## Gold Enriches Coloring Of Salpiglossis Flowers

Flowers shaped like lilies, of deep crimson, gold, and purple, with every color enriched by conspicuous veining of gold, are borne by the salpiglossis plant.

By no means a new flower, it still is little known, though one of the most beautiful of all the annuals. And while one of the easiest of flowers to grow, some home gardeners say they always fail with it.

To make sure of success, give it a sunny row in the vegetable plot, sow it when you put in the radishes, cultivate it with the hoe and otherwise let it alone. In due time it will reward you with a wealth of beautiful blossoms, withstanding even severe drouth with great endurance.

It does not like to be transplanted, though when plants are well grown in pots they can be transplanted with good results. When sown in company of other plants, it often sulks and refuses to bloom. Apparently it likes sunshine and plenty of room. After growing to a few inches in height it may stand still for many days, but if planted in a place it likes, it will start to grow again and bloom profusely.

Plant breeders have greatly improved the size and color range of the salpiglossis and have developed

strains which flower more freely, and on shorter stems than the older types. The coloring of the salpiglossis is unique; no other flowers provide the same rich blends of rose, pink, blue, violet, crimson and maroon. The petals have a velvety texture, and they make beautiful decorative arrangements.

## Recovers Dog After Two Year, 7,000 Mile Hike

PRETORIA, April 26 — Midget a Maltese poodle, has been found again after a search lasting two years and extending over 7,000 miles.

Her master, P. Winter, left her in his car at Krugersdorp. When he came back she was gone. Some months later, he heard that a poodle like Midget had been seen in Durban. He wrote to the Durban S. P. C. A., and learned that the dog found had been given to a woman who had gone to England.

He wrote to the R. S. P. C. A. in London and when the tourist was at last traced it was found that she had given the poodle away to another Durban family.

So Mr. Winter travelled to Durban to find that Midget's new mistress, a little girl, refused to give up her pet. However, her parents agreed when Mr. Winter offered them ten guineas and another pedigree poodle.

When he got her back, Midget licked his hand.

## DETROIT ANGLER REELS IN BODY OF BROTHER

DETROIT, April 26 — Frank King, 47, fishing in the Detroit River, cast at a floating object and reeled in the body of his brother, Henry, 51.

Frank was having a pleasant Sunday's fishing with a friend. He had no idea that his brother was dead.

Henry was last seen on Saturday morning when he left home to look for a job on the waterfront. He was a seaman. An autopsy revealed that he had been dead before his body entered the water and that death had been caused by heart attack. It was presumed, that he had suffered the attack while standing on the edge of a pier and fallen into the river.

## SMART GOVERNOR FOOLS MURDERER

BELLEVILLE, Pa., April 26. — Ernest M. Hipple, 22, a hillbilly, paid for the sins of pride and vanity and for the crime of murder this week. He was electrocuted at Rockview penitentiary.

Hipple killed Mrs. Jennie Porter, 70, near Whellersville, Pa., February 7, 1938, while robbing her.

Convicted and sentenced to death, he appeared to the pardon board for clemency. The appeal was denied. Two alienists examined him and were convinced that he was so dull-witted he could not distinguish right from wrong.

Another appeal was made to the board and the report of the alienists made an impression on its members. But Lieut. Gov. Samuel S. Lewis, its chairman, was suspicious.

He got himself admitted disguised as a law breaker, to the Sullivan county jail at Laports, where Hipple was then confined. There he heard Hipple boast at length and in detail to his pals of the bull pen how he had fooled the alienists by "acting dumb."

Lewis reported to the board on Thursday and it decided not to intervene. Hipple died quietly without comment.

## QUEBEC HOUSE MAY PROROGUE DURING WEEK

QUEBEC, April 26. — Possibilities of prorogation this week of the Legislative session which opened in January were studied today by observers.

Attention was drawn to the statement of Premier Duplessis in the House before it adjourned last Thursday that an attempt would be made to prorogue before the end of the week. But some held that this might be impossible in view of new legislation, expected to be introduced.

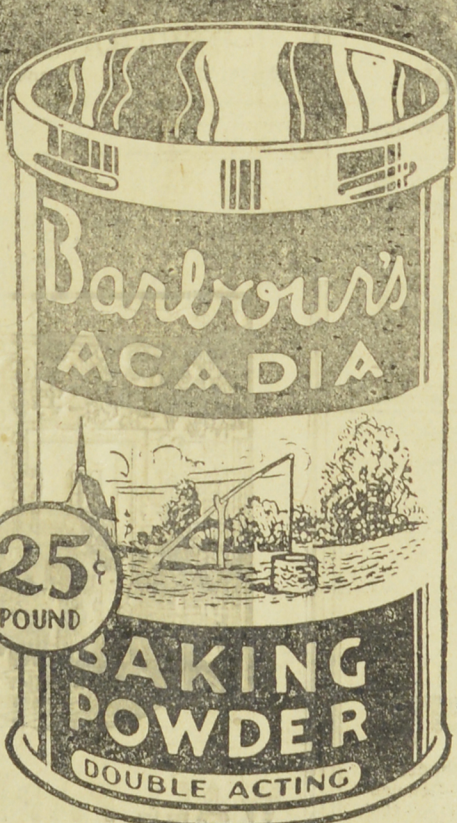
