

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Odds Look Good For Sunny Jim's Chances

BALTIMORE, May 12.—The odds looked better than ever today for Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons to take the Preakness with a powerful one-two punch—Johnstown and Gilded Knight. These two—William Woodward's Kentucky Derby winner and Wheatley Stable's up and coming colt—both are trained by Sunny Jim and will run coupled in the betting in the \$50,000 Pimlico classic Saturday.

It's an odd position for Sunny Jim to be in, having to saddle the favorites in Maryland's richest race. He'll have to insist both riders to win, for the owners will be shooting at a hand some purse.

Right after Johnstown made his Derby opponents look like a bunch of snails out for a stroll on flypaper, Fitzsimmons expressed the opinion that Gilded Knight probably was the only horse that stood a chance of beating him.

So as if to prove his right to run with Johnstown and to live up to the veteran trainer's expectations, Gilded Knight went out and won the Survivor, a 1-16 mile test at Pimlico, SLOPPY GOING

The distance 2-16's shorter than the Preakness route, was over a track slow and sloppy from a sudden down-pour. Gilded Knight ran it in 1:45 3-5 and was still highballing for home when he flashed by the finish line.

Gilded Knight's stablemate, Sea Captain, ridden by Jimmy Stout, Johnstown's jockey, set the pace for the winner and finished second by a length. Between them, they were down Day Off, Greentree Stable's Preakness hope, who was a dismal fourth in the field of five.

ROTHESAY TO STAGE TRACK AND FIELD MEET JUNE 3

SAINT JOHN, May 12.—Sponsored by the Rothesay Collegiate School the 1939 interscholastic track and field meet will be held this year on the morning and afternoon of Saturday, June 3. The events will start in the morning at 9 o'clock and will be resumed again in the afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock. No definite word has yet been made regarding the grounds where the championships will be held.

The first interscholastic meet recognized by the New Brunswick Scholastic Athletic Association was held in June, 1935, and each succeeding year these sports have attracted an increasing number of the best track and field athletes from the province's schools. It is expected that this year's meet will be one of the most successful yet held.

The list of events and their customary order is: 100 yards dash, shot put, broad jump, 220 yards dash, discus throw, one mile run, pole vault, 440 yards dash, high jump, 120 yards hurdles and one mile relay. (This order may be changed.)

The number of entries from each team for each event is limited to two except in the mile, shot put, discus and broad jump, in which three entries are allowed, and the mile relay which requires four competitors.

The province is divided into the following zones:

A. Rothesay Collegiate, Fredericton High, Saint John High, St. Vincent's and Saint John Vocational. According to the present arrangements, one of these schools conducts the provincial meet each year.

B. Moncton, Dorchester and Sackville, Representative: J. R. Tippet, Moncton High School.

C. Bathurst, Campbellton, Dalhousie, Newcastle and Chatham, Representative: R. J. Love, Bathurst High School.

D. Rothesay Consolidated, Hampton, Kingston and Sussex, Representative: A. T. Patstone, Rothesay Consolidated.

E. Edmundston, Woodstock, and Grand Falls, Representative: H. P. Clavette, Edmundston Composite High School.

F. Milltown, St. Stephen, St. Andrews, and McAdam, Representative: Fred McIntyre, Milltown High School.

NAZIS MAY NOT ENTER OLYMPICS

BERLIN, May 12.—Germany may not participate in the 1940 Winter Olympics, it was revealed today in a letter sent by Reich sports fuhrer, Hans von Tschammer and Osten, to the president of the organization committee for the winter games at St. Moritz.

Replying to an invitation forwarded to Germany by the Olympic Committee, von Tschammer said that at present Germany could not decide to give an affirmative answer inasmuch as the importance of the winter games as Olympic competition had been reduced greatly through elimination of skiing.

Von Tschammer said the German committee will reconsider the invitation after the question of skiing has been definitely cleared.

Blue Peter Remains Favorite For Derby

LONDON, May 12.—The Earl of Rosebery's Blue Peter was a 7 to 2 favorite to win the Derby at Epsom May 24, in the callover of odds at the Victoria Club last night. He was quoted Monday at 4 to 1.

The American-owned Hypnotist, winner of the Derby trial stakes at Lingfield on Monday, tightened in the betting from 19 to 2 to become joint second-favorite with Admiral's Walk. Previously, Hypnotist was a 160 to 9 shot. Heliopolis was third choice at 13 to 1 and Fairstone, winner of the Newmarket Stakes yesterday, next in the odds at 100 to 7.

Other odds: Fox Cub, 100 to 5; Buxton, Casanov, Signal Light, 20 to 1; Dhotti and Romeo II, 25 to 1. Hypnotist is owned by William Woodward, New York banker.

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
