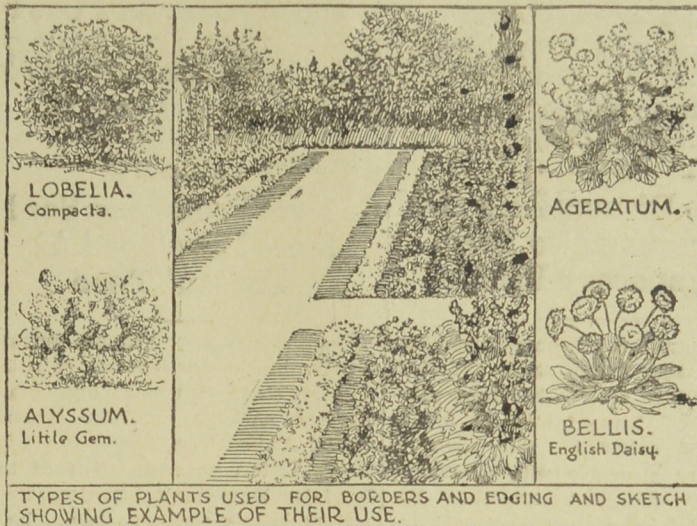

Dwarf Foreground Flowers
Enhance Garden Beauty

TYPES OF PLANTS USED FOR BORDERS AND EDGING AND SKETCH SHOWING EXAMPLE OF THEIR USE.

Free use of small flowered, dwarf growing, free blooming annuals as edgings adds much to the attractiveness of the flower garden or border.

Of these plants the sweet alyssum is deservedly the most popular, for its snowy sheets of sweet-scented flowers are a constant delight. Dwarf ageratums and lobelias make bushy plants covered with blue-lavender flowers which combine with all other colors and enhance their beauty. The English daisies (bellis perennis) are double flowers of white, red and pink borne on bushy 8-inch plants.

The dainty blue, rose and white daisies of the Swan River Daisy are material for a beautiful border for most robust plants and this little annual is deserving of wider use. The dwarf candytufts are rivals of the alyssum for snowy whiteness as well as giving beautiful shades of lilac and carmine.

Angallis or pimpernell is a spreading plant which bears star-shaped blue and scarlet flowers. It likes a sunny place and blooms freely, making a delightful edging plant.

Virginia stock, a dainty little plant in pink and rose shades, makes a great sheet of bloom but its chief weakness is that its season of bloom is rather short.

Gilia tricolor is another rare and handsome little edging plant. Its tiny cups produced in great profusion are pale lilac, shading to yellow in the center with five purple spots. It grows only 7 inches tall.

A tiny marigold, Tagetes signata pumila, bearing myriads of brilliant orange flowers above fernlike sweet-scented foliage, is a handsome border plant making a solid miniature flowering hedge.

For colored foliage, the Golden Ball feverfew gives brilliant effect with the dusty millers for gray com-

trasts. The tufted pansies or bedding violas are used lavishly in English gardens as edging or carpeting plants and are coming into great popularity here. They are more compact in growth than pansies with longer stems and more flowers to a plant while the range of colors is much the same. The self colors give the finest effect.

BATON ROUGE, La., April 28. — The Rev. John D. Brown, crusading Baptist minister, has found that a somewhat rustic edition of Charlie McCarthy is an aid in impressing his sermon upon his congregation, and besides, it appeals to the children.

Mr. Brown's Charlie McCarthy is "The Wandering Boy." The clothes he wears are hardly those Edgar Bergen would put upon Charlie. Since some of the famous woodenhead's repartee would be beside the subject in sermons, "The Wandering Boy" keeps discreetly silent.

The minister's dummy wears clothes fashioned from the suit of a youth who donated them to a "deserving orphan" just before he stepped into the stripes provided by Angola penitentiary.

"It will be rotten," he said, "by the time I get out."

The youth's donation will be more valuable, Mr. Brown believes on "The Wandering Boy." The dummy will serve, he said, as a "real life example and warning against the evils of false literature, dancing, gambling, alcohol and bad theatres."

So the dummy sits upon the pulpit as he delivers his sermons.

WILL BE TRIED
FOR SHOOTING
FOUR YEARS AGO

SHERBROOKE, April 28 — Conrad Andy, 27-year old South Ham farmer was bound over to stand trial at the next term of Court of King's Bench for the fatal shooting four years ago of Saul Gregoire, 50, of South Ham.

No witness were summoned by the defence attorney, Cesaire Gervais, when the preliminary hearing of the accused was resumed before Judge J. H. Lemay.

After Andy had been ordered to the Assizes, Mr. Gervais remarked that he "presumed" it would be useless to ask permission to have the accused liberated on bail pending his trial.

Judge Lemay declared that owing to the seriousness of the charge against Andy he could not allow him his freedom on bail.

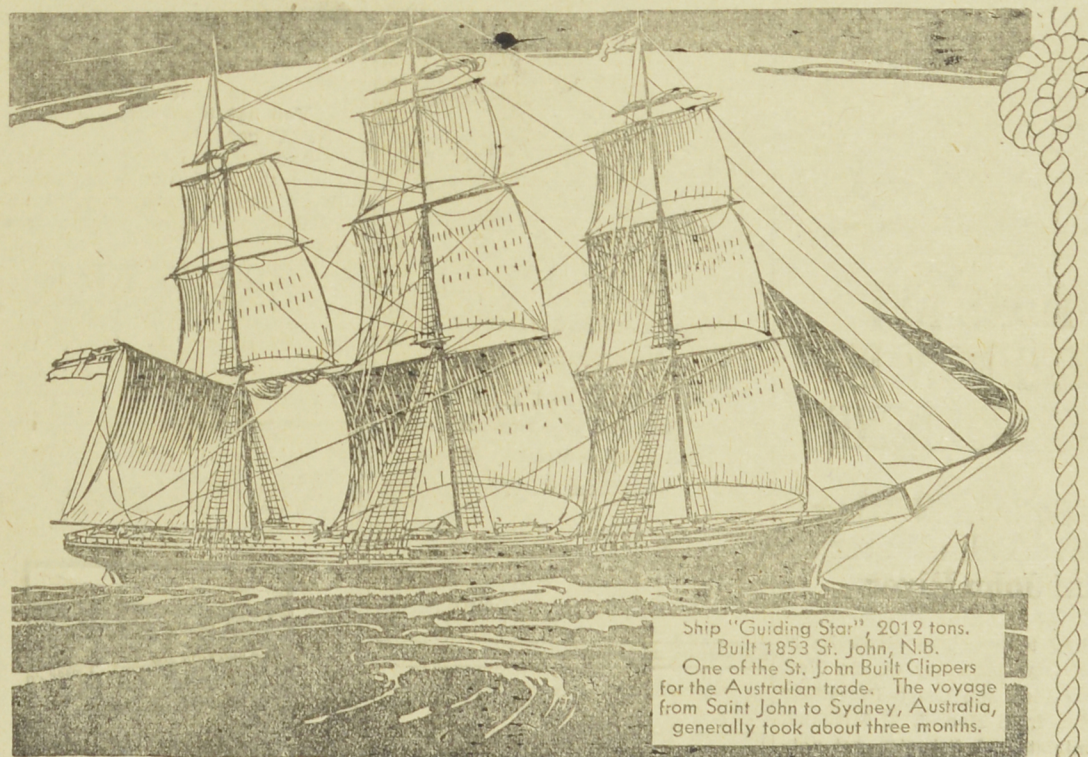
