

If any difficulties have been excessive, it is a good plan to have them looked into at once while freshly in mind. Procrastination in having the heating plant cleaned and overhauled or any desirable changes made in the system too often leads to nothing having been done by the time the fall rolls around and heat is needed again.

If the winter's experience has indicated, beyond doubt, that the old boiler or furnace has outlived its usefulness both in efficiency and economy of operation, the spring is the right time to consult a reliable heating contractor and determine the most suitable replace_

CAND'N CARLOADINGS


