoria. The association
has instituted and made health in-
vestigations, has collected, assembled
and disseminated statistics and infor-
mation.

Throughout its history, the asso-
ciation has had the generous support
and assistance of the Dominion gov-
ernment and its departments, provin-
cial and municipal authorities and
health officers, the Red Cross Society,
the life insurance companies and ex-
ecutives, medical and other profes-
sional societies, the churches, schools
and colleges, and has worked in a
spirit of international good-will with
the National Tuberculosis Association
of the United States.

SECOND TRIAL
OF BARBOUR
GETS UNDERWAY

DALHOUSIE, April 26.—Twenty-
five year old Robert Barbour pleaded
his innocence to a charge of murder-
ing his "girl friend", Margaret Har-
ris, 24 year old girl who died last
April of head injuries allegedly in-
flicted with a hammer.

Barbour subsequently convicted
and sentenced to be hanged won an
appeal for a new trial which began
yesterday when one witness was
heard, Mrs. Richard Barbour, sister
of Margaret and sister-in-law of the
defendant.

Mr. Justice J. H. A. L. Fairweather
is presiding over the court.

ONLY WAR WILL
HINDER ROYAL
VISIT TO CANADA

LONDON, April 26.—It was official-
ly stated today that nothing short
of an actual war will change any
plans for the Royal visit to Canada,
and preparations are going ahead
steadily for the trip. It was learned
that one change in the plans may
take place, however, and that the
King and Queen may travel to the
Dominion in the Empress of Aus-
tralia, a passenger ship.
