## N. B. LIVESTOCK BREEDER WILL BE HONORED

### Presentation At The Annual Meeting On January 25

On behalf of the New Brunswick Branch of the Canadian Holstein Friesian Association, Hon. A. C. Taylor will present a framed and inscribed photograph of the famous champion bull, Lonsdale Ne Plus Sir Model, to the breeder and owner, M. L. McCarthy, Lonsdale Farm, Sussex. The presentation will be made at the annual meeting of the Association to be held in the Admiral Beatty Hotel, Saint John on the afternoon of January 15. Several addresses are featured on the program of the session.

Lonsdale Ne Plus Sir Model was senior and grand champion Holstein bull at the 1938 Royal Winter Fair at Toronto and more recently was the unanimous choice of Canadian and United States judges as the champion all-American two-year-old bull of his breed.

Speakers expected to be heard are H. W. Atkinson, Fredericton Junction, president of the New Brunswick Ayrshire Club; Mr. McCarthy, Dr. L. H. Newman, Ottawa, Dominion cerealist, whose address will be on "The Management of a Working Herd of Holsteins"; C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Fredericton Dominion Experimental Station, who will speak on pasturage; George M. Clemons, Brantford, Ont., secretary of the Canadian Holstein-Friesian Association, who will read a paper on "The position of the Holstein Breed in Canada"; A. B. Carpenter, Hampstead, president of the New Brunswick branch, who will outline the breed's position in this province; J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture, who will speak on "The Holstein's Advantages Under Present Conditions," and Stanley Wood, Fredericton, New Brunswick livestock superintendent, on "Suggestions to Holstein Breeders." The business meeting will follow the addresses.

## TALENTED ARTISTS IN RECITAL HERE

A capacity audience heard chamber music of the highest calibre played by a virtuoso ensemble of artists last evening in the Provincial Normal School. The Community Concert Association's presentation of the Barrere-Britt Concertino was an artistic success well in advance of any presentation since inception of the community concerts in Fredericton.

The limpid tones and exquisite sentency of Georges Barrere's flute playing and the widely fluctuating sentiments of Horace Britt's cello were not lost on the local audience who demanded and received a generous number of encores. The complete ensemble of flute, cello, violin, viola and piano were recalled several times at the conclusion of the program for encores and bows.

The concertino last evening proved that an artistic group need not necessarily "play down" to a Fredericton audience to receive hearty response.

The beautifully tragic Andante of the Rimsky-Korsakov Quintet and the two movements of the Beethoven Minuet in G played as a closing encore.

Mischa Elzon, violinist, Frank L. Clawson, violist, and Jerome Rappaport, pianist, showed an artistic appreciation of all the works played at last evening's concert and displayed in solo and ensemble parts the results of mutual understanding of the ideas of the masters whose works they played.

**RAISED BRIDGE**

The bridge of the York Street crossing over the back drain is being raised approximately two feet by a crew of men under the City Engineer's department to prevent the clogging of ice during freshet conditions. Formerly the stringers of the bridge were below the water level in the spring time, it is stated, and a clogging of the drain at this point resulted. The improvement will greatly remedy conditions.

## Board of Trade To Make Drive For New Members During Year

### Will Appoint Membership Committee At Council Meeting Tomorrow—Committee on Hotel to Report—Options Understood to Have Been Completed—To Visit Montreal Re Completion Financial Arrangements

Appointment of standing committees for the year, including a special committee on membership, and the consideration of the president's report, will be taken up at the first meeting of the new council of the Fredericton Board of Trade which will be held tomorrow morning. E. C. Atkinson, re-elected president at the annual meeting last week, will preside at the meeting which will be held in the City Club at 10.30.

The report of the hotel committee will be one of the leading features of the meeting, it is expected. It is understood that the committee will report the completion of options on certain properties as prospective sites for the hotel building.

On Thursday the president will go to Montreal to confer on Friday with officials of the hotel chain interested in the project and complete arrangements for the financial set-up, according to a statement by Mr. Atkinson.

The Board of Trade looks forward to an expanded program this year. It is stated, and anticipates an increased membership roll.

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## FORMER WARDEN YORK COUNTY DIES SUDDENLY

### William E. Nason of Nasonworth Died Yesterday

William E. Nason, former Warden of the County of York, and a member of the County Council for over 20 years, died suddenly at his home, Nasonworth, at 3.42 yesterday afternoon. He complained of a sudden pain in his stomach at about 1 p.m. and as the pain increased a physician was summoned at 3 p.m.

Mr. Nason, who was well known and highly respected, was the son of the late William and Annie (Phillips) Nason, Nasonworth.

A lifelong resident of that community, he farmed for many years, but during the last 14 years was the proprietor of a country store. He represented New Maryland Parish on the York County Council for more than 20 years and in 1933 served as warden of the municipality. He was a widower. His wife, the former Miss Jessie Smith, died seven years ago.

Mr. Nason is survived by one son, Vernon Nason, Dorchester, Mass., two daughters, Mrs. J. I. Morgan and Mrs. John Charter, Nasonworth; two brothers, Justus Nason and Lorne Nason Tracy; one sister, Mrs. Allen Brown, Hainesville; one half-brother, Frank Morrey, Tracy, and two half-sisters.
