Separate Cabinet Post May Be Established By Britain For Eventuality Of Conflict

Winston Churchill Is Suggested As Head Of Department

(Special to The Daily Mail)
LONDON, April 19.—It was reported today in high official circles that the British cabinet has decided upon a committee of supply in preparation for the eventuality of war, to control supply of foods, supplies, armament, munitions and equipment for the Army, Navy and Air Force.

TO RUSH ENLISTMENT
Britain and in fact the whole world anxiously awaited the address of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain to be given later today. It was rumored that he also will announce some form of compulsion in connection with military service in the country's defence. It was reported, however, that the cabinet's feeling on conscription has not changed.

NEW CABINET POST
Although it was not certain whether a new cabinet post will be created it is understood that Winston Churchill has been considered as director of the supply scheme. During the last war he acted in a similar capacity.

Moscow RUSSIAN PAPER APPROVES BLOC

MOSCOW, April 19.—The first kind word to come out of Russia for Chamberlain and Daladier since the Munich Agreement came today when a highly authoritative Moscow paper which often reflects Soviet government opinion, had praise for the efforts of Britain and France to establish the strong Stop-Hitler Bloc.

In the meantime, it is reported, negotiations continue between Moscow and London for the participation of the Soviet in the bloc. Russia, it has been reported, has promised material aid to the Allies in the event of a war against aggression.

Destroyer Of Austria Now On Way To Turkey As Nazi Ambassador

BERLIN, April 19.—Franz von Papen, veteran German trouble shooter, was named German Ambassador to Turkey by Chancellor Hitler who returned yesterday to Berlin to complete details for his mammoth birthday celebration Thursday.

As Von Papen prepared to take over the German office in Turkey, 25 German navy warships were steaming toward Spanish waters for naval manoeuvres.

Hitler's deep interest in the Near East was shown by his appointment of Von Papen whose aptitude for Nazi dirty work has already been attested to when he was Hitler's special

Washington U. S. PREPARES FOR KING AND QUEEN

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Elaborate preparations have been made for an historic United States reception for Their Majesties, King George and Queen Elizabeth upon their arrival in The United States on June 7.

Their Majesties will enter the United States at Niagara Falls and proceed to Washington by direct train, where they will be met at the station by President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

ROYAL RECEPTION

Heads of the diplomatic corps will be present at the White House which Their Majesties will visit. The Royal couple will attend a garden party at the British Embassy in the afternoon of June 7, and a reception at the White House in the evening.

Friday, Their Majesties will visit Mount Vernon, and will lay a wreath on the tomb of George Washington. On Saturday Their Majesties will visit the New York World's Fair.

Berlin PREPARE HUGE HITLER PARTY

Claims Troop Moves For De-Mobilization

PARIS, April 19.—Contrary to reports in France that Spanish Moroccan troops had been sent from Spain to the French Moroccan border, Spanish Ambassador Jose Felix Lequerica told Foreign Minister Bonnet that return of large forces of Moroccan troops to Spanish Morocco was merely a step in post-war demobilization. Assurances were given that troop movements within Spain as well as the Moroccan troop movement were aimed at neither France nor Britain.

HUNGARY NOW TIED WITH AXIS

ROME, April 19.—At a dinner tendered visiting Hungarian diplomats in Rome it became almost definite that Hungary has chosen her course to lie with Germany and Italy. BUILT IN 1921
The Paris, built in 1921, is 735 feet long and has a beam of 85 feet. Powered by four steam turbines, the boat had accommodation for 3,240 passengers and a crew of 664. The ship was to have visited Quebec City this year stopping there on August 14 on an eastward bound journey from New York to Le Havre.

Chatham
April 19.—George Cook, 18, was the first victim of the attack of typhoid fever which has struck Chatham. Five others are stricken by the disease. Water from the well of the Cook home was found to be contaminated. Two adjoining houses are the ones in which the disease has been noticed.

GERMAN RAIDERS
It was said that German pocket battleships were ideal raiders as they carried bigger guns than cruisers of the French and British navy and were faster than most French and British battleships which are larger than the pocket ships.

It was considered these ships might be able to cut British-French supply lines with the Americas while a German submarine fleet kept German Baltic and North Sea ports open.

London NEW ZEALAND AND S. AFRICA WOULD FIGHT

LONDON, April 19.—New Zealand and South Africa have moved to take precautions against an outbreak of hostilities.

The South African government warned that its neutrality in time of war should not be taken for granted, and an appeal was made for the mobilization of all man and woman power.
In New Zealand an appeal was made to every man up to 50 to be prepared to serve his country in the event of war. It had been previously warned that New Zealand and Australia would be in danger in time of war, and defence measures and naval practice has been held.

ENEMIES IN LAST WAR, NOW ASKED TO JOIN BLOC

Commissioners For Defence Named In England

Further Conference

LONDON, April 19.—As Great Britain last night intensified efforts to bring Turkey and Bulgaria, German Allies in the Great War, into the British-French anti-aggression bloc, Londoners were discussing the appointment yesterday of 10 of the 12 regional commissioners who will hold almost absolute authority in the dozen civilian defence regions in England, Scotland and Wales.

Appointment was announced in the House of Commons by Sir John Anderson, Lord Privy Seal, in charge of civilian defence. Senior regional commissioners will not be appointed for London and Scotland unless an emergency arises. Those named are deputy commissioners who will be prepared to go into action under the supervision of their seniors in the event of war, when their districts would become isolated from central authorities.

MOSCOW, SOFIA TALKS
British efforts to link up Turkey and Bulgaria rest on success of conversations in Moscow, Sofia and London; and it is considered unlikely that the agreement with Turkey alone will be announced until results of these conversations are known.
Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House that Britain was interested in the independence of the Netherlands, Switzerland and Denmark, but had made no specific commitments to assist any of those countries.

AWAIT ANSWER
In London it is believed officials are awaiting Hitler's answer to President Roosevelt's peace plea. It was reported that Britain and France have agreed upon division of responsibility in the Mediterranean in war time, British to control the eastern end, and France to guard the western end, as at present.

In Brief

Antigonish
April 19.—Nine buildings were destroyed and nearly a dozen others were damaged in a blaze that swept this eastern Nova Scotia town yesterday. Damage was estimated to be \$50,000.

Quebec
April 19.—The Quebec government yesterday afternoon brought down legislation to increase the gasoline tax by two cents per gallon. The bill was approved last night after a three-hour debate. The new tax, eight cents per gallon, had been in force nearly 24 hours before passed by the House.

Aberdeen
April 19.—Widow of the late Marquis of Aberdeen, former governor-general of Canada, Ishbel, Marchioness of Aberdeen, died yesterday. Known as "Darby and Joan of the Peerage," they were noted for their long, happy life together. The Marchioness was author of several books including "Through Canada With a Kodak."
