FORMATION OF FLYING CLUB PLANNED HERE

Preliminary Meeting Held—General Meeting Next Week

School Progressing

Establishment of Club Regarded Incentive To Airport Plan

Preliminary arrangements for the formation of a Fredericton Flying Club, will be made at a meeting tomorrow evening in the City Hall when Mayor C. Hedley Forbes, other members of the city council, and prominent business men will meet with L. Fletcher, assistant instructor of the Saint John Flying Club.

It is hoped that Mayor Forbes and leading citizens will be willing to act as directors of the club and give civic support to the movement. Following the meeting tomorrow night, it is intended to hold a public meeting next week when prospective members of the club will be invited to attend and the actual formation of the club will take place.

The establishment of a flying club in this city is regarded as an incentive for aviation here and the establishment of a civic airport. According to present plans, the Fredericton Club will be a separate organization but with affiliations with the Saint John club. Planes of the Saint John club will be used for the present, until such time as the proposed local club can arrange for the purchase of plane of its own. Under the plan, the Dominion government offers assistance and subsidization to the clubs, making it possible for those interested in aviation to have the facilities for flying at a smaller outlay than would be possible under any other arrangement.

In the city for the past two weeks with a two place "Fleet" biplane equipped with skis. Mr. Fletcher already has over 15 students enrolled for instruction, and the training school is making considerable progress. One student already has over two hours dual flying time logged in his credit, although this is only the second week the school has been in operation here.

PAUL MUNN TO SERVE THREE YEARS

Sentences For Breaking, Theft, and Break From Jail Here

Paul Munn, Victoria Mills jail breaker, was sentenced to three years in the Maritime Penitentiary at Dorchester by Magistrate Walter Limerick in the Fredericton Police Court today at noon on a charge of breaking, entering and theft in connection with a recent break at the Fraser Companies Victoria Mill. He was also sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for breaking jail with force; six months for theft of money from Colin Smith, and six months for theft of money belonging to a local orchestra. The sentences will be served concurrently.

Munn yesterday pleaded guilty to the four charges and appeared today at noon for sentence.

His break from the York County Jail, where he was being held on three counts, resulted in a five day man hunt by R.C.M.P., Fredericton police and York County law enforcement officers. He was finally found at his mother's home at Victoria Mills and returned to jail.

Last evening at the regular weekly meeting of Fredericton Council 1942 of the Knights of Columbus, two candidates were initiated into the honors of the First Degree of the Order by the council degree team. The degree work was carried through in a pleasing manner, and a social period followed. Rev. Dr. J. H. Milligan, chancellor of the Diocese of Saint John, was a special visitor and received a hearty welcome.

SYMPATHIES IN INDIA SWINGING TO THE CHINESE

India Loyal to Empire in the Event of War—Noted Speaker Heard Here

The sympathy of Great Britain's Indian Empire, hitherto with Japan in her aspirations in the East, is now swinging to the Chinese as a result of flagrant killing of Chinese women and children and bombing of civilian cities. Abdullah Yusuf Ali, I. C. S., stated last night in response to a question by Brigadier General F. W. Hill, chairman at last night's lecture on "India Under the New Regime", delivered by the eminent Indian educationalist and student of Empire. Although the audience last evening in the Provincial Normal School auditorium was not so large as expected by the local branch of the National Council of Education, sponsors of the speaker, those who attended were appreciative of the scope of the lecturer's address.

The distinguished speaker presented a comprehensive history of the British conquest of India from early maritime settlements at Bombay, Madras and Calcutta, through extension of influence of the British East India Company to the diversified constitution of the present time.

India's unanimous response to the call of Empire in 1914 would be repeated in the event of another war involving Great Britain, the speaker intimated.

He explained the functioning of the present constitution in India under which multiple constituencies have been established to protect divergent interests of racial minorities, religious groups, feminine voters and commercial and land owning interests as well as Anglo-Indians. In closing Abdullah Yusuf Ali pledged himself to a united Empire.

Following the lecture a reception in honor of the speaker was held at the home of Brigadier General Hill.

President F.A. Good Officers, Directors Are Re-elected

The full slate of officers as well as the board of directors of the York and Sunbury Historical Association were re-elected last evening at the annual meeting of the society held in the Museum in the Post Office Building. The Society, which shows a cash balance of \$369.82 for the year past, decided last evening to begin an effort to maintain the Maliceet Indian Language, which it is claimed is fast disappearing. Donald Dickson of Perth, who has made a study of the language and speaks the dialect fluently will be contacted and the possibility of procuring a dictionary of the language will be taken up with him. It was also suggested that the provincial government may be willing to make a grant to assist in the work of perpetuating the language.

The officers re-elected last evening were: President, F. A. Good; 1st Vice-President, W. M. Burns; 2nd Vice-President, Whitman A. Haines; recording secretary, Mrs. Susan Squires; historian, Mrs. J. Brown Maxwell; patron, W. G. Clark, M.P. The Directors for the year are: W. G. Clark, M.P., Dr. F. A. Wightman, R. B. Wallace, Rev. D. R. Chown, Mrs. A. E. Mathewson, Dr. G. I. Nugent, C. A. Taylor, C. W. Clark, W. Hubbard, and Miss Hazel Millican. Various reports and other routine business took up the rest of the meeting. The Building Fund showed a balance of \$65. Mrs. Maxwell reported on her work during the year which included a comprehensive work on the Old Burying Ground, this city. Tribute was paid to the work of Mrs. Maxwell by the President. The report of Sterling Braanen, showed a substantial cash balance, while there were 120 accessions to the museum during the year, including military uniforms and other articles from the Ashburnham estate. Over 600 people visited the museum during the year.

The Society will purchase a copy of Dr. Webster's "Acadia," a work including much information on St. Anne's, now Fredericton, taken from the diary of Villebon. An attempt will also be made to get a copy of the memoirs of John Giles, who was held captive by New Brunswick Indians for a period of nine years and who recorded much valuable information on the province at that time.

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ASK GOVERNMENT FOR SUPPORT OF MARKET BUREAU

Operators Desire Bureau For Study Lumber Market

The enlistment of the support of the New Brunswick government in a joint project with the lumber operators of Nova Scotia to establish market bureau was the subject of a representation before the cabinet yesterday afternoon by a committee headed by John E. Sayre of Saint John. The New Brunswick Forest Products Association agreed upon promotion of such a project when it met in Fredericton some months ago at which time the committee was authorized.

G. Percy Burchill of South Nelson, president of the association, stated yesterday that the lumber operators of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are desirous of establishing a joint bureau to study market conditions and file information for the benefit of the industry in both provinces.

The members of the committee which went before the government included Mr. Burchill and Mr. Sayre, Joseph Hickman of Sussex, Robert MacFarlane of Edmundston, Ernest Ross of Edmundston, Hugh Fleming of Juniper and Mr. Colwell of Cumberland Bay.



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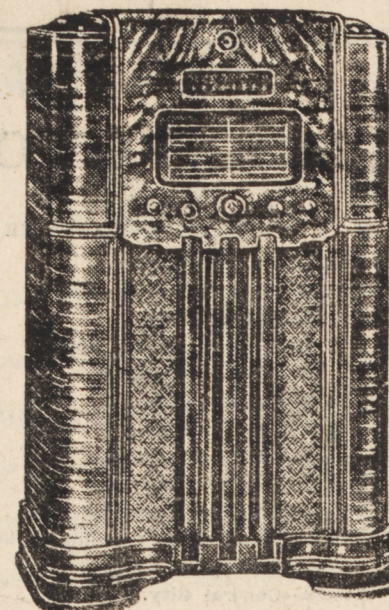
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
