Financial Bulletins

BARRON'S INDEX

For the week ended April 15th, the physical volume of business advanced to 60.6 from 60.2 in the preceding week due to small increases in local production and shipments, and petroleum output. Estimating the index to exclude the influence of the coal shutdown in the Appalachian area, Barron's Index would show another decline to 70.0 compared with 71.4 in the preceding week, and with 73.4 two weeks ago. This would be a new low for the year and would compare with a December high of 78.9 and with 56.6 a year ago.

CONSTRUCTION

Building permits issued by 58 cities during March aggregated \$3,351,194 in value, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This compares with \$1,894,161 in February and \$3,561,517 in March, 1938. Permits taken out in the first three months of the current year were valued at \$6,951,985 compared with \$7,885,100 in the first quarter of 1938. The average total in the first three months of the year from 1920 to 1938 was \$17,593,858.

U. S. CARLOADINGS:

In the week ended April 15th, loadings totalled 547,816 cars, an increase of 12,346 cars over the preceding week, an increase of 10,231 cars over the like 1938 week, and a decrease of 198,707 cars from the like 1937 week, according to the Association of American Railroads. Revenue freight loadings in the latest week showed a gain of 2.3% over the preceding week, which advance was considered as slightly greater than seasonal proportions.

ANGLIN-NORCROSS:

The Company and its subsidiaries report a net profit for the fiscal year ended February 28th, 1939, totalling \$3,656 after all charges and including \$47,717 investment income. This was equivalent to 6c per share on the 56,376 shares, \$10.00 par value, net cumulative preferred stock outstanding, and compared with a net profit of \$81,070 which included \$70,266 investment and special income, equal to \$1.39 on the 58,203 preferred shares outstanding in the preceding fiscal year. Current assets totalled \$1,022,919 and current liabilities of \$275,545 a year ago. Earned surplus in the balance sheet was \$160,968 after transfer of \$18,270 to capital surplus, against earned surplus of \$175,582 in the previous year-end. Although the anticipated improvement in general construction failed to materialize during 1938, it was stated that the Company has been able to secure a volume of new work over 50% in excess of the previous year, the result of which should find reflection in the current fiscal year.

CANADIAN CANNERS

For the fiscal year ended February 28th, 1939, report of which is due to appear early in May, the Company's profits are expected to reflect an unusually difficult year, and it is anticipated that gross operating profit is expected to be on a par with, or somewhat below the \$1,915,984

NEW YORK, April 28.—A physician and a business man, both of whom had been cured of cancer, and a surgeon spoke on a broadcast under the sponsorship of the New York Academy of Medicine. The two who had been cured of cancer were Dr. Anna C. Palmer and James P. Roe. The surgeon was Dr. Frank E. Adair, chairman of the Committee on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons.

"A few years ago it would have been considered difficult to find patients who had been cured of cancer, but not so today," Dr. Adair said. "There are literally thousands of people all over this land who proudly admit that they were cured

SACRED SHEEP LIVE, CAPTAIN CREW ARE HAPPY

HALIFAX, April 28.—The good ship City of Singapore swung at her moorings ready to sail the other day with a contented captain and a contented crew. The order to kill the sheep, without which her Lascar seamen would not put to sea, was rescinded.

The Lascars' Mohammedan religion demanded ships on which they live and work must carry live sheep. Complications arose when the City of Singapore arrived here yesterday. The sacred sheep were ordered destroyed because the ship had come from the China sea ports, and hoof-and-mouth disease is prevalent there.

Since the sailors' articles contain provisions the ship must carry the sheep, Captain F. R. Watkins set out to find one. But there were no sheep to be had and the Lascar crew would not sail without one.

Then because the sheep would not be taken ashore anyway, the captain discovered it was not necessary to kill the sacred animal. So the sheep's life was spared.

"The sheep we have aboard the City of Singapore may have come from a district where hoof-and-mouth disease is prevalent," he said, "but we are not trying to land the animal, so why all the shouting."

"According to the Mohammedan religion and according to the rules and regulations of the ship's articles we must carry a sheep for the Mohammedan members of the crew. If it has to be killed they will do it themselves. They do not kill it unless they have to," he said.

So a satisfied gang of Lascars watched Blue Peter flying from the City of Singapore's masthead, knowing that when the ship sails tonight it will not be in violation of their religious faith.

QUEBEC CHANGES TAX ACT ON CORPORATIONS

QUEBEC, April 28.—A Government bill with sweeping provisions for company taxation was distributed in the Legislative Assembly of Quebec.

In the name of the Provincial Treasurer, the broad measure would deal with taxation of all categories of corporations in the province from banks and insurance companies to transport, communication and liquor firms.

The measure, called the Corporation Tax Act, was believed to mean a readjustment of the province's whole system of company taxation. The text distributed did not indicate changes and provincial statutes respecting taxation were pored over to determine what their extent would be.

Specified for "ordinary companies" was taxation of 1-10 of one per cent on the amount of paid-up capital of \$50 for each place of business in Quebec and Montreal and an additional \$25 or each place of business outside those cities.

Places of business listed as subject to the tax were head offices, stores, factories, workshops, agencies, stations, executive offices and property where business operations are carried on.
