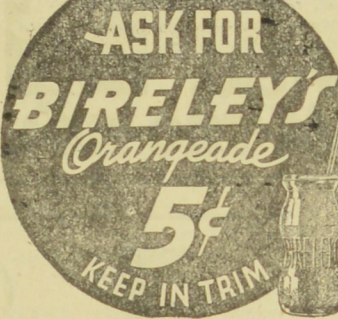

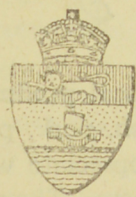

The short term recruits will re-
ceive air force pay as well as a grat-
uity of \$500 each year for each of
the years in training. Five per cent
of their pay will be held and at the
end of the training period they will
receive \$1500 plus the five per cent
and will be helped to re-establish
themselves.

It is expected that 126 will be
trained each year.

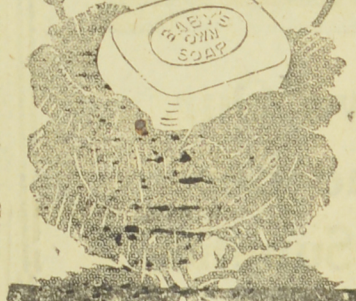

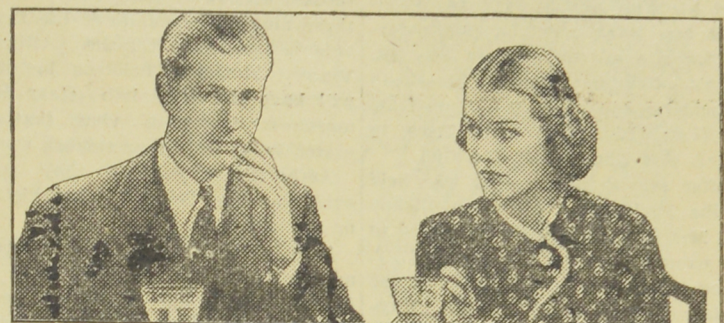

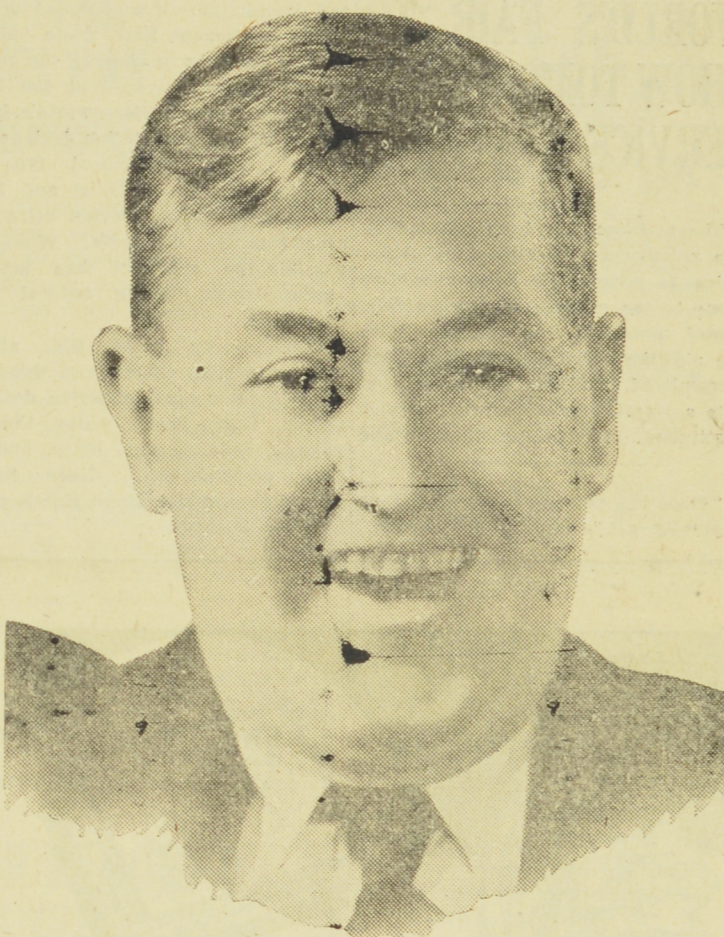

Ontario Burley before he put on his mitts.

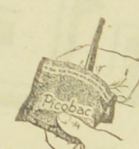
"Blue snow," announced he. "Blue snow."
