BENNETT REFUSES
TO STAND IN
BRITISH ELECTION

LONDON, May 11. — Sir Harold Webbe, who heads the Conservative Opposition in the London County Council, this week was nominated as his party's candidate in the by-election in the Abbey division of Westminster May 17.

Gabriel Carritt was nominated as an Independent Progressive candidate.

The Labor party nominated George Isaacs, a Cornishman and general secretary of the printing union, Nat-sopa, to contest the by-election in Southwark north division also on May 17. He will be opposed by Capt. F. Henderson-Livesay, Liberal National and Government nominee. In the last general election the National Liberal candidate, E. A. Strauss, won by a majority of 79.

Nomination in the case of Sir Harold Webbe is tantamount to election. Sir Henry Herbert, Conservative, whose death caused the Abbey by-election, had a majority of close to 13,000 over a Labor candidate in 1935. Labor is not officially contesting the by-election.

LEADER OF YOUTH

Carritt, 30, is prominent in the youth movement in Great Britain. Two of his brothers were killed in Spain fighting for the International Brigade during the civil war. Sir Harold is 53 and has sat opposite Herbert Morrison, Labor leader in the London County Council—London's "parliament"—for several years.

The name of Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, former Canadian Prime Minister, was mentioned in connection with the Conservative nomination. Some party members in the division wanted him to stand. But his known unwillingness to enter the British House of Commons led to his name being dropped.

A straight fight is assured in the Birmingham-Aston division where voting takes place May 17. Candidates are Major Edward Kellett, Conservative, and Dr. S. Segal, Labor.

IRISH CONTEST

Only one candidate so far has come forward for the County Down by-election. In this two-member Northern Ireland constituency the Conservatives had an overwhelming majority of 46,000 over a Republican in 1935. Dr. H. Little, a prominent Orangeman and minister of Castlereagh Presbyterian Church, is the Government nominee. Nomination day is tomorrow and voting May 18—assuming there is a contest.

Three other by-elections are pending—in Kennington, May 24; Glamorgan-Caerphilly and Birmingham-Aston.

Conscription has ousted foreign policy as the dominating issue in the by-election campaigning.

BRITISH TASTE
WANTS VIRGINIA

LONDON, May 11.—The British smoker's preference for Virginia tobacco is making it difficult for the Government to increase trade with Turkey and Greece by importing more of their products, it was indicated in the House of Commons this week.

F. Forest, Labor, asked if more Oriental-type tobacco could not be imported in "view of the importance of preventing Greece and Turkey from becoming too dependent on trade with certain states," presumably Germany and Italy.

Oliver Stanley, President of the Board of Trade, replied that the matter was being examined but it's largely a matter of the taste of the British smoker.

Lady Astor Conservative, was aroused by a question from William Thorne, Labor, who asked if it was not true that long dresses were being imported from America because "women are concerned to cover their scrawny legs."

"That's not true!" Lady Astor shouted.

Mr. Stanley ended the exchange by saying:

"I would not attempt to speak with the same authority as Mr. Thorne on the perfection or imperfection of the female form, but if that is indeed the case, surely it would not be beyond the ability of our manufacturers to make longer dresses which could equally cover skippy legs."

Imports of dresses from the United States totalled 465,000 in 1938, nearly double the total for the previous year, Harold Sattelle, Conservative said.



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TO PILOT ROYAL
SHIP UP RIVER

QUEBEC, May 11 — Auguste Santerre, 57, veteran St. Lawrence River navigator will have the honor of piloting the Royal liner Empress of Australia from Father Point to Quebec this week-end, it was announced yesterday.

Santerre is a member of a seagoing family whose name has been liked with shipping on St. Lawrence for more than a century. His home is in the little village of St. Michel de Bellechasse, some 20 miles below Quebec.

Pilot Santerre has guided ships on the St. Lawrence between Father Point and Quebec for the past 35 years, and before that he served his apprenticeship on merchant ships voyaging to all parts of the world.

Many famous personages have travelled on liners aboard which Santerre was pilot between Father Point and Quebec, including the Prince of Wales, now Duke of Windsor, who with his brother Prince George, now the Duke of Kent, crossed to Canada in the Empress of Australia in 1927.

Volunteers For
Civilian Guard

The Cathedral Men's Club of this city, 40 men strong, will be part of the civilian guard on duty the day King George and Queen Elizabeth visit the capital city. The decision that the club will volunteer for duty as a group was made at the meeting Tuesday evening, R. G. Loughlin of the registration committee said. It is understood that other groups in the city will follow the lead of the Cathedral Group.

The registration for duty has now reached 150, Mr. Loughlin said. Registration for voluntary duty has been under way each evening this week. A considerable number of war veterans not actively connected with the Legion have volunteered.

LADY ASTOR IS
DESCRIBED AS
M.P. FOR BERLIN

LONDON, May 11.—A flurry of words, in which Sir Stafford Cripps, Independent, described Lady Astor as "the noble lady member for Berlin," enlivened debate on the conscription bill in the House of Commons this week.

Arguing against conscription on the grounds that it was undemocratic, Sir Stafford said:

"We have a class and party government in this country."

"Nonsense!" Lady Astor interrupted.

"That sounds like the noble lady member for Berlin," Sir Stafford retorted.

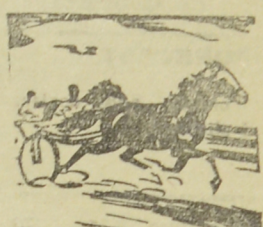
The Viscountess attempted to reply but her remarks were drowned by jeers from the Opposition.

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
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
