

HITLER WANTS DANZIG PORT

Repudiates Naval Agreement And Seeks Passage Through The Polish Corridor As Well

Announce Willingness To Enter A Reciprocal Non-Aggression Agreement With Other Nations

BERLIN, April 28.—Chancellor Hitler today gave to the world his long-awaited address, and capital cities in all countries of the world discussed the words that the former German paper-hanger lashed out at the nations of the world.

He handed down his ultimatum to Poland in terms almost identical to those predicted by observers at an earlier date. He demanded the Free City of Danzig as part of the Reich, as well as a passage through the Corridor. His further ultimatum was that the territorial boundaries of Germany and Poland remain as they are. In Warsaw, diplomats described these references as "bluffs" and declared that Poland would not be frightened by such demands.

The Fuehrer announced his willingness to enter a reciprocal non-aggression agreement with any nations. "Germany is willing to pledge herself against aggression," he said, "but she must too have a pledge that she will not be attacked."

In reference to President Roosevelt's plea for settlement of the European mix-up, Hitler denied any intentions on the American continent. He assured the American nations that there would be no territorial demands made in that hemisphere.

He branded as frauds any inferences that Germany had intentions on the American continent.

In tones that rang with hatred, the German leader lashed out at Britain, branding the nation as a pack of "war-mongers," working to disturb the peace of the world. In an attempt to justify his absorption of Czechoslovakia, he made pointed references to British rule of Palestine, citing the actions of British forces in the Holy Land.

The Anglo-German naval agreement was repudiated by the German leader. As he termed the British war-mongers, he cited their calling up of troops and conscription measures, and declared that the basis of the naval agreement had been removed.

NEW YORK, April 28.—An insurance collector Jack Pasquale, was arrested by New York Police today and charged with the fatal shooting of a Sherbrooke, N. S., beautician, Elizabeth Leslie, a former radio singer. The accused pleaded not guilty, but gave police a statement.

TO CONTINUE TRAIN SERVICE TO NEWCASTLE

MONCTON, April 28.—On account of highway conditions it has been arranged to continue the operation of the Canadian National motor train service between Newcastle and Fredericton on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of next week, leaving Fredericton at 8.45 a.m. and Newcastle at 5.30 p.m., according to an announcement from regional headquarters of the railway here. It was previously announced that this motor train service would be discontinued with the train service changes which will go into effect on April 30.

CAPTAIN "BOB" BARTLETT LEAVES NEW BRUNSWICK

MONCTON, April 28.—Captain "Bob" Bartlett, who played a major role in the discovery of the North Pole by the late Admiral Peary, left here today on the Maritime Express of the Canadian National Railways for Halifax where he is to deliver a lecture.

The veteran Arctic navigator, who was born in Brigus, Newfoundland, now makes his home in New York and each year carries a pleasure exploration party to the Arctic in his schooner, the "Eddie M. Morrissey".

Speaking of conditions in the Arctic, Captain Bartlett stated the Eskimo is losing his ability to subsist off the country with the inroads made by modern inventions and his contact with western civilization.

On the question of the Viking discovery of North America, he was somewhat dubious, referring to the comparatively great drift separating Iceland from Greenland and Greenland from the North American continent, although he states it is possible they may have reached Labrador.

DE VALERA CANCELS TRIP TO UNITED STATES

DUBLIN, April 28.—One to events on the continent and the conscription move on the part of England, President De Valera of Eire, has cancelled his trip to the United States and will not officially open the Irish Pavilion at the World's Fair.

De Valera was believed to have been given reports that the Premier of Northern Ireland would implement conscription in his province. The Irish President during his New York visit was also to pay a visit to President Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Overlooking a number of senior officers, President Roosevelt appointed Brigadier-General George Marshall Chief of the staff of the United States Army. He succeeds General Craig due for retirement August 31.

PARIS, April 28.—Efforts to bring Soviet Russia and Rumania together as friends and allies of the British and French European alliance was under way today by diplomats.

2000 Men, 4 Engines for Canadian National Movement of Royal Train



This diagrammatic outline summarizes man power and steam power required for the actual operation of the Royal Train during its movement over lines of the Canadian National Railways, but beyond those numbers representing men and power, even larger numbers of men will be employed to ensure the smooth despatch of the Royal Train. These other men will be along the right of way, in signal towers, despatchers' offices, at crossings, and extending further to engineering forces and supervisory officials. Even beyond that, other employees who participated in the preparation of the

Royal Train included engineers, architects, decorators and a greatly diversified force of craftsmen engaged in work on the units of the Royal Train which were remodelled and redecorated in the shops of the Canadian National Railways. This work in the National System shops included the preparation of the cars in which Their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, will actually travel. Four of the C.N.R. engines which will haul the Royal Train are being finished in Royal blue. A fifth engine, an oil burner, will be used to haul the train through the Rocky Mountains.

