EDUCATIONISTS TO MONCTON FOR TEACHERS' MEET

Dr. Peacock, Dr. McFarlane, Miss Hayes, W. K. Tibert, Attending

Dr. Fletcher Peacock, Director of Educational Services for New Brunswick, and Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Superintendent of Education, left this morning for Moncton to attend the three-day educational conference under the direction of the New Brunswick Teachers' Association beginning tomorrow. Dr. Peacock will address the conference tomorrow afternoon.

Miss Hazel E. Hayes, Supervisor of Home Economics for New Brunswick is expected to leave for Moncton this afternoon and W. K. Tibert, Director of Vocational Education, will leave tomorrow.

During the three days, prominent speakers will address the teachers who will also gather in various sessions for different grades and classes.

Two banquets will be held Thursday evening, one in the Masonic Hall for high school teachers at which Dr. George J. Trueman, President of Mount Allison University, will be the speaker, the other at the Queen Hotel where rural teachers will hear Dr. J. M. Hill, President of St. Thomas College, Chatham.

Snow Removal Costs Pass \$5400 Mark

THREE INCHES FELL TODAY IN FTON DISTRICT

City And Government Ploughs Working To Clear Roads

Gravel Roads Closed Ban On Heavy Trucks To Remain Until Roads Ready

With Fredericton's snow control program still operating in full swing due to today's heavy snow fall, costs of snow removal in the city to date for the winter's operations have already overstepped the \$5400 mark. It was estimated this morning by J. D. MacKay, City Engineer.

Labor costs, from the first of December to the first of April, were estimated at \$2700. Although costs for materials used during the year have not been segregated from the roads and streets accounts as yet, Mr. MacKay estimated they would equal the labor costs. Snow removal costs for 1937-38 were about the same as this year to date, but snow control was completed by the last of March in 1938.

A new Caterpillar tractor was used by the City Engineer's Department this year for clearing sidewalks; and for the first time, a motor road patrol was used on street ploughing.

Although no city ploughs were out this morning, Mr. MacKay believed it might be necessary to use a plough later in the day.

John Mackenzie, New Brunswick District Highway Engineer, stated this morning that only one provincial plough is out in this district. It is operating near Millville. Although gravel roads in the province were closed today for heavy traffic of trucks carrying a gross load greater than 4,000 pounds, the roads are passable for light cars, he said. The ban on heavy trucks will remain until the roads have cleared up and are able to carry heavier loads.

About three inches of snow have fallen in the Fredericton district during the recent storm, and weather reports indicate more snow tonight, clearing and cold tomorrow.

A new class of eight probationers was admitted to the Nurses' Training School at the Victoria Public Hospital during the past month. It was revealed in the Superintendent's report presented at the monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital held last evening at City Hall.

The report also stated that certain repairs had been conducted at the hospital during the month, including repairs to an electric sterilizer in the operating room. A new washing machine has been installed in the hospital laundry.

L. S. Morrison, Vice-President of the Board, presided last evening. Others present were Councillor Cameron, C. E. Boone, W. G. Clark, M.P., York-Sunbury; Dr. G. I. Nugent, Miss Areta B. Gerow, Councillor Rowley Manzer, Dr. H. S. Wright, Fred L. Haviland.

A meeting of the Council of the New Brunswick Barristers' Society is scheduled for tonight.

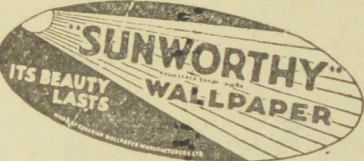
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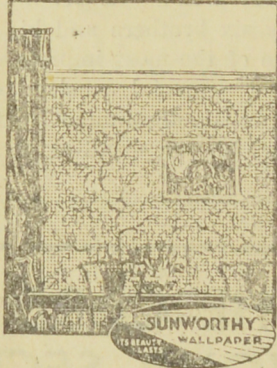
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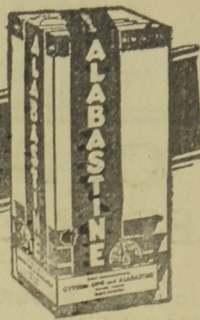
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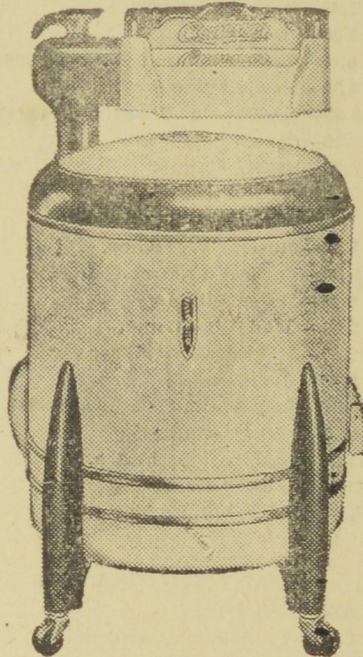
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
