16. Cars will not be allowed to park on any of the streets running off the Royal procession route streets nearer than one block.

17. All cars parked on the route or within one block of the route will be removed at the owner's expense after 9 a.m.

18. Do not pass street barriers.

19. Hotel and rooming house operators must be careful to notify out-of-town guests that it is strictly forbidden to park on the Royal procession route streets or within one block of same.

20. Obey the police and the volunteers who are on duty. They have a great responsibility and you can make their task a pleasant one by your consideration and co-operation.

21. First aid stations will be established at places near the Royal procession route. (Locations will be announced later).

22. Persons from out of town are advised that they should be in the city before 9 a.m. as the roads leading into the city will be closed at that time.

23. Parking places have been provided and may be located by following the arrows marked "To Parking."

24. Do not park in front of fire hydrants or driveways.

25. Do not "double" park.

26. Do not leave valuables in your car unless doors are locked.

MONOCOUPÉ HEADED FOR SWEDEN TODAY

SAINT JOHN'S, Nfld., May 16.—A slim young Swede, by the name of Carl Backman, took off from Botwood airbase, Newfoundland, early this morning, and nosed his tiny "monocoupe" plane into the blue of Atlantic skies, heading for Sweden. The tiny plane, described by airmen at the base as a "flying gas tank," carried 160 gallons of motor fuel in its regular tanks and numerous auxiliary tanks squeezed into the cabin. In his plane he had no radio, no automatic pilot.

The slim, 27-year-old Swedish pilot flew from St. Louis, Mo., nonstop, 1,100 miles to Bangor, Maine, thence from Bangor to Bottswood. His tiny plane had a 90 horsepower engine, a speed of 110 miles per hour, and the pilot said, a 4,000 mile range. He is reported to be one of three pilots in a race to Sweden competing for a prize.

GOVERNMENT'S WHEAT POLICY PASSES HOUSE

OTTAWA, May 16.—The government's 70 cent wheat policy has finally passed through the house after a bitterly contested passage. Social Crediters made special attacks on the legislation, pleading for an 80 cent guarantee. Meanwhile, in the west, spring planting is finished and farmers are now awaiting beneficial rains. Moderate showers have been reported in some sections, but heavier rains are still needed.

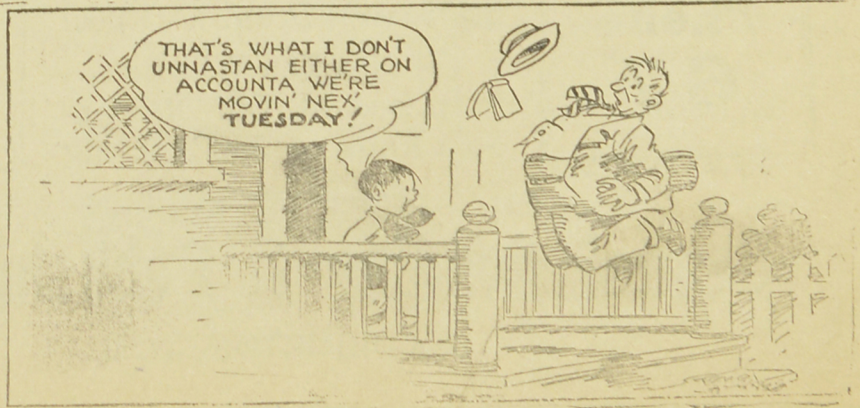
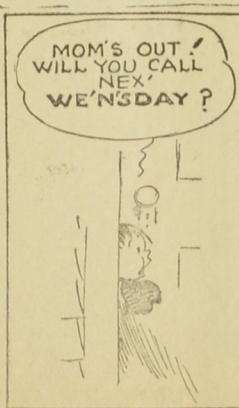