P.E.I. ELECTION CAMPAIGN GETS UNDERWAY

CHARLOTTETOWN, April 28.—A scheme for the rehabilitation of below standard farms and measures to locate young men on farms and assistance to farmers highlighted a 15-point program of Premier Thane Campbell as he fired the opening blast of the provincial elections to be held May 18.

No costly vote gathering promises would be made by the Liberal Party he declared and he promised assistance to the fishing industry and an effective budgetary control of all departmental expenditures as well as continued highway pavement program.

AMENDMENT TO CRIMINAL CODE BETTERS WORKER

OTTAWA, April 28.—Discharge of workers because of Union membership became a criminal offence yesterday when the Dominion Parliament enthusiastically approved the amendment to the Code. Yesterday the measure and other amendments received third reading.

Hailed as a step in the direction of industrial democracy as it provides the same rights that have been enjoyed by employers, it has been consistently urged by the C.C.F. leader J. S. Woodsworth. While it was held labor is provincial in scope, the code amendment will supplement the provincial legislation.

Poland Will Not Be Bluffed

WARSAW, April 28.—Poland will not be bluffed nor scared by the words of Adolf Hitler, Polish authorities expressed themselves today. His threat was generally felt to have been a bluff. Observers predicted today that Poland and Russia will be brought closer together by the threat of action on the part of the Nazi state.

In London, it was stated that the repudiation of the Anglo-German naval pact was expected, but it was stated also that Germany could not legally tear up the agreement without England's consent.

In Paris little comment on the address was available. The French were saying little about the address, it was said, but at the same time it was reported the French were considering the address carefully.

A special German airforce plane flew copies of the address to the British embassy, and as Hitler commenced his speech copies translated into English were handed to the office.

ROME, April 28.—British conscription may be offset by Italian and German moves. Conscription in Britain was considered to be an effort to intimidate the Axis powers who were said to be unimpressed with the measure that passed the British Parliament on a vote of 376 to 145.

LONDON, April 28.—It was reported in London today that Mahatma Gandhi has threatened to fast to death if the peace of the world is broken. He declared that he is capable of such a fast and is willing to sacrifice himself in the cause of peace.

CARLETON COUNTY LIVESTOCK CO-OP NETS OVER \$12,000

WOODSTOCK, April 28.—Figures released by the secretaries of the co-operative livestock shipping clubs of Carleton County reveal the fact that in March, 1939, 712 commercial bacon hogs were shipped through the three farmers' organizations. Net receipts to the producer-members aggregated \$12,965.57. Of the total shipped in March 39 per cent graded A's, and 46 per cent graded B1 carcasses, a total two top grades of 85 per cent. The monthly movement in March, 1939, showed an increase in volume of 85 per cent over the movement in the same month a year ago, when 384 hogs, constituted the total, while the net receipts showed an increase of 73 per cent. With hog prices for the periods compared being less in 1939 than in 1938, increase in receipts failed to keep pace with the increase in volume during the current year. A betterment in quality in March, 1939, over March, 1938, of 8 per cent was registered.

Latest figures compiled by the executive of the Woodstock, Centerville and Hartland Livestock Shipping Clubs, covering movement of hogs for the five month period, Nov. 1st, 1938, to March 31st, 1939, disclose a total shipment to date of 2200 bacon hogs, with net receipts to producer-members exceeding \$39,000.00.

The quality for the first five months of the current fiscal year stands at 36 per cent A's, 44 per cent B's, a total of 80 per cent two top grades. This shows an increase in volume of approximately 21 per cent, an increase in net receipts of 25 per cent and an improvement in quality of 14 per cent over the corresponding period of the preceding year. Demand from other sections of Carleton County, it is reported, is this year likely to witness a very marked expansion in providing organization to cope with contemplated increased activities in production and marketing of bacon hogs.

Quebec Legislature Prorogued Today

QUEBEC, April 28.—The Quebec Legislature prorogued today while the Legislature of Ontario closed a close yesterday. The Ontario Lieutenant-Governor commended in his closing address the legislation passed calling for the immediate mobilization of manpower and supplies in the event of a war.

YOUTH TRAINING BILL DEBATED BEFORE READING

OTTAWA, April 28.—The Youth Training bill which will authorize expenditure of one and one half millions per year for three years, was debated for four hours in the House of Commons before it was given its reading.

PRESIDENT SEEKS RENEWAL OF WORKS SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The United States Congress was asked by President Roosevelt to continue relief works program for another year and he sought \$1,750,000,000 to be distributed among the Works Progress Administration, Farm Security Administration and the National Youth Administration.

The President attacked measures that would substitute the dole for work contending it would be disastrous and would cost more in money than was granted to the various states.
