# Civic Luncheon To Louis B. Mayer

## N.B. BORN MOTION PICTURE MAGNATE TO BE HONORED

Will Receive Degree of LL.D. At Encaenia Of University of N. B.

### Member World-Famed Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Corporation

Honoring a distinguished son of New Brunswick, the citizens of Fredericton and the Fredericton Board of Trade will render a luncheon at noon tomorrow in honor of Louis B. Mayer, United States motion picture magnate and native of Saint John, N. B.

Mr. Mayer, of the world-famed Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer corporation, will arrive at the Queen Hotel in Fredericton at 11.30 tomorrow morning from Montreal. On Thursday, the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws will be conferred on Mr. Mayer at the Encaenia of the University of New Brunswick. Dr. C. C. Jones, president of the university, announced some time ago that degrees would be conferred on Mr. Mayer and Miss Mary Kingsley Tibbits of Boston. Miss Tibbits is the first woman to receive a degree from the University.

At the luncheon tomorrow, to be held at the Queen Hotel at 1 o'clock, accommodations are available for 60 guests. Citizens and members of the Board of Trade wishing to attend the luncheon are advised to contact the Secretary of the board or the City Treasurer for tickets.

Several other guests of honor will be present at the luncheon, including J. T. O'Connor, former comptroller of finance for the United States, and D. Leo Dolan, director of the Canadian Travel Bureau, both of whom are in the party coming from Montreal.

Several speakers are expected to be featured at the meeting, including Mr. Mayer, Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier of the province, and His Worship Mayor C. Hedley Forbes who will welcome the guests on behalf of the city. In addition to other guests, the members of the Provincial Government will attend. E. C. Atkinson, president of the Board of Trade will preside.

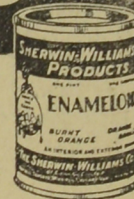

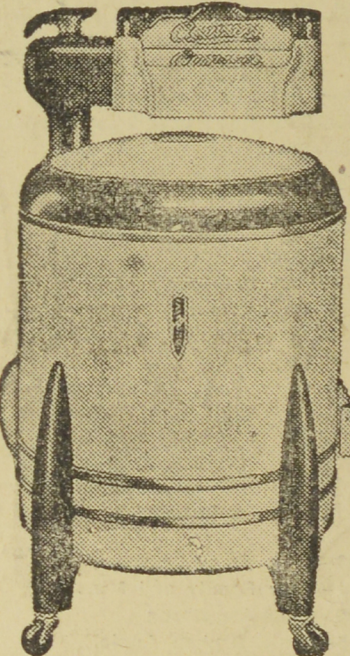
