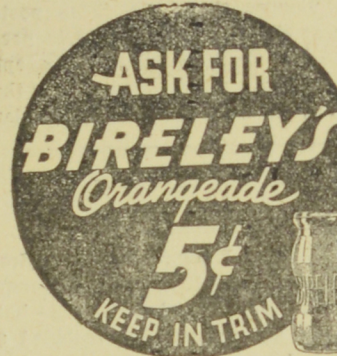

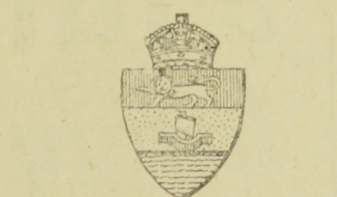

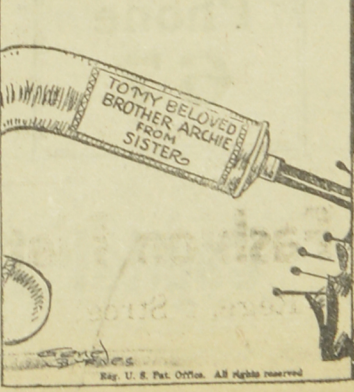

The paper gives strict orders that
a representative of the track depart-
ment ride on the first engine and see
that all orders have been carried out.
Track men were equipped with dan-
ger flags, torpedoes, and lanterns in
the case of an emergency.

Thirty minutes before the first train
was due a track man started and
walked towards it until he met it.
When it passed he turned and follow-
ed it until the second train bearing
the Royal party overtook him. There
were 11 cars on the first train and 10
on the second.

For the comfort of the Royal pas-
sengers, nothing was overlooked.
Conductors were to signal when meals
were being served so that special
care was taken to run steadily. They
were ordered to ease their engines
around curves and through yards and
to be careful in applying the air
brake. Conductors also had the re-
sponsibility of seeing that sufficient
water, ice, and supplies were con-
stantly at hand.

One Rule Broken

One of the rules was broken, it is
said. Orders stated, "Engines on sid-
ings or in yards for these trains to
pass must not make use of their
whistle as a salute. It is recalled,
however, that enthusiasm became too
great and the blast of train whistles
blended with the cheers of hundreds
who thronged each depot where the
train stopped.

When the train stopped flagmen
guarded the right-of-way ahead and
behind the train for some distance
and torpedoes were placed on the
track as a double precaution. One
rule, it stated, proved unnecessary:
that all employees of the Inter-
colonial Railway wear new or
freshly washed overalls. It is recalled
that every working employee of
the Intercolonial wore, on that day
a shiny new pair of blue overalls and
other uniforms.

The orders, issued from "Moncton
Centre," are signed by D. Pottinger,
general manager, E. G. Russell, man-
ager and G. M. Jarvis, superinten-
dent.

To France he guaranteed that
Germany would leave Alsace,
while although he did not men-
tion Rumania, his statement that
he would not allow German mar-
kets to be stolen was aimed at
that country.

"If England looks on Germany
as a vassal state, then their
friendship is wasted," he said. In
typical boastful manner he de-
clared that the German nation
considers itself equal to the Brit-
ish.

In reference to the Versailles
Treaty, he described his struggle
to free the German people. He
tried to justify his actions of
territory seizure by stating that
he had only restored what was
taken away 20 years ago.
