# N. B. Paper Industry May Suffer

## EFFECT OF LOSS AUSTRALIAN NEWS PRINT UNCERTAIN

Industries Now Being Developed to Supply 100,000 Tons

### Two-Thirds of Need

Canada Now Supplies 150,000 Tons Of Paper Per Year

New Brunswick pulpwood operators and others connected with the newsprint industry as primary producers, were uncertain today the effect the possible loss of the Australian newsprint market may have on New Brunswick's industry. According to word received from Sydney, Australia today, the newspaper industries of that country are beginning a project which will supply locally 100,000 tons of paper used in the news industry. This would mean the loss of two-thirds of the Canadian market in Australia since that country uses 150,000 tons per year, supplied by Canada.

It is understood that a considerable amount of New Brunswick newsprint goes to the Australian market. The indirect effect of the loss of the market may be more severely felt here, it is stated by reliable authorities, since the loss of the market by other Canadian provinces may divert surplus stock to markets now supplied by New Brunswick.

From one point of view, although 100,000 tons of newsprint is a considerable quantity, it is small when compared with the possible production of certain pulp mills. One mill in New Brunswick has a capacity of turning out 100,000 tons in 60 days.

## Mrs. T. A. Belmore Passed Away In Victoria Hospital

The death occurred at four o'clock yesterday afternoon at Victoria Public Hospital of Mrs. T. A. Belmore of this city, after an illness of several weeks, she having been admitted to the hospital for treatment only eight days ago.

Mrs. Belmore was formerly Adelaide Stables, daughter of the late George and Isabella (MacAllister) Stables of Newcastle, N. B., where she spent the early years of her life. Since coming to this city at the time of her marriage, Mrs. Belmore had endeared herself to a very large circle of friends by her genial manner and her many acts of thoughtfulness and hospitality, interesting herself particularly in those needing assistance or cheer.

The late Mrs. Belmore was a valued member of St. Paul's Church. Besides having been a faithful and efficient Sunday School teacher, she was an active member of the Missionary Society and served for a long period in the Ladies' Aid. In the death of Mrs. Belmore the Golden Rule Circle of King's Daughters has suffered a great loss; her fellow workers in this organization will long remember her willingness and ability in answering its calls for service. These outside interests to which Mrs. Belmore gave so generously of her time and talents were never allowed to interfere with her sense of duty and deepest devotion to the members of her immediate family.

Surviving are her husband, Thomas A. Belmore, two sons, Stewart and Donald of this city; three brothers, James, William and Stewart Stables of Newcastle; two sisters, Mrs. A. J. Ferguson of Newcastle, and Mrs. Joseph Cook of Dorchester, N. B., and an aunt, Miss Clara MacAllister who lived with her.

The sincerest sympathy of a large circle of acquaintances is extended to the bereaved family.

The funeral will take place from the late home on Saturday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock with interment in Wilmet Extension of Rural Cemetery, service to be conducted by Rev. A. F. MacLean of St. Paul's Church.

## MOVE TO NEW LABORATORY AT STATION HERE

New Plant Pathological Laboratory In Use This Week

### Modern Building

Extensive Virus Disease Studies Carried Out This Season

The Dominion Plant Pathological Laboratory at Fredericton this week moved into its new \$12,000 laboratory and office building at the Dominion experimental station. Constructed during the past fall and winter, the new building is a two-storey frame construction with fireproof of asbestos shingle siding and fireproof roofing.

One of the most up-to-date buildings for its purpose in the Dominion, the laboratory has an attached, especially constructed greenhouse for virus disease research work. The laboratory, which in co-operation with the experimental station is the centre of virus-resistant potato culture for the Dominion, is at present experimenting with and testing several types of disease-resistant potatoes developed by the experimental station.

D. J. McLeod, officer in charge of the laboratory, stated this morning that tests are now being made of several varieties of potatoes which have been exposed to mild mosaic. These disease-resistant plants have been termed the "Million Dollar Potato" because of the great benefits which will be realized by the potato industry through savings in spray materials, diseased stock, and waste.

The new laboratory building consists of three offices, a library, three laboratory rooms, three storage rooms, and a special incubator room for growing fungi and organisms which are connected with disease in potatoes.

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## EXPECTS LARGER POTATO ACREAGE IN PROVINCE

High Late Shipping Prices May Overdo The Industry

One of the leading agriculturists in the province today expressed the belief that the potato industry will be over-done this year. C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, this city, stated today that current high prices due to last year's crop shortage and also the high market demand, are apt to upset the industry for this year.

It was pointed out that in the past, increased acreage is the order regardless of economic conditions, in the next year after a season of good potato prices. Mr. Bailey looks forward to increased acreage this year.

Unless there is a period of warm rain in the next few days, farmers in the province look forward to a late season. It was pointed out this morning that there is still much frost in the ground, and at the same time the land will need moisture before preparations of the land and planting and seeding can get under way. Usually farmers in the province get on the land about May 15. Unless there is a change in weather conditions the date will be considerably later than this.

### COMMITTEE MEETING

The central committee for the forthcoming visit of the King and Queen to Fredericton is meeting this evening. Preparations for the visit have been largely completed, it is understood, and the committee is now cleaning up minor details. With the enlistment of 500 volunteers for service on the day of the visit, a sufficient guard will have been formed, it is stated. Police, members of the Canadian Legion, Scouts, Cubs, and others, are assisting in the work of policing the Royal route.

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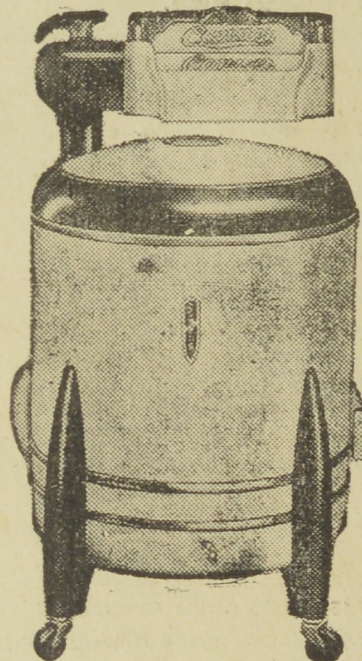
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
