dren coming to the city in groups
under the supervision of their teach-
ers, while other stands will be er-
ected for disabled and aged war vet-
erans.

Seats On Sale
It was learned today that stands to
accommodate approximately 2,000
people will be erected at various
points along the route and sold to
the public. Stands to be erected on
Queen Street are now advertised at
\$3 each with a close, unobstructed
view guaranteed. Reports from Mon-
treal state that the price of seats
along the route through that city run
from \$5 to \$25. In other cities across
the Dominion similar stands at like
prices are being arranged. The
stands in this city as in other places
are a private venture.

Due Here 12.45
At Marysville the Royal party will
travel at a rate of 8 miles per hour
for about a mile, while from South
Devon through Fredericton the same
speed will be travelled. The King
and Queen are scheduled to leave
Newcastle at 9.30, arriving there at
9.20. At 12.45 they are due at the
Parliament Buildings, this city.

The route through Fredericton is
as follows: Into the city via the pas-
senger bridge, down Queen Street to
the Parliament Buildings. Leaving the
Parliament Buildings, down Queen
Street and out University Avenue to
Beaverbrook Hall. Leaving Beaver-
brook Hall, in University Avenue to
the Subway, up Queen Street to
Smythe, our Smythe to Brunswick,
down Brunswick through the Subway
to Waterloo Row and down Waterloo
Row to Salamanca.

At the Parliament Buildings Lieu-
tenant-Governor MacLaren, Premier
Dysart, and Mayor C. Hedley Forbes
will meet Their Majesties. The King
will inspect a Guard of Honour and
then enter the Assembly Chamber.

In the Assembly Chamber Premier
Dysart will read an address of wel-
come and Mayor Forbes will present
an address. The members of the Leg-
islature, the City Council and their
wives will be presented to Their
Majesties.

At Beaverbrook Hall Their Majes-
ties will attend a luncheon by the
Lieutenant-Governor and the Govern-
ment of the Province of New Brun-
swick. Following the luncheon the
King and Queen will tour the city on
the route mentioned.

At 2.40 they will depart from Sa-
lamanca on an auxiliary train which
will meet the Royal Train at Saint
John. Their Majesties are scheduled
to arrive at Saint John at 4.30 and
depart from that city at 6.30.


DIED
